Temporary residency service on Sahel app

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10, (KUNA): The Ministry of Interior announced on Tuesday the launch of a new electronic service under the (Residency Services) section for issuing temporary residency permits under Articles 20 and 22, accessible through the unified government e-services app, Sahel.

According to a press release from the General Directorate of Security Relations and Media, this service would allow sponsors to receive a notification containing the electronic residency sticker, eliminating the need for visits to the Residency Affairs sector to print the sticker.

The Ministry highlighted that this initiative was part of ongoing efforts by the General Department of Residency Affairs and the General Directorate of Information Systems to simplify procedures and provide more convenience to both citizens and residents.

Drilling project aims to increase oil production

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10, (KUNA): The Ministry of Oil said Tuesday that the offshore drilling project supports the country's oil plans that aim to increase production to four million bpd.

This came in remarks by Director of Public Rela-tions and Information at the Ministry, Sheikha Tamadhur Khaled Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, during a discussion panel organized by the ministry titled (Offshore Drilling Project), in which senior geophysicists and geologists at Kuwait Oil Company, Maitham Ibrahim and Iman Al-Shihri, participated. Sheikha Tamadhur Al-Sabah said that the discovery

of 'An Nokhitha' field in Kuwaiti territorial waters is the beginning of a new era for exploring marine resources, as it represents a milestone that paves the way for making Kuwait a pioneer in offshore production from territorial waters.

For their part, Ibrahim and Al-Shihri reviewed the history of marine exploration in Kuwait, as the first exploratory seismic survey was carried out in 1961 by Shell Company, and in 1962 the first two marine exploratory wells were drilled by the same company.

They discussed the Kuwaiti marine area, estimated at about 6,000 square kilometers, where seven exploratory wells were drilled to explore the Cretaceous "and four wells gave good results, while (Well ivers HA-0001) gave expectations of the presence of hydrocarbon materials in a gas layer. They also mentioned that the Kuwait Oil Company is currently preparing for a high-resolution three-dimensional seismic survey covering the entire marine area, in addition to studying the best options for early production from the discovered wells.

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10, (Agencies): The State of Kuwait strongly condemned the new massacre committed by the Israeli occupation forces against innocent displaced Palestinians in Khan Yunis southern Gaza Strip.

In a statement Tuesday, Kuwait's Ministry of Foreign Affairs said this brutal targeting of defenceless civilians, including women and children, is clear evidence that the Israeli occupation forces are waging an extermination war against the Palestinians in flagrant violation of international and humanitarian laws.

The ministry renewed Kuwait's calls to the international community and the Security Council to take rapid action to stop the war of extermination that these forces have been waging on the Strip since October 2023.

The Kingdom of Saudi Arabia also strongly condemned the Israeli attacks on Khan Yunis, South of the Gaza Strip, that led to the killing of a civilian and dozens of injuries. The Saudi Ministry of Foreign Affairs in a statement reiterated its strong rejection for the continuous mass annihilation and called for an immediate ceasefire.

BAGHDAD: A soldier and a civilian were killed, and two others injured in a bomb explosion in the Iraqi capital Baghdad, the Iraqi military said on Tuesday.

A statement by the media office of the Baghdad Operations Command said that the incident occurred at 11:30 p.m. (2030 GMT) on Monday when an explosive device hidden inside a delivery box sent as a gift to a civilian detonated near a military checkpoint in the al-Shuala neighborhood in northwestern Baghdad. ADEN: The Houthi group in Yemen reported on Tuesday that an airstrike, allegedly carried out by **U.S.** and British forces, has resulted in casualties at a school in the southwestern province of Taiz.

According to the Houthis-controlled Masirah TV, an airstrike targeting Al-Janad School in the Taiziyah district of Taiz province resulted in casualties among female students. The Houthis did not release specific numbers of those killed or injured. (Xinhua)

ISLAMABAD: Pakistani police on Tuesday freed the president of the opposition party of former Prime Minister Imran Khan, a day after he was detained outside parliament on a charge of allegedly inciting violence, his party said.

Islamabad police in a statement confirmed the release of Gohar Khan, who is not related to the former premier. He was arrested along with several other leaders of the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf party as they demanded Imran Khan's release from prison. After his release, Khan, who is also a lawmaker, called the arrests an attack on parliament. He asked the National Assembly speaker to investigate (AP)

The residential areas affected by the power cuts include Abdullah Al-Mubarak, Farwaniya, Sabah Al-Ahmad, Naseem, Jahra, Jabriya, waikh Residential, and Shamiya.

Informed sources from the ministry explained that two units at the Subiya and South Zour stations, with a combined production capacity of 590 megawatts, were taken offline for emergency maintenance. This action was necessitated by the noticeable rise in temperatures, which approached 50 degrees Celsius. As a result, the ministry implemented programmed power cuts in parts of 13 areas of various governorates.

It is important to continue implementing energy conservation mea-sures, particularly during the peak hours from 11:00 am to 5:00 pm, and focusing on reducing air conditioner usage, as it accounts for 70 percent of energy consumption.

Joint efforts to up tax culture

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10: The Ministry of Finance is continuing with its collaboration with the Ministry of Education to deliver awareness lectures for secondary and intermediate school students. This initiative is part of a longterm plan that began in 2005 and was renewed in subsequent years, most recently in 2019. The goal is to enhance financial and tax culture in society.

These programs are designed to increase the level of tax awareness across various segments of society, including students, through educational competitions held during morning assemblies.

Four schools (both boys' and girls') from the intermediate and secondary levels have been selected to participate in these programs, in coordination with the School Activities Department at the Ministry of Education, and facilitate the Ministry of Finance

MoH spending on development projects on decline, says Audit

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10: The Audit Bureau has raised concerns over a significant decline in health spending on development projects in Kuwait, reports Al-Seyassah daily

According to its examination of the Ministry of Health's final ac-count for the fiscal year 2023/2024, spending on seven key projects within the annual development plan has dropped by 65.5 percent.

This decline in expenditure, paired with delays in submitting the final account, highlights broader financial management issues within the ministry.

The report revealed that the ministry collected approximately 191.8 million dinars in revenue, falling short of the estimated budget of 264.239 million dinars by 27.4 percent.

Compared to the previous fiscal year, this represents a decrease of around 72.5 million dinars, which further exacerbates the ministry's financial struggles.

The Audit Bureau criticized the Ministry of Health for its lack of accuracy in estimating expected revenues, resulting in a significant deviation from the projections outlined in the Ministry of Finance's 2022 circular. The bureau also pointed to inefficiencies in controlling spending, with some funds being unjustifiably allocated.

In response to these findings, the Audit Bureau emphasized the need for more serious efforts to accelerate the implementation of health projects under the development plan, warning that continued financial mismanagement could further impact Kuwait's health sector.

CSC calls on MoE to be accurate in determining its manpower needs

Ministry provides 5,000 smart screens for secondary school classrooms

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10: The Ministry of Education has provided about 5,000 smart screens for secondary school classrooms to develop the electronic aspect of the educational process, and raise the efficiency of interaction between teachers and students.

The assistant undersecretary for public education affairs recommended that the educational district directors should continue to provide the traditional whiteboards alongside the smart screens to be ready for any technical failure and to provide diverse educational options that meet the needs of students.

The newspaper obtained a copy of the letter on the continuation of the use of the traditional whiteboard in secondary school classrooms, along with the interactive whiteboard that was introduced at the beginning of the new school year.

Meanwhile, the Civil Service Commission (CSC) has stressed the need for the Ministry of Education to be accurate in determining its manpower needs to ensure the appointment of qualified staff to appropriate positions.

The ministry has prepared a plan to meet its need for non-academic staff for fiscal year (2025/2026) to guarantee the smooth flow of work, while the CSC has affirmed that continuous coordination between government agencies is the best way to avoid the shortage of staff in the educational sector.

MoH uses paper-based system over tech issues

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10: Health sources have assured that specialized teams are addressing the technical issues affecting some systems of the Ministry of Health, reports Al-Rai daily.

The sources confirmed that medical services continue uninterrupted, with alternative paper-based systems temporarily implemented to ensure a smooth workflow.

The sources noted that minor congestion at some centers has not compromised the efficiency of health services.

There have been no delays in issuing medical test results, dispensing medications, or providing treatments for chronic and cancer patients. All services are operating as usual.

Additionally, there has been no impact on scheduled surgeries or the follow-up of hospital patients and outpatients, with procedures continuing without interruption despite the technical difficulties.

'Douse the fire before it consumes us'

The beginnings of establishing student unions go back sixty years. I participated in the first elections and won first place, representing the commercial high school. I subsequently left the union because of the chaos I witnessed, which seems to continue to this day!

Despite the passage of 60 years since the beginning of the establishment of these unions, none of them have received state rec-

ognition. H o w e v e r, almost all the ministers of education, and those higher than them, attended the majority of the conferences and activities of these student unions.

ment always played a role in spending on these unions, and these funds were never subject to any oversight, due to the illegitimacy of these entities.

All education officials were also hesitant -- and some were afraid -- to approach these unions, due to the strong connections of the union members with many members of the National Assembly, and the control by religious, political and tribal groups over the majority of them, with a slight sectarian presence on the outskirts!

These unions have grown and have recently become a real threat to the country's internal security and peace, and this is done with the knowledge of all higher education, university and applied education officials, and perhaps with their blessing. As you know, these unions have the power to mobilize student groups, especially in cases of attendance and mass absence, via WhatsApp.

Eng. Hamoud Al-Enezi, an enlightened and independent person in his opinions, and a former member of the Municipal Council, as Secretary General of the 'National Integrity Society', made intensive efforts to uncover the amount of 'idleness and violations' taking place in the student body.

For this purpose, he conducted several interviews, warning and admonishing of its danger, especially what is happening these days in terms of preparations for the upcoming student elections, and their extremely dangerous negative impact on society, and how huge sums of money being pumped into these unions, the majority of which are of unknown origin, with the aim of financing tribal conflicts within the university and the applied institute. It is believed that the Muslim Brotherhood has a role in the feverish activity taking place!

The government is required to move quickly to douse this fire, stop this tribal polarization, from parties that do not have the slightest sense of responsibility, because it is basically illegitimate.

All the movements of these unions aim to prevent the consolidation of citizenship values and the fight against corruption. Therefore, ministerial decisions must be issued to prevent their existence, and efforts must be made to create alternative unions that are more nationalistic and less sectarian and tribal, while criminalizing the by-elections.

The activities and work of the election committees, inside and outside Kuwait, and the titles of their advertisements that bear the names of the tribes, not to mention raising their flags and anthems, have become a source of concern and panic for those with living national consciences, from all this violation of the laws and the negative impact on national unity, especially those that offer student services through their "tribal" committees, in broad daylight and with the knowledge of all higher education officials. We repeat that the money spent by

we repeat that the money spent by student unions on the travel of their members, their conferences and committees, and what is spent on by-elections, requires millions. So what is the source of this money, and who monitors how it is spent?

Engineer Hamoud believes that each list in the United States of America, for example, pays about 200,000 Kuwaiti dinars for the cost of the elections, which includes the voters' travel, hotel reservations, etc., as the tribes undertake the mobilization, and the lists undertake the financial funding, through the political relations of the student lists.

The Brotherhood group, as he sees it, has the largest role to play in the process of financing the student elections and fueling tribal conflicts.

The solution to this dangerous situation exists and is known, and what was done with the National Assembly can be followed with these unions.



"WE ARE now celebrating in Kuwait and in London the one hundred and twenty-fifth anniversary of the signing of the protection agreement between Kuwait and Great Britain in 1899, which was signed by Sheikh Mubarak Al-Sabah in the name of Kuwait and the British representative in the Gulf on behalf of Britain," columnist, former permanent envoy of the State of Kuwait to the United Na-

"Additionally, the agreement specifically aimed to support Sheikh Mubarak's authority over Kuwait and ensure that his descendants would continue to govern the state.

"This introduction to the agreement addressed concerns due to the unstable Ottoman presence in Iraq and Al-Ahsa. Sheikh Mubarak enjoyed a level of security and stability that was unprecedented among his predecessors.

"To mitigate potential threats, he took measures to close off any paths of danger. Britain, seeking to bolster reassurance in the Gulf and secure safe navigation for its colonies in India, found no issue with Sheikh Mubarak's requests.

"The agreement proved to be a protective shield for Kuwait, maintaining its independence and countering aggressive actions from tribal raids and other threats.

"Britain's commitment was demonstrated through its vigilant air and sea patrols that thwarted hostile attempts against Kuwait.

"This dedication was evident in various critical moments, including responding to Sheikh Abdullah Al-Salem's appeals to counter Abdul Karim Qasim's 1961 claims of Iraqi sovereignty over Kuwait and playing a crucial role in Kuwait's liberation in 1991, effectively silencing any harmful ambitions.

"The British commitment was distinguished by its inclusivity, garnering support from all political fac-

Court postpones Al-Jalal's murder case until Sept 16

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10: The Criminal Court adjourned to September 16 the first session of the trial for the individual accused of the murder of Nasser Al-Jalal in Hadiya. The session was adjourned for the appointment of a lawyer for the accused, payment of the civil lawsuit fee, and review and documentation of the case file.

During the session, Lawyer Hussein Al-Asfour who is representing the deceased, requested for civil compensation as well as an extension to prepare and present his case.

The defendant was brought to court from prison and he confessed to the crime. He justified his act by stating that, "The devil came".

He explained that he took the knife from Raqqa to Hadiya and stabbed Al-Jalal in front of the diwaniya with the intent of ending his life, even though there were no personal or financial disputes between them.

In a statement issued on August 22, the Public Prosecution announced that it had received a report about a citizen stabbing and killing another in Hadiya. Following this report, the Public Prosecution initiated an investigation, visited the scene of the incident to conduct an inspection and examine the deceased, and assigned the case to the Forensic Medicine Department.

SAB allegedly rejects IT agency's request to issue change orders

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10: According to informed sources, the State Audit Bureau has rejected the request of the Central Agency for Information Technology to issue change orders for adding KD 1.9 million to the contract for renting Microsoft programs and licenses, as well as for maintenance, technical support, and other services required by government agencies.

The bureau's review revealed that the Central Agency for Information Technology did

not comply with the provisions mentioned in the State Audit Bureau circular No. 6/2018. This circular specifies the controls and rules that entities under its oversight must follow when submitting documents for prior review, including adhering to guidelines for preparing tender papers, draft contracts, engagements, and agreements. Additionally, the bureau noted that the agency failed to provide the necessary approval from the Central Agency for Public Tenders to issue the change order.

The bureau explained that the total percentage of change orders issued on the contract, including the one under investigation, amounted to 12.59 percent of the total contract value.

According to law No. 49/2016 regarding public tenders, change orders cannot exceed five percent of the total contract value without the approval of the Central Agency for Public Tenders. This applies to both increases and decreases in the contract value.

The bureau has returned the matter to the Central Agency for Information Technology, requiring it to address the outstanding issues, and then resubmit the request without delay for further review and a prior opinion from the bureau.

According to the case file, an officer found the suspect sleeping in his vehicle, and woke him up. Upon being awakened, the suspect allegedly insulted the officer and attempted to assault him with a knife. After he was arrested, the officer searched his vehicle and found drugs

During the court session, the defense counsel Lawyer Bashar Al-Nassar said the arrest and subsequent procedures were invalid due to the absence of a flagrante delicto case, and claimed that the accusations leveled against his client were malicious and fabricated.

The court ruled in favor of the suspect, citing the invalidity of the arrest and all related procedures.

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10: The Public Authority for Housing Welfare (PAHW) revealed that its expenses for fiscal 2024/2025 are 73 times its revenues.

The newspaper obtained a copy of the authority's provisional budget; in which the revenues for the fiscal year are estimated at KD 8.6 million, compared to expenses estimated at KD 635.4 million.

It stated that the revenues will come from tender fees, biddings and auctions amounting to KD1.032 million; while fines, penalties and supervision costs are estimated at KD4.5 million -- an increase of about KD2.9 million compared to the previous fiscal year.

Despite the decrease in estimated expenses, the authority indicated that transfer payments and various expenses are estimated at KD595 million, while salary expenses amounted to KD 44.1 million.

On the other hand, Minister of State for Municipal and Housing Affairs Abdullatif Al-Mishari recently inspected the departments at PAHW; during which he was briefed on the services provided by the Citizen Service Department including online services, in addition to the public awareness campaigns and communication efforts carried out by the Public Relations Department.

The minister issued a directive on increasing the volume of electronic services provided to citizens. He also praised the efforts exerted and the services offered in partnership with other government agencies that save time and effort of clients.

He listened to the views of some clients and called for accelerating the completion of some types of transactions through electronic linkage with other concerned government agencies.

He looked into the mechanism for receiving allocation requests submitted through the Sahel application, in addition to the method of verifying the data sent and responding to the requests through the specialized team.

He inspected the work of the Sahel team at the authority, particularly in solving technical problems and the difficulties that clients face in using electronic ser-

Streamlining engineering qualifications

PAM suspends MoU with KSE amid complaints, accreditation concerns

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10: The Board of Directors of the Public Authority for Manpower has decided to suspend the memorandum of understanding signed with the Kuwait Society of Engineers in 2018, reports Al-Rai daily quoting reliable sources.

This agreement had authorized the Society to approve engineering certificates and qualifications for expatriates coming to Kuwait, as well as to verify the related professional titles, whether in government or private sector contracts.

According to the sources, the decision was driven by numerous complaints submitted to the Manpower authority by companies, business owners, and workers themselves, regarding the accreditation procedures.

Moreover, the move aims to simplify the mechanisms for auditing and approving engineering certificates.

While the alternative entity for overseeing these certifications has not yet been determined, sources suggested that the Ministry of Higher Education could take on this role.

Being a government body specialized in verifying educational qualifications, the ministry would be responsible for sorting certificates for engineering professions and related roles, similar to its practices for other professions in the labor market.

The sources further noted that Private Sector Labor Law No. 10 of 2010, under the fourth paragraph of Article 7, mandates that the Minister issues regulations governing the employment of private sector workers. This includes specifying jobs and professions that require passing professional tests, in coordination with relevant authorities.

KUNA Center rolls out major media training initiative on language skills

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10, (KUNA): The KUNA Center for Media Development launched a training program titled "Linguistic Skills for Media Professionals" on Sunday. The program included participants from Kuwait News Agency (KUNA), Emirates News Agency (WAM), and various government and private institutions in the country. Presented by Dr. Tariq Al-Bakri, the program employs both theoretical and practical approaches, covering topics such as Arabic language fundamentals, sentence structure, grammatical basics in writing, the relationship between language and journalistic writing, and common linguistic errors in media writing and their corrections.

The program, which will run until September 12, also addresses technical and linguistic principles, writing skills, the use of language in simple and complex news, news coverage, and the rules for linguistically and editorially correct media material. Additionally, it explores the relationship between the Arabic language and



It is advised to set air conditioners at 23°C instead of 18°C to help manage energy use more effectively.

The report revealed significant issues in financial management and project execution. It pointed out weaknesses in the ministry's procedures for controlling spending, which led to the unlawful disbursement of funds in previous years.

These sums, totaling around 5.765 million dinars, were recovered in 2023/2024, artificially boosting revenues for the current year while increasing expenses from previous years. The report also criticized the ministry for not exercising due diligence in preparing its financial forms, failing to provide the required data. Regarding expenditures, the report highlighted the ministry's inability to spend allocated amounts, leading to unrecorded expenditures of 555.375 million dinars. This reflects challenges in processing dues before the fiscal year's end and inaccuracies in budget estimates.

Kuwait strengthens cancer therapy with IAEA support

Delegation seeks to enhance radiotherapy methods

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10, (KUNA): Kuwait's Ambassador to Austria and Permanent Representative to the United Nations and International Organizations in Vienna, Talal Al-Fassam, stated on Tuesday that a delegation from the Kuwait **Cancer Control Center** (KCCC) is currently visiting Vienna to meet with technical officials from the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) to discuss the development and implementation of radiotherapy techniques.

Ambassador Al-Fassam told KUNA, following his reception of the visiting Kuwaiti delegation, that the upcoming meetings are an "important step" toward enhancing cooperation and knowledge exchange between the Kuwaiti Ministry of Health and the IAEA in the fields of nuclear medicine and radiotherapy, with the goal of improving cancer treatment standards in Kuwait.

He added that the meeting with the delegation members included a review of KCCC's efforts in promoting the use of three primary radiotherapy techniques, which are regarded as "among the latest medical research findings," and its endeavors to apply these techniques to improve patient outcomes and the quality of nealthcare provided.

In this context, he emphasized the importance of strengthening cooperation with specialized international organizations and agencies, reflecting Kuwait's commitment and dedication to providing the highest levels of care for cancer patients and enhancing its capabilities in combating the disease.

In addition, they reviewed mechanisms to boost cooperation between the Arab League, friendly countries, and other international organizations

An Israeli strike on a crowded tent camp housing Palestinians displaced by the war in Gaza killed at least 19 people and wounded 60 early on Tuesday, Palestinian officials said. Israel said it targeted senior Hamas militants with precise munitions.

The overnight strike occurred in Muwasi, a sprawl of crowded tent camps along the Gaza coast that Israel designated as a humanitarian zone for hundreds of thousands of civilians to seek shelter from the nearly year-old Israel-Hamas war.

Associated Press footage shows three large craters at the scene. First responders dug through the sand and rubble with garden tools and their bare hands, using mobile phone flashlights until the sun came up. They pulled body parts from the sand, including what appeared to be a human leg.

"We were told to go to Muwasi, to the safe area... Look around you and see this safe place," said Iyad Hamed Madi, who had been sheltering there.

"This is for my son," he said, holding up a bag of diapers. "He's 4 months old. Is he a fighter? There's no humanity.'

In a statement to KUNA, KFAED's Acting Director General Waleed Al-Bahar, said that this reflected Kuwait's foreign policy aimed at providing humanitarian support to people all over the world, especially in Arab countries.

KFAED continuously contributes to supporting the Palestinian cause through its humanitarian aid to the Palestinian people and the grants provided to UNRŴA, which amounted to about USD 22.5 million, which focused on developmental and educational aspects and providing water, food, and health security.

The grants to UNICEF amounted to about USD 21 million, which aimed to support the organization's efforts to combat famine and the cholera outbreak in Yemen, South Sudan, Nigeria, and Somalia.

In addition, the KFAED provided clean water to the Gaza Strip, measles vaccines to Syrian and Lebanese children in Lebanon, and supported mothers and newborns in areas affected by conflict in Yemen.

Al-Bahar also added that the grants to UNHCR amounted to about USD 22 million, the last of which was a grant to contribute to financing an infrastructure project for the internally displaced and host communities in Yemen.

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10: Al-Mustaqila (Independent List) has announced its decision to boycott the upcoming Kuwait University Students Union elections, reports Al-Jarida daily.

In confirmation of an article published recently in Al-Jarida regarding some student lists' reluctance to participate in the elections of the National Union of Kuwait University Students scheduled for September 22, the Independent List has stated its intention to boycott the elections.

The list cited its objections to the presence of the executive body, which it claims has violated student rights and decisions. The announcement of the election date on the 22nd of this month is also contested.

In a press statement, the Independent List called upon other student lists to support the student movement rights.

It said, "The Kuwaiti student movement is being hijacked by the executive body, as they have seized control in a manner that has nothing to do with the law and regulations. There are set regulations that determine the mechanism for students to select the executive board by students"

The Independent List explained that, despite submitting complaints to Kuwait University (KU) administration regarding financial, legal, and moral violations by the executive board, the administration responded by stating that it cannot hold the board accountable or question its actions, as the board is not subject to KU's laws and regulations.

The Independent List wondered why the administration facilitates the board's access to university facilities and organizes elections if it cannot oversee their conduct, stressing that the Students Union is a member of the university council and receives annual funding from the KU administration.

It had called for an investigation into the legitimacy of the student representative's legal standing within the university council and for monitoring the expenses and subsidies disbursed by the Students Union, but the request was rejected on the grounds that the Students Union is not officially registered or licensed.

Earlier, the Head of the Executive Body of the National Union of Kuwaiti Students Khaled Al-Ajmi announced that the University Students Union elections for the 2024/2025 academic year will take place on Sunday, September 22.

In a press statement, Al-Ajmi explained that the elections will be held for the seats of the administra-

Over 140 Ukraine drones target Russia, 1 dead: Over 140 Ukrainian drones targeted multiple Russian regions overnight, including Moscow and surrounding areas, killing at least one person, officials said Tuesday, in one of the biggest drone attacks on Russian soil in the 2 1/2-year war.

A woman died and three people were injured in the town of Ramenskoye, just outside Moscow, where drones hit two multistory residential buildings and started fires, Moscow region Gov Andrei Vorobyov said. Five residential buildings were evacuated due to falling drone debris, Vorobyov said.

The attack also prompted the authorities to temporarily shut down three airports just outside Moscow - Vnukovo, Domodedovo and Zhukovsky. A total of 48 flights were diverted to other airports,



according to Russia's civil aviation authority, Rosaviatsia. It was the second massive Ukrainian drone attack on Russia this month. On Sept. 1, the Russian military said it intercepted 158 Ukrainian drones over more than a dozen Russian regions in what Russian media described as the biggest Ukrainian drone barrage since

tive Committee announced a criminal investigation into what it described as a terror attack. Russia, meanwhile, has pummeled Ukraine with missiles,

glide bombs and its own drones, killing over 10,000 civilians, according to the United Nations.

Ukraine has invested a lot of effort in developing domestic drone production, extending the drones' range, payload and uses. (AP)

Starmer says he has to make tough decisions: British Prime Minister Keir Starmer faces a battle of nerves with his Labour Party on Tuesday, when lawmakers vote on a contentious decision to cut a payment that helps millions of pensioners pay winter heating bills.

Starmer says the decision to remove the winter fuel allowance, worth between 200 and 300 pounds (\$262 and \$393) a year, from all but the poorest retirees is needed because of the dire state of the public finances left by the previous Conservative government.

But the decision to hit people on fixed incomes in one of the government's first economic moves since winning a landslide election victory in July has caused disquiet in the center-left Labour Party. Seventeen Labour lawmakers have backed a call to postpone the cut.

Labour's large House of Commons majority means the measure should easily be approved, but the government is trying to deter unhappy Labour legislators from rebelling or abstaining. (AP)

Germany expands border controls: Germany's government ordered temporary controls at all land borders Monday, expanding checks it already has in place at some borders, saying that it was responding to irregular migration and to protect the country from extremist threats.

"We are strengthening our internal security through concrete action and we are continuing our tough stance against irregular migration," Interior Minister Nancy Faeser said at a news conference.

The ministry said that it notified the European Union on Monday of the order to set up border controls at the land borders with France, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Belgium and Denmark for a period of six months. They will begin next week on Sept. 16.

This adds to restrictions already in place on the land borders with Poland, the Czech Republic, Austria and Switzerland. (AP)

Cool weather forecast offers hope in battling Southern California blaze

Several days of triple-digit temperatures have stoked a wildfire in Southern California that burned so hot it created its own thunderstorm-like weather systems, but firefighters are hoping to gain the upper hand as cooler weather is expected to move into the area after Tuesday.

The Line Fire has forced at least 6,000 people to evacuate and threatened thousands of home and commercial structures as it burns along the edge of the San Bernardino National Forest, about 65 miles (105 kilometers) east of Los Angeles.

Firefighters have been working in steep terrain and challenging conditions in temperatures above 100 degrees (37.7 Celsius), limiting their ability to control the blaze, which has created the type of clouds that can spawn gusty winds and lightning

"We're dealing with triple-digit temperatures and hard-to-reach steep areas where there has not been fire in decades, or in recorded history, so all that vegetation has led to significant fuel loads," Cal Fire spokesperson Rick Carhart said. State fire managers said three firefighters have been injured since the blaze was reported Thursday. (AP)

The dogs - Einar, Eliot, Enzo and Emi - were bestowed with their ranks Friday as part of a new Polish program aimed at honoring the service of dogs used to detect explosives, a job valued for its role in protecting human life. Gen. Wiesław Kukuła, Chief of the General Staff of the

Polish Army, decided last year that dogs serving in the Polish army would qualify for six military ranks ranging from private through corporal to sergeant. The change has been welcomed by their loyal human handlers. (AP)

Poland's cybersecurity experts foil attacks: Poland's security officials said Monday they have foiled cyberattacks and online blackmail attempts by groups acting for Russian and Belarusian services.

Poland has registered up to 1,000 online attacks daily targeting government institutions and agencies, officials said, linking them to the country's support for neighboring Ukraine in its 2 1/2-year war against Russia's invasion.

The group that was broken up was seeking access to information in state and individual companies with the goal of blackmailing them, said Digital Affairs Minister Krzysztof Gawkowski. The government plans new legislation to increase Poland's cybersecurity, Gawkowski said. (AP)

Belgium top migration official slams Hungary: Belgium's top migration official on Monday criticized Hungary for threatening to send a bus convoy of migrants to Brussels in retaliation against European Union policies and suggested they would be stopped at the border.

Hungary's anti-immigrant government signaled Friday that it is serious about a plan to provide asylum-seekers free one-way travel to Brussels, a measure meant to pressure the European Commission into dropping heavy fines against the country for its restrictive asylum policies.

In June, the European Court of Justice ordered Hungary to pay a fine of 200 million euros (\$216 million) for persistently breaking the bloc's asylum rules, and an additional 1 million euros per day until it brings policies into line with EU law. (AP)

Golden eagle attacks toddler in Norway: At first, Francis Ari Sture thought a human was trying to shove him down the steep Norwegian mountainside. Then he saw the golden eagle land. "We are staring at each other for, maybe, a whole minute," Sture told The Associated Press on Monday. "I'm trying to think what's in its mind."

The bird then attacked Sture five more times Thursday, scratching and clawing the 31-year-old bicycle courier's face and arms over 10 to 15 minutes as he sprinted down the mountain. The same eagle is believed to be responsible for attacks on three other people across a vast mountainous area of southern Norway over the last week, including an assault on a toddler Saturday that required the child to get stitches. (AP)

Man charged in killing nurse: A neighbor of an Oregon nurse who was found dead just days after her wedding was arraigned Monday on charges of second-degree murder, kidnapping and abuse of a corpse.

Bryce Schubert, 27, was formally informed in court of the charges against him in the death of Melissa Jubane, 32. Police said early Saturday they had arrested Schubert but have not released details about how they believe he was connected to the case.

Authorities entered Jubane's name as a missing person in national law enforcement databases on Wednesday after she missed her nursing shift that day. Police failed to find her when they conducted a welfare check at her apartment in the Portland suburb of Beaverton.

Schubert's public defender, Greg Scholl, said his client tried to plead not guilty, but that the Washington County Circuit Judge Elizabeth Lemoine said she could not accept it. Court rules do not allow defendants to enter felony pleas before they are indicted by a grand jury, the news organization said. (AP)

'Suspect vows to kill lot of people':

The man suspected of opening fire on a highway in Kentucky sent a text message vowing to "kill a lot of people" less than 30 minutes before he shot and wounded five people on Interstate 75, authorities said in an arrest warrant.

"I'm going to kill a lot of people. Well try at least," Joseph Couch, 32, wrote in the text message, according to the warrant affidavit filed in court. In a separate text message, Couch wrote, "I'll kill myself afterwards," the affidavit says.

The Lexington Herald-Leader identified the woman Couch sent the text messages to as his ex-wife. The affidavit does not describe the relationship between Couch and the woman who received the texts.

The affidavit, written by Capt Richard Dalrymple of the Laurel County Sheriff's Office,

In one possible conservative outline for a new Trump administration known as Project 2025, a former Trump Justice Department official writes that Pennsylvania's top election official should have been prosecuted for a policy dispute -- in deciding that voters there have a chance to fix signature errors on their mail ballots.

Trump has disavowed Project 2025, but his rhetoric matches that example, said Justin Levitt, a former Justice Department official and Biden White House staffer who now teaches law at Loyola Marymount in Los Angeles.

"Threatening people with punishment for cheating is deeply disturbing if 'cheating' simply means that you don't like the outcome of the election," Steve Simon, a Democrat who is Minnesota's secretary of state and the president of the

47 inmates escape

Poll monitors accuse Tunisia's ISIE of bias

TUNIS, Tunisia, Sept 10, (AP): Election officials in Tunisia doubled down Monday on their decision to deny accreditation to some election observer groups who say the move shows the October presidential contest in the North African country won't be free and fair

The Independent High Authority for Elections, or ISIE, said in a statement that several civil society groups that had applied for accreditation had received a "huge amount" of foreign funding of a "suspicious origin" and therefore had to be denied accreditation to observe the election.

Though the ISIE did not explicitly name the groups, one of its commission members said last weekend



that it sent formal allegations against two specific groups to Tunisia's public prosecutor, making similar claims that they took funding from abroad.

The two organizations, I-Watch and Mourakiboun (which means "Observers" in Arabic) are not the first civil society groups to be pursued by authorities in Tunisia. Under President Kais Saied, non-

Saied

governmental organizations have increasingly been target-

ed for their work, which spans from aid for migrants to human rights to local development efforts.

Saied has throughout his tenure accused civil society groups of having nefarious motives and being puppets of foreign countries critical of his style of governance. He has alleged that NGOs that receive funding from abroad intend to disrupt the North African nation's social fabric and domestic politics.

Targeted

Some of the groups targeted have increasingly criticized authorities' decisions to arrest potential candidates and bar others from running over the past several months. Other groups, including I-Watch and Mourakiboun, have applied for accreditation to act as independent election observers for the Oct. 6 vote.

In a statement, I-Watch blasted ISIE's efforts to call its funding into question and called it "a desperate attempt to distract public opinion by hiding the violations it committed and its failure to implement law.'

Siwar Gmati, a member of the watchdog group, told The Associated Press that any foreign funding that I-Watch received for specific projects in the past was provided in accordance with Tunisian law and disclosed transparently.

Financial disclosures published on I-Watch's website show some of its past programs have been bank-rolled by groups such as Transparency International and Deutsche Welle Akademie (DW) as well as the European Union and the US Embassy.

47 escape from Liberia jail: Dozens of inmates escaped from a maximum security prison outside Liberia's capital over the weekend, authorities said Monday

The 47 inmates were able to escape because of a breach in the prison security system, the Justice Ministry said in a statement. The prison is in Kakata, a town 55 kilometers (34 miles) northeast of the capital,

Kim vows to make N-force ready for combat

SEOUL, South Korea, Sept 10, (Agencies): North Korean leader Kim Jong Un vowed to redouble efforts to make his nuclear force fully ready for com-bat with the United States and its allies, state media reported Tuesday, after the country disclosed a new platform likely designed to fire more powerful intercontinental ballistic missiles targeting the mainland US.

Kim has repeatedly made similar pledges, but his latest threat comes as outside experts believe Kim will perform provocative weapons tests ahead of the US presidential election in November. In recent days, North Korea has also resumed launches of trashcarrying balloons toward South Korea.

to launch strikes on the US and South Korea. The US and South Korea have responded by expanding military drills that North Korea calls invasion rehearsals.

Many analysts believe North Korea has some last remaining technological barriers to overcome to acquire longrange nuclear missiles that can reach the US mainland, though it likely already possesses missiles that can hit key targets in South Korea and Japan.

South Korean officials and experts say North Korea could conduct nuclear tests or ICBM test-launches before the US election to increase its leverage in paign that has further stoked animosities on the Korean Peninsula.

TOKYO: Natsuo Yamaguchi, leader of Japan's ruling coalition party Komeito, said on Tuesday that he would step down and not run in the party's upcoming leadership election.

Stressing a smooth generational shift within the party, Yamaguchi made the announcement at a press conference during the day, marking the first leadership change for Komeito in 15 years. The 72-year-old politician will step



Monrovia.

The ministry said that it was "deeply concerned about this incident and is taking all necessary measures to ensure the recapture of the escaped inmates.'

4 dead after boat capsized off Senegal: A boat carrying migrants capsized off the coast of Senegal over the weekend, leaving at least four people dead and several others missing, local authorities said on Monday.

The artisanal fishing boat left the town of Mbour, nearly 80 kilometers (50 miles) south of the capital, Dakar heading to Europe on Sunday afternoon before capsizing a few miles off the coast, Amadou Diop, the district's prefect told The Associated Press.

Local fishermen rescued three people who were brought back to shore by naval authorities.

Senegal's navy is looking for those missing, Diop said, adding that the exact number of passengers remained unknown.

Tanzania opp'n official found dead: Tanzania's most prominent opposition party says an official who went missing last week has been found dead with signs of beatings and acid poured on his face.

President Samia Suluhu Hassan, who has loosened past restrictions on the opposition in the East African nation, quickly condemned the killing in a statement posted on X and said her administration does not condone such acts.

Armed men abducted Ali Kibao, a secretariat member of the CHADEMA party, from a bus traveling from the commercial hub of Dar es Salaam to the port city of Tanga, on Friday. His body was found on Saturday, opposition leader Freeman Mbowe said late Sunday.

Mbowe said an autopsy would be done on Monday and urged the president to form a commission to investigate Kibao's death. The president in her statement said she has asked investigating agencies for an in-depth report.

Athlete attacker dies of burns: A man accused of dousing gasoline on an Ugandan Olympic athlete, causing her death days later, has succumbed to burns sustained in the attack, according to the Kenyan hospital where he was treated.

Dickson Ndiema was admitted at the Moi Referral Hospital in the western Eldoret city for burns covering 30% of his body. Ndiema is alleged to have sustained the injuries after setting on fire Olympic athlete Rebecca Cheptegei, who died last Thursday with 80% of burns on her body.

The hospital spokesperson, Owen Menach, told The Associated Press on Tuesday that the hospital would issue a statement later but confirmed that the patient had died.

El Salvador's military in a post on X said the air force helicopter crash occurred in the area of San Eduardo, Pasaquina, La Union. It said the director general of the National Civil Police, Mauricio Arriaza Chicas, and two deputies were aboard.

El Salvador's President Navib Bukele said in a post on X that "what happened cannot remain as a simple 'accident'" and must be investigated thoroughly "and to the ultimate consequences. We will request international help

Bukele noted that Arriaza Chicas had led the government's fight against the gangs that once dominated daily life for much of the Salvadoran population. Bukele's harsh crackdown on the gangs and mass arrests of more than 80,000 people with little due process have been condemned by human rights organizations. (AP)

Opp'n hopes to unseat Maduro: Venezuelan opposition leader Maria Corina Machado tried to reassure supporters Monday that her coalition still hopes to gain control of the presidency despite the departure into exile of their candidate Edmundo González Urrutia.

Machado's group maintains that it has evidence that González won the July 28 presidential election by a wide margin against Venezuela's authoritarian incumbent president, Nicolás Maduro, despite his claim to have won.

In a speech marking the 76th founding anniversary for his government on Monday, Kim said North Korea faces "a grave threat" because of what he called "the reckless expansion" of a US-led regional military bloc that is now developing into a nuclear-based one. Kim said such a development is pushing North Korea to boost its military capability, according to the official Korean Central News Agency.

Kim said North Korea will "redouble its measures and efforts to make all the armed forces of the state including the nuclear force fully ready for combat," KCNA said.

Growing

North Korea has been protesting the July signing of a new US-South Korean defense guideline meant to integrate US nuclear weapons and South Korean conventional weapons to cope with growing North Korean nuclear threats. North Korea said the guideline revealed its adversaries' plots to invade the country. US and South Korean officials have repeatedly said they don't intend to attack the country.

Since 2022, North Korea has significantly accelerated its weapons testing activities in a bid to perfect its capabilities

Staged

North Korea as of Tuesday morning did not appear to have staged any major military demonstration to mark this year's anniversary. But the North's main Rodong Sinmun newspaper on Sunday published a photo of Kim inspecting what appeared to be a 12-axle missile launch vehicle, which would be the largest the country has shown so far, during a visit to a munitions plant. This sparked speculation that the North could be developing a new ICBM that is bigger than its current Hwasong-17 ICBM, which is launched on an 11-axle vehicle.

When asked about the photo on Monday, Pentagon spokesperson Maj. Gen. Pat Ryder refused to provide a specific assessment of North Korea's missile capabilities and reiterated that Washington was working closely with Seoul, Tokyo and other partners to preserve regional security and deter potential attacks.

López Obrador, who has clashed repeatedly with judges throughout his six-year term, has claimed that the judges in the current court system are corrupt. The governing party's proposal would make the country's entire judicial branch - around 7,000 judges - stand for election.

The proposal has fueled a wave of protests and drawn extensive criticism from analysts, judges and international observers. Some of the critics contend that it would compromise the independence of the judiciary and the system of checks and balances. (AP)

CBK issues 240 mln dinars in bonds

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10: The Central Bank of Kuwait has announced the issuance of bonds and securitization instruments totaling 240 million dinars. These bonds are set for a three-month term with a return rate of 4.375 percent, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

Bonds are debt instruments used by governments to raise funds, obligating them to repay the principal amount to bondholders on the maturity date along with interest.

Securitization, on the other hand, involves pooling various debts or receivables and converting them into tradable securities. The "bonds and corresponding securitization" issued by the Central Bank are primarily aimed at local banks.

They help regulate liquidity within the Kuwaiti banking sector by withdrawing excess liquidity from the market and providing additional liquidity when needed. This process is crucial for implementing monetary policy, particularly in managing interest rates.

Additionally, these debt instruments are classified as risk-free on bank balance sheets, adding a layer of security for financial institutions holding them.

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10: The Indian Ambassador to Kuwait, HE Adarsh Swaika, said a high-level Kuwaiti delegation will participate in the "World Food India" (WFI) conference, organized by the Ministry of Food Processing Industries in India in partnership with the Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FIC-CI), from September 19 to 22.

This delegation will include representatives from various Kuwaiti governmental bodies and institutions, as well as a large group of businessmen.

The Indian envoy made these remarks during the opening of an exhibition featuring products from 30 Indian companies operating in the food and agricultural sector, led by Israr Ahmed, Deputy CEO of the Federation of Indian Export Organizations (FIEO).

Dr Swaika highlighted that the visiting Indian delegation has showcased their products in the food and beverage sector, emphasizing that this sector plays a significant role in the bilateral trade between India and Kuwait, which is worth approximately \$350 million annually.

He noted that while Indian the exports are traditionally focused on products such as rice, legumes, and spices; they will now include new items packaged in eco-friendly materials.

The ambassador added, he is optimistic that the upcoming conference will garner increased interest from Kuwaiti friends and business leaders to explore available investment opportunities. He described the meeting between the Kuwait Chamber of Commerce and Industry members and the visiting Indian delegation as highly successful, reflecting the mutual interest in enhancing existing relations.

He noted that the leaderships of both countries encourage the growth and strengthening of bilateral and historical ties.

Dr Swaika also urged Indian businesses not only to seek trade opportunities in Kuwait but also to present Kuwaiti investors with opportunities in India, particularly in the food processing sector. He suggested that Kuwaiti businesses should consider establishing food production facilities in India to ensure Kuwait's food security and potentially export to other regions.

Meanwhile, Ahmed emphasized that Indian companies are eager to export their agricultural and food products to Kuwait, noting that Kuwait is a key trading partner for India.

The MoUs were inked following bilateral talks between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and the visiting Crown Prince.

China's foreign trade shows resilience

China's foreign trade has continued to demonstrate strong resilience during the first eight months of the year, despite the complex and challenging external environment, official data showed on Tuesday.

The goods trade volume expanded 6 percent year on year in yuan terms in the first eight months of this year, according to the General Administration of Customs (GAC)

Exports rose 6.9 percent year on

year in the January-August period, while imports climbed 4.7 percent, according to the General Administration of Customs.

In U.S. dollar terms, the country's foreign trade in goods stood at 4.02 trillion dollars from January to August, up 3.7 percent year on year. Exports rose 4.6 percent from a year ago, while imports increased 2.5 percent year on year. Trade surplus expanded by 11.2

percent year on year to 608.49 bil-

lion dollars during the eight-month period. Lyu Daliang, director of the GAC's Department of Statistics and Analysis, attributed the increase in foreign trade to thriving demand both at home and abroad.

"China's economy has seen a continuous recovery since the beginning of this year. In the first half of the year, China's shares of global exports and imports have both posted a stable increase," Lyu said. (Xinhua)

China's exports grew for a fifth consecutive month, in a sign of growing demand abroad even as imports fell amid a slowing Chi-

Exports in August expanded by 8.7% to \$308.65 billion com-pared to the same period last year, according to data released by China's customs office Tuesday, beating economists' estimates of about 6.5%. The export figures for August were also up

from the 7% rise in July. The reading in August is the strongest in 18 months, thanks in part to a low base in August 2023, when exports declined

China's August exports grow a robust 8.7%

8.8% By comparison, imports grew just 0.5% compared to a year ago, falling short of the approximately 2% estimate by economists

Chinese leaders have ramped up investment in manufacturing to rev up an economy that stalled during the pandem-ic and is still growing slower than hoped.

"Export values grew year-on-year at the fastest pace in 17 months, with export volumes hit-ting record highs. We expect exports to remain robust in the near term, supported by the decline in China's real effective exchange rate," said Zichun Huang of Capital Economics. (AP)

US oil and gas production surged to record highs under both Trump and Biden-Harris, despite very different energy goals

The United States is producing more oil and natural gas today than ever before, and far more than any other country. So, what roles did the Trump-Pence and Biden-Harris administrations play in this surge?

The answer might surprise you, given the way each has talked publicly about fossil fuels: former President Donald Trump embracing them, and President Joe Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris focusing on reducing fossil fuel use to fight climate change.

Under each of the three most recent presidencies, Republican and Democratic alike, U.S. oil and gas production was higher at the end of the administration's term than at the beginning.

That production has both pros and cons. Together, oil and gas account for nearly three-quarters of U.S. energy consumption. Producing oil and gas in the U.S. provides energy security, and high production generally keeps prices down. Burning oil and gas, however, releases carbon dioxide into the air, contributing to climate change. And natural gas is mostly methane - another potent greenhouse ga

As a scholar who works on both energy and public policy, I follow the federal government's actions involving oil, gas and coal. With Trump and Harris facing off in the November presidential election, let's take a look at how each influenced fossil fuel production and emissions.

Both the Trump-Pence administration and the Biden-Harris administration took actions that supported additional oil and gas drilling. Both also took actions that restricted additional oil and gas drilling.

Trump has been aggressively pro-fossil fuels in his rhetoric and actions, dating back to his first run for office. Under his administration, the federal government leased more land for drilling in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge, the National Petroleum Reserve-Alaska and in the Utah wilderness. To further help the industry, Trump urged agencies to

waive environmental reviews and loosen regulations in ways that could speed up permits for pipeline construction and other energy infrastructure.

The Trump administration also opened more U.S. coastal waters for oil and gas leasing, but Trump later rolled this back, banning coastal drilling for 10 years in the eastern Gulf of Mexico and the Atlantic coasts of Florida, Georgia and South Carolina. At the time, opposition to drilling in those states threatened several Republican candidates' 2020 election bids

The Biden-Harris administration focused on clean energy and climate change. It issued several regulations targeting fossil fuels, including efforts to reduce methane leaks from natural gas pipelines and increasing the royalties that companies pay for production on federal lands. In 2021, it issued a moratorium on new federal leases for oil and gas, but that was blocked by a federal judge.

However, the Biden-Harris administration also gave the go-ahead for the nation's largest oil drilling operation, ConocoPhillips' vast Willow project in Alaska. And the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022, considered the administration's signature climate law, included additional oil and gas leasing and incentives to capture carbon dioxide for use in enhanced oil recovery.

When land is leased for drilling, it takes some years for production to begin. So, the increased oil and gas production during the Biden administration is to some extent a result of leases issued during the Trump administration. Trump auctioned off the leases; the Biden administration signed the permits

In many cases, presidents have little discretion and are essentially required to approve when permits meet the legal requirements.

Global events can also have large effects on production.

The COVID-19 pandemic reduced U.S. oil demand as activity slowed worldwide in 2020.

Russia's invasion of Ukraine in 2022 led to greater energy demand from Europe. Natural gas has to be liquefied to ship it overseas, however, and the U.S. has limited export capacity. To send more supply to Europe, the U.S. had to reroute natural gas exports intended for other countries.

The Biden-Harris administration paused approvals for additional liquefied natural gas terminals in 2024, but a federal judge blocked the move.

Drilling technology has been an important driver of the industry's success.

U.S. oil production had reached a peak in 1970 and went into a slow decline that lasted more than three decades. It was widely believed that the U.S. had pumped its best reservoirs and that the country would be inexorably dependent on foreign oil.

Then, in the early 2000s, innovations in hydraulic fracturing and horizontal drilling changed everything. These techniques gave drillers access to previously hard-to-reach fossil fuels and opened up opportunities for oil and gas drilling at lower cost and in greater quantities. Since around 2009, U.S. oil production has surged.

Natural gas followed a similar trajectory. U.S. natural gas production had peaked in 1972 and leveled off. But with fracking, natural gas production has risen since around 2005.

Trump supports fracking. Harris opposed fracking in the past, but she told CNN in August 2024 that she won't ban it. U.S. coal production is a different story. It peaked in 2008 and has been going down sharply since then.

Coal is more susceptible to government actions than oil and gas - 40% of it is produced on federal land, compared with 24% for oil and 11% for natural gas. And it has seen federal policy swings.

For example, in 2016, then-President Barack Obama banned new coal-mining leases in the Powder River Basin in Montana and Wyoming, where the majority of coal production on federal land takes place. The Trump administration lifted that freeze a year later, but a court ordered a pause of Trump's move. The ban was eventually revoked by a court during the Biden administration. Then the Biden administration again ended new leases in the Powder River Basin.

But coal's decline was also about economics. As natural gas became cheaper, it increasingly replaced coal in U.S. electricity production.

The decrease in coal production is the main reason U.S. carbon dioxide emissions have been falling even as fossil fuel production rises. Rising renewable energy production and increasing efficiency in some technologies have also helped cut emissions.

Trump can take credit for allowing more leases for oil and gas drilling. The Biden-Harris administration, while it issued permits for oil and gas drilling and production increased on its watch, established several rules to limit greenhouse gas emissions from fossil fuels.

Presidents' actions can matter for the industry's future, but the major factors in U.S. oil and gas production so far have been increased production efficiency, increased global demand and the lower cost of natural gas compared with coal. (AP)

Antitrust shopping case Google loses 'the final' EU court appeal against 2.4 bln euro fine

LONDON, Sept 10, (AP):Google lost its final legal challenge on Tuesday against a European Union penalty for giving its own shopping recommendations an illegal advantage over rivals in search results, ending a long-running antitrust case that came with a whopping fine.

The European Union's Court of Justice upheld a lower court's decision, rejecting the company's appeal against the 2.4 billion euro (\$2.7 billion) penthe EU General Court, the tribunal's lower section, rejected its challenge in 2021 and the Court of Justice's adviser later recommended rejecting the appeal.

European consumer group BEUC hailed the court's decision, saying it shows how the bloc's competition law "remains highly relevant" in digital markets.

"Google harmed millions of European consumers by ensuring that rival comparison shopping services were virtually invisible," director general Agustín Reyna said. "Google's illegal practices prevented consumers from accessing potentially cheaper prices and useful product information from rival comparison shopping services on all sorts of products, from clothes to washing machines. Google is still appealing the other two EU antitrust penalties, which involved its Android mobile operating system and AdSense advertising platform. The company was dealt a setback in the Android case when the EU General Court upheld the commission's 4.125 billion euro fine in a 2022 decision. Its initial appeal against a 1.49 billion euro fine in the AdSense case has yet to be decided. Those three cases foreshadowed expanded efforts by regulators worldwide to crack down on the tech industry. The EU has since opened more investigations into Big Tech companies and drafted new laws to clean up social media platforms and regulate artificial intelligence. Google is now facing particular pressure over its lucrative digital advertising business. In a federal antitrust trial that began Monday, the U.S. Department of Justice is alleging the company holds a monopoly in the "ad tech" industry.

The report stands out from other recipes for improvement because the project was headed by Mario Draghi, the former head of the European Central Bank who also served as Italy's prime minister in 2021-22.

Draghi is regarded as having saved the euro currency union with his 2012 promise that the ECB would do "whatever it takes" to save the shared currency from the debt and financial crisis then engulfing it.

Now the EU and its 440 million people are facing a persistent and growing growth gap with the US, the report says. Last year the EU economy grew 0.4% compared with 2.5% in the U.S.

Europe is also struggling with three areas where it has become dependent on outsiders: Russia for energy, China for growth and trade, and the U.S. for defense. All three are now disrupted or in question. Draghi says the EU and its 27 member governments have to work better together to develop their own capacities.

The report, requested by the European Union's executive commission, says Europe needs to massively ramp up infrastructure and green energy investments while slashing burdensome regulation in order to return to consistent, strong growth.

Whether any of it will actually take effect over the upcoming 5-year term of the re-elected commission President Ursula von der Leyen depends on backing from the EU's member governments and its parliament.

Here are some key takeaways from the report's nearly 400 pages:

To pay for the transition to clean energy and boost defense capacity, the EU would need to increase public investments by a massive 5% of annual economic output, levels not seen since the 1960s and 1970s, and dwarfing the post-World War II Marshall Plan. To find the money, the EU needs to integrate its financial markets so that companies can raise more capital through stock and bond sales rather than bank loans as they tend to do now. That has been one of the EU's long-standing projects, but it has moved slowly amid resistance to some aspects, such as shared deposit insurance.

Draghi also said that issuing shared debt would be one way to both fund investment in specific projects such as defense or cross-border energy grids.

Apple embraces the AI craze with newly unleashed iPhone 16 lineup

CUPERTINO, Calif., Sept 10, (AP): Apple on Monday charged into the artificial intelligence craze with a new iPhone lineup that marks the company's latest attempt to latch onto a technology trend and transform it into a cultural phenomenon.

The four different iPhone 16 models will all come equipped with special chips needed to power a suite of AI tools that Apple hopes will make its marquee product even more indispensable and reverse a recent sales slump.

Apple's AI features are designed to turn its often-blundering virtual assistant Siri into a smarter and more versatile sidekick. automate a wide range of tedious tasks and pull off other crowdpleasing tricks, such as creating customized emojis within seconds.

After receiving a standing ovation for Monday's event, Apple CEO Tim

Princess of Wales ends chemo, will return to public duties

LONDON, Sept 10, (AP): Kate, the Princess of Wales, has completed chemotherapy and will make some public appearances in the coming months, bolstering Britain's royal family after it was rocked by the twin cancer diagnoses of the princess and King Charles III.

The 42-year-old wife of Prince William released a video Monday in which she appeared alongside her husband and children as she described how difficult the past nine months have been for her family and expressed "relief" at completing her course of treatment.

"Life as you know it can change in an instant, and we have had to find a way to navigate the stormy waters and road unknown," she said in the video, which was shot in a woodland near the family's summer home in Norfolk. "The cancer journey is complex, scary and unpredictable for everyone, especially those closest to you. With humility, it also brings you face to face with your own vulnerabilities in a way you have never considered before, and with that, a new perspective on everything."

The royal family has been buffeted by health concerns this year, beginning with the announcement in January that the king would receive treatment for an enlarged prostate and Kate would undergo abdominal surgery. In February, Buckingham Palace announced Charles was receiving treatment for an undisclosed type of cancer. Six weeks later, Kate said she, too, was undergoing treatment for cancer, quieting the relentless speculation about her condition that had circulated on social media since her surgery.

While the announcements triggered an outpouring of good wishes for the ailing royals, they also put the royal family under tremendous pressure. Queen Camilla and Princess Anne, the king's sister, took on additional duties to cover the seemingly endless list of public events

that make up the daily routine of the House of Windsor. William also took time off to support his wife and their three young children.

Charles began his return to public duties in late April when he visited a cancer treatment center in London. He is scheduled to make the first long-haul trip since his diagnosis when he travels to Australia and Samoa in the fall.

Treatment

Kate said Monday that while she had completed her chemotherapy treatment, the path to full recovery would be long and she would "take each day as it comes."

"William and I are so grateful for the support we have received and have drawn great strength from all those who are helping us at this time," she said. "Everyone's kindness, empathy and compassion has been truly humbling."

In June, the princess acknowledged that she had good days and bad days while undergoing treatment.

While she stepped away from most public duties during her treatment, Kate has made two appearances this year. First, during the king's birthday parade in June, known as Trooping the Colour, and most recently during the men's final at Wimbledon in July, where she received a standing ovation.

"To all those who are continuing their own cancer journey - I remain with you, side by side, hand in hand," Kate said Monday.

"Out of darkness, can come light, so let that light shine bright." Her updated statement Monday says it has been a difficult year for

her family but it has provided perspective on life and being grateful for simple but important things, such as "loving and being loved."

"As the summer comes to an end, I cannot tell you what a relief it is to have finally completed my chemotherapy treatment.

"The last nine months have been incredibly tough for us as a family. Life as you know it can change in an instant and we have had to find a way to navigate the stormy waters and road unknown.

'The cancer journey is complex, scary and unpredictable for everyone, especially those closest to you.

"With humility, it also brings you face to face with your own vulnerabilities in a way you have never considered before, and with that, a new perspective on everything.


"This time has above all reminded William and me to reflect and be grateful for the simple yet important things in life, which so many of us often take for granted. Of simply loving and being loved.

NEW YORK: Jailed ex-movie mogul Harvey Weinstein underwent an emergency medical procedure at a New York City hospital on Monday to remove fluid on his heart and lungs after he complained of chest pains over the weekend, his representatives said.

Weinstein, 72, was rushed to Bellevue Hospital in Manhattan from the Rikers Island jail complex late Sunday "due to severe medical conditions," his publicist Juda Engelmayer and prison consultant Craig Rothfeld said.

"We can confirm that Mr. Weinstein had a procedure and surgery on his heart today,' Engelmayer and Rothfeld said. Weinstein was out of surgery as of Monday afternoon and is in recovery, they said.

Rothfeld identified the procedure as pericardiocentesis surgery. He said Weinstein had not been feeling well for several weeks and was worsening by the day.

Weinstein's lawyer, Arthur Aidala, said they requested that jail officials immediately move Weinstein to Bellevue "based on his complaints to us regarding chest pains." In one email, Aidala said, he told them: "This guy is going to die on your watch if you don't do something.'

The city Department of Correction's public inmate-lookup website was updated Monday to show that Weinstein was moved to the Bellevue Hospital Prison Ward from the West Facility at Rikers Island which is used to isolate inmates with contagious diseases such as tuberculosis, or for other reasons.

News of Weinstein's hospitalization was first reported by ABC News

Weinstein has been in and out of Bellevue Hospital since returning to Rikers Island from state prison in April after an appeals court overturned his 2020 rape and sexual assault convictions and ordered a new trial.

In July, he was hospitalized with COVID-19 and pneumonia in both lungs, his representatives said

After his February 2020 conviction, Weinstein left court in an ambulance and detoured to Bellevue, complaining of chest pains and high blood pressure. He later had a stent inserted to unblock an artery.

After his sentencing a few weeks later, he returned to the hospital with more chest pains. He later tested positive for COVID-19

Adams and Heller put their life experiences into film

Motherhood's complexities in 'Nightbitch'

TORONTO, Sept 10, (AP): The day after the premiere of their film "Nightbitch," Amy Adams and Marielle Heller are sitting in a Toronto restaurant reflecting on all that went into, as Heller puts it, "birthing" a movie that captures some of the truest, rawest but seldom Instagrammed things about early motherhood.

Their film, which writer-director Heller has described as a comedy for women and a horror film for men, stars Adams as a woman credited only as "Mother." With her husband (Scoot McNairy) often away on work (and when he's there, he refers to solo parenting as "babysitting"), Adams' character experiences a wide range of emotions raising a newborn.

She is exhausted and resentful. Fresh postpartum horrors await a glance in the mirror. Animalistic urges bubble up. New powers emerge. The movie turns increasingly surreal. There are dogs

"I just met her where I was at," says Adams, whose own daughter is now a teenager. "That was me at that time in my life. It wasn't a transformation that I made for the movie. I just was like: This is who she is. This is who I am, let's marry the two and let's be proud."

The adaptation of Rachel Yoder's bestseller that Searchlight Pictures will release Dec. 6, is about as close to the bone as it gets for Adams and Heller. In "Nightbitch," the rage and bitterness of an over-burdened, self-sacrificing mother - Adams' character has given up her successful career as an artist - find welldeserved expression. Aside from pulling from Yoder's book, the movie comes directly from Heller and Adams' experiences. Extreme as it can be, "Nightbitch" is essentially reportage from a little-documented chapter of parenthood

Heller, the filmmaker of "A Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood,"

"Can You Ever Forgive Me?" and "The Diary of a Teenage Girl," wrote the script while raising her second child with her husband Jorma Taccone. They had moved out of New York during the pandemic, but Taccone was away for several months working on a TV show.

"I wasn't sleeping. My daughter was getting up at 5 every day. I was out of my mind," says Heller. "When you're sleep deprived, you sort of feel more connected to the mythological world because you're not in a literal headspace.

The only way Heller could write was to put her infant

daughter down for a nap and let her older son watch TV

"And I'd get two hours. And in those two hours I wrote the script," Heller says. "It was my one little moment that I could carve out, and I could just get out all of my frustrations from the day.

When Adams, a producer on the movie, read Yoder's book, she recognized a more honest perspective on motherhood than she had read before.

"It really reminded me of 'Metamorphosis,' my favorite book in high school," she says. "This idea of transformation. Outside of just being a mother, the loss of identity, the isolation, those were things that spoke to me so deeply.

"I struggled after my daughter was born," says Adams. "I definitely was not one of those women that bounced right back. I think that's a really common experience.

Performance

Adams, the six-time Oscar nominee, gives a performance without a hint of vanity. She growls. She eats meatloaf like she's in a pie-eating contest. She runs around on all fours.

"You didn't blink," Heller says, admiringly.

Adams shrugs. That's how her family sees her around the house, she says, though not the running on all fours bit. "I mean," Adams adds, "watching it is a different story

Many of Heller's favorite, most cathartic scenes to write came from the kind of passive-aggressive exchanges that can happen in a relationship, especially one tested by the pressures of child-rearing and the inequities that can arise between parents.

"The thing is, you can be in a very equitable relationship, then the moment you have kids, even in an equitable relationship, suddenly gender roles peek their way out," Heller says. "My husband and I were together for, like, 14 years before we had kids. So it was shocking to suddenly find ourselves falling into gender roles we had never been in before.'

There are delightfully cutting observations laced through "Nightbitch" that might serve as a wake-up call to plenty of fathers. As much as many women will cheer Heller's film, men - horrified or not - may be its best audience. The dad in the film often appears useless,

even when it comes to making coffee.

"Jorma would read scenes from the movie and be like, 'F--- you, that's really rude. I know how to make coffee," Heller says, laughing.

"It's funny, I didn't remember the bit about the coffee until I watched it again. Darren (Le Gallo, Adams' husband) and I literally had a conversation this summer. He was like, 'How did you get the coffee machine to work?" Adams adds. "I was like, 'If I can figure it out, you can figure it out."

Early on, Heller and Adams began to get the sense that they had tapped into something. Heller called it "an invisible experience" at the Toronto International Film Festival premiere.

"It started on set with crew members coming up to us," Adams says. "People kept saying, 'This is a little too on the nose. I really see myself in this."

"I first shared the script with a lot of other mothers and women who I trusted, and they all thought it was hilarious," says Heller. "Then I started sharing it with my husband and Brandon (Trost), our cinematographer, or other male friends who were like, 'This scared the s--- out of me.'

"Nightbitch" - Heller says she still loves saying the title - will open in theaters just weeks after a US presidential election where women's rights are at the forefront.

"Women's bodies are being attacked. Freedom of choice is being attacked. It's a very volatile moment for women," says Heller. "Inevitably making a movie that I don't think we even thought of as radically feminist in any way - it's just about where we are in our lives, in our bodies, and we don't think our own bodies are taboo."

Adams, who starred in the movie adaptation of J.D. Vance's "Hillbilly Elegy" years before Vance was the Republican nominee for vice president, says she's more hopeful. She made "Nightbitch," she says, for her daughter.

"It's not a surprise but I really always try to find a celebration in a moment that can be challenging. My daughter is going to be voting in four years. 



Memorable voice of Darth Vader and 'Lion King'

James Earl Jones dies at 93

NEW YORK, Sept 10, (AP): James Earl Jones, who overcame racial prejudice and a severe stutter to become a celebrated icon of stage and screen eventually lending his deep, command-ing voice to CNN, "The Lion King" and Darth Vader - has died. He was 93.

His agent, Barry McPherson, confirmed Jones died Monday morning at home in New York's Hudson Valley region. The cause was not immediately clear.

The pioneering Jones, who in 1965 became one of the first African American actors in a continuing role on a daytime drama ("As the World Turns") and worked deep into his 80s, won two Emmys, a Golden Globe, two Tony Awards, a Grammy, the National Medal of Arts and the Kennedy Center

Single of the year is awarded to the artist, producer and mix engineers; song of the year is given to the songwriters.

Ahead of the nominations announcement, some fans speculated that Beyoncé, whose landmark country-and-then-some reclamation "Cowboy Carter" was released during the eligibility window, could receive a nomination at the 2024 CMAs. She did not.

Earlier this year, the album hit No. 1 on the Billboard country albums chart, making her the first Black woman to top the chart since its 1964 inception.

The album was five years in the making, a direct result of what Beyoncé has called "an experience that I had years ago where I did not feel welcomed ... and it was very clear that I wasn't," most likely a reference to a 2016 CMAs performance that resulted in racist backlash.

The CMA Awards are nominated and voted on by members of the Country Music Association, which includes music executives, artists, publicists, songwriters and other industry professionals.

Wallen is followed by both Cody Johnson, who is also nominated in the male vocalist category for the third year in a row, and 7-time male vocalist of the year winner, Stapleton.

Stapleton and Johnson have five nominations each. But Stapleton could take home seven trophies, should he sweep his categories.

Stapleton is both an artist and producer on "White Horse," up for single of the year, and "Higher," up for album of the year.

At the Country Music Awards, production credits are not counted as separate nominations, although they are factored into trophy counts.

First-time nominee Post Malone and Wilson, last year's entertainer of the year winner, are tied with four nominations.

In a brief opening monologue before the gameplay began, Seacrest acknowledged Sajak's impact as host and his retirement at the end of the 41st season. (AP)

LOS ANGELES: Kendrick Lamar will pop out on the NFL's biggest stage next year: The Grammy winner will headline the Apple Music Super Bowl Halftime Show in New Orleans.

The NFL, Apple Music and Roc Nation announced Sunday that Lamar would lead the halftime festivities from the Caesars Superdome on Feb. 9. The rap megastar, who has won 17 Grammys, said he's looking forward to bringing hip-hop to the NFL's championship game, where he performed as a guest artist with Dr. Dre and Snoop Dogg in

2022. "Rap music is still the most impactful genre to date," Lamar said in a statement. "And I'll be there to remind the world

why. They got the right one." Lamar has experienced massive success since his debut album "good kid, m.A.A.d city" in 2012. Since then, he's accumulated 17 Grammy wins and became the first non-classical, non-jazz musician to win a Pulitzer Prize for his 2017 album "DAMN." (AP)

He cut an elegant figure late in life, with a wry sense of humor and a ferocious work habit. In 2015, he arrived at rehearsals for a Broadway run of "The Gin Game" having already memorized the play and with notebooks filled with comments from the creative team. He said he was always in service of the work.

"The need to storytell has always been with us," he told The Associated Press then. "I think it first happened around campfires when the man came home and told his family he got the bear, the bear didn't get him."

Jones created such memorable film roles as the reclusive writer coaxed back into the spotlight in "Field of Dreams," the boxer Jack Johnson in the stage and screen hit "The Great White Hope," the writer Alex Haley in "Roots: The Next Generation" and a South African minister in "Cry, the Beloved Country."

He was also a sought-after voice actor, expressing the villainy of Darth Vader ("No, I am your father," commonly misremembered as "Luke, I am your father"), as well as the benign dignity of King Mufasa in both the 1994 and 2019 versions of Disney's "The Lion King" and announcing "This is CNN" during station breaks. He won a 1977 Grammy for his performance on the "Great American Documents" audiobook.

Jones made his Broadway debut in 1958's "Sunrise At Campobello" and would win his two Tony Awards for "The Great White Hope" (1969) and "Fences" (1987). He also was nominated for "On Golden Pond" (2005) and "Gore Vidal's The Best Man" (2012). He was celebrated for his command of Shakespeare and Athol Fugard alike. More recent Broadway appearances include "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof," "Driving Miss Daisy," "The Iceman Cometh," and "You Can't Take It With You."

As a rising stage and television actor, he performed with the New York Shakespeare Festival Theater in "Oth-ello," "Macbeth" and "King Lear" and in off-Broadway plays.

Jones was born by the light of an oil lamp in a shack in Arkabutla, Mississippi, on Jan. 17, 1931. His father, Robert Earl Jones, had deserted his wife before the baby's arrival to pursue life as a boxer and, later, an actor.

When Jones was 6, his mother took him to her parents' farm near Manistee, Michigan. His grandparents adopted the boy and raised him.

"A world ended for me, the safe world of childhood," Jones wrote in his autobiography, "Voices and Si-lences." "The move from Mississippi to Michigan was supposed to be a glorious event. For me it was a heartbreak, and not long after, I began to stutter."

Too embarrassed to speak, he remained virtually mute for years, communicating with teachers and fellow students with handwritten notes. A sympathetic high school teacher, Don-

with "The Great White Hope." Howard Sackler's Pulitzer Prize-winning Broadway play depicted the struggles of Jack Johnson, the first Black heavyweight boxing champion, amid the racism of early 20th-century America. In 1972, Jones repeated his role in the movie version and was nominated for an Academy Award as best actor.

Jones' two wives were also actors. He married Julienne Marie Hendricks in 1967. After their divorce, he married Cecilia Hart, best known for her role as Stacey Erickson in the CBS police drama "Paris," in 1982. (She died in 2016.) They had a son, Flynn Earl, born in 1983.

In 2022, the Cort Theatre on Broadway was renamed after Jones, with a ceremony that included Norm Lewis singing "Go the Distance," Brian Stokes Mitchell singing "Make Them Hear You" and words from Mayor Eric Adams, Samuel L. Jackson and LaTanya Richardson Jackson.

"You can't think of an artist that has served America more," director Kenny Leon told the AP. "It's like it seems like a small act, but it's a huge action. It's something we can look up and see that's tangible.'

Citing his stutter as one of the reasons he wasn't a political activist, Jones nonetheless hoped his art could change minds

Kuwait achieves landmark in organ transplants

Kuwait conducts first successful kidney swap between families

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10: In a remarkable medical achievement, Kuwait's Ministry of Health announced the success of the country's first kidney transplant exchange between families, marking a new milestone in its organ transplantation services, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

This breakthrough coincides with the launch of the National Kidney Transplant Exchange Program, a pioneering initiative designed to improve the chances for patients in need of kidney transplants by expanding the pool of potential donors.

Dr. Šaja Šorour, Head of the Organ Transplantation Department at Jaber Hospital, explained that kidney transplants through exchange offer a solution for patients who have a willing relative donor but face compatibility issues due to immune system mismatch or differing blood types.

The exchange process involves swapping donors between two families facing similar challenges. In such cases, a donor from the first family gives a kidney to the patient in the second family, while the second family's donor gives a kidney to the patient in the first family.

This innovative approach increases the likelihood of successful transplants for everyone involved. This achievement is part of the Ministry of Health's broader strategy to enhance organ transplant services in Kuwait.

According to Dr. Sorour, the new program is expected to reduce waiting times and improve the success rates of transplants, reflecting Kuwait's commitment to providing toptier healthcare and advanced treatment options for patients.

Dr. Nada Al-Shatti, Head of the Immunology Unit and Tissue Matching Laboratory at the Yaqoub Behbehani Center for Bone Marrow Transplantation, emphasized the significance of this development.

SpaceX rockets billionaire on first private spacewalk

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., Sept 10, (AP): A daredevil billionaire rocketed back into orbit Tuesday, aiming to perform the first private spacewalk and venture farther than anyone since NASA's Apollo moonshots.

Unlike his previous chartered flight, tech entrepreneur Jared Isaacman shared the cost with SpaceX this time around, which included developing and testing brand new spacesuits to see how they'll hold up in the harsh vacuum.

If all goes as planned, it will be the first time private citizens conduct a spacewalk, but they won't venture away from the capsule. Considered one of the riskiest parts of spaceflight, spacewalks have been the sole realm of professional astronauts since the former Soviet Union popped open the hatch in 1965, closely followed by the US. Today, they are routinely done at the International Space Station.

Isaacman, along with a pair of SpaceX engineers and a former Air Force Thunderbirds pilot, launched before dawn aboard a SpaceX Falcon 9 rocket from Florida. The spacewalk

NASA okays Jupiter moon ocean study

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., Sept 10, (AP): NASA on Monday approved next month's launch to Jupiter's moon Europa after reviewing the spacecraft's ability to withstand the intense radiation there.

Questions about the reliability of the transistors on the Europa Clipper spacecraft arose earlier this year after similar problems cropped up elsewhere. With the tight launch window looming, NASA rushed to conduct tests to verify that the electronic parts could survive the \$5 billion mission to determine whether the suspected ocean beneath Europa's icy crust might be suitable for life.

Liftoff remains scheduled for Oct. 10 aboard a SpaceX Falcon Heavy rocket. NASA has three weeks to launch the spacecraft before standing down for more than a year to await another proper planetary alignment; the spacecraft needs to swing past Mars and then Earth for gravity assists.

FDA rule ensures women have more information after cancer screenings

The Food and Drug Administration implemented a rule to go into effect on Sept. 10, 2024, requiring mammography facilities to notify women about their breast density. The goal is to ensure that women nationwide are informed about the risks of breast density, advised that other imaging tests might help find cancers and urged to talk with their doctors about next steps based on their individual situation.

The FDA originally issued the rule on March 10, 2023, but extended the implementation date to give mammography facilities additional time to adhere.

The Conversation US asked a team of experts in social science and patients' health behaviors, health policy, radiology and primary care and health services research to explain the FDA's new regulations about these health communications and what women should consider as they decide whether to pursue additional imaging tests, often called supplemental screening.

Breast density is categorized into four categories: fatty, scattered tissue, heterogeneously dense or extremely dense.

Study finds new method

'Bacterial therapy' could prevent colorectal cancer

LANZHOU, Sept 10, (Xinhua): Bacterial therapy could offer a promising new method for the prevention and treatment of colorectal cancer, according to a study carried out by Chinese researchers.

The recent study conducted by the School of Life Sciences at Lanzhou University in northwest China's Gansu Province, has revealed that the probiotic limosilactobacillus fermentum GR-3, derived from "Jiangshui," a traditional fermented food in northwestern China, demonstrates potential for promoting apoptosis in colon tumor cells and inhibiting their proliferation.

Professor Li Xiangkai, head of the research group and a professor at the university's School of Life Sciences, explained that studies have shown that colorectal cancer patients often experience an imbalance in their gut microbiota and a persistent state of peroxidation in tumor cells. Unlike conventional antioxidants, probiotics like Lactobacil-

lus GR-3 could specifically target the tumor microenvironment while also regulating intestinal flora.

Li's team successfully isolated Lactobacillus GR-3, a strain with strong antioxidant properties. In both hyperuricemia mouse models and clinical trials, this strain has shown promise in promoting uric acid degradation by modulating the gut microbiome. Building on these findings, the research team explored the potential of Lactobacillus GR-3 in preventing colorectal cancer through its effects on gut flora and the host immune system.

The results showed that Lactobacillus GR-3 significantly reduced the growth of colon tumors in drug-induced mice and demonstrated positive therapeutic effects. The strain not only lowered tumor mass but also improved the composition of intestinal microbial metabolites, promoted apoptosis in colon cancer cells, and inhibited their proliferation.

For instance, our research team found disproportionately more confusion and anxiety among women of color, those with low literacy and women for whom English was not their first language. Data shows that supplemental screening with ultrasound, MRI or contrast-enhanced mammography may detect additional cancers, but there are no prospective studies confirming that such additional screening saves more lives.

So far, there is no data from randomized clinical trials showing that supplemental breast MRIs, the most oftenrecommended supplemental screening, reduce death from breast cancer.

However, more early stage - but not late-stage - cancers are found with MRIs, which may require less extensive surgery and less chemotherapy.

Benefit

Various professional organizations and experts interpret the available data about supplemental screening differently, arriving at different conclusions and recommendations. An important consideration is the woman's individual level of risk, since emerging evidence suggests that women whose personal risk of developing breast cancer is high are most likely to benefit from supplemental screening.

Some organizations have concluded that current evidence is too limited to make a recommendation for supplemental screening, or they do not recommend routine use of supplemental screening for women based solely on breast density. Others recommend additional screening for women with extremely or heterogeneously dense breasts, even when their risk is at the intermediate level.

Because personal risk of breast cancer is a crucial consideration in deciding whether to undergo supplemental screening, women should understand their own risk.

The American College of Radiology recommends that all women undergo risk assessment by age 25 Women ar their providers can use risk calculators such as Tyrer-Cuzick, which is free and available online. Women should also understand that breast density is only one of several risks for breast cancer, and some of the others can be modified. Engaging in regular physical activity, maintaining a healthy weight, limiting alcohol use and eating a healthy diet rich in vegetables can all decrease breast cancer risk. Amid the debate about the benefits of supplemental breast screening, there is less discussion about its possible harms. Most common are false alarms: results that suggest a finding of cancer that require follow-up testing. Less commonly, a biopsy is needed, which may lead to short-term fear and anxiety, medical bills or potential complications from interventions. (AP)

But first the passengers are shooting for way beyond the International Space Station - an altitude of 870 miles (1,400 kilometers), which would surpass the Earth-lapping record set during NASA's Project Gemini in 1966. Only the 24 Apollo astronauts who flew to the moon have ventured farther.

The plan is to spend 10 hours at that height - filled with extreme radiation and riddled with debris - before reducing the oval-shaped orbit by half. Even at this lower 435 miles (700 kilometers), the orbit would eclipse the space station and even the Hubble Space Telescope, the highest shuttle astronauts flew.

All four wore SpaceX's spacewalking suits because the entire Dragon capsule will be depressurized for the two-hour spacewalk, exposing everyone to the dangerous environment.

But some states had no notification requirements, and among the others there were many inconsistencies that raised concerns by advocates, including women with dense breasts whose advanced cancer had not been detected on a mammogram.

Standard mammograms use X-rays to produce two-dimensional images of the breast. A newer type of mammography imaging called tomosynthesis produces 3D images, which find more cancers among women with dense breasts. So, researchers and doctors generally agree that women with dense breasts should undergo tomosynthesis screening when available.

There is still limited scientific evidence to guide recommendations for supplemental breast screening beyond standard mammography or tomosynthesis for women with dense breast

Agency voices serious concerns regarding protection of clean sport in the US

WADA calls for 'root and branch reforms' of US anti-doping system

BEIJING, Sept 10, (Xinhua): The World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) has voiced serious concerns regarding the protection of clean sport in the United States, calling for "root and branch reforms" in its anti-doping system.

In a letter to Tobie Smith, chair of the United States Anti-Doping Agency (USADA) board of directors, WADA highlighted that 90 percent of American athletes compete outside the jurisdiction of the World Anti-Doping Code, specifically those in professional leagues and college sports.

"Of primary concern is the matter of college sports, which account for so many athletes who go on to compete at the very highest levels, including the Olympic Games," WADA stated. "75 percent of U.S. athletes competing in Paris came through the collegiate system. That

is three-quarters of American Olympians who were at one time part of an elite system that operates far below the globally recognized clean sport standard." WADA also raised alarms about the broader impact, noting that the issue extends beyond just U.S. athletes. According to media reports, National Collegiate Athletics Association (NCAA) schools sent more than 1,000 former, current, and incoming student-athletes, representing over 100 countries and regions, to the Paris 2024 Olympic Games. Of those, 272 athletes won 330 medals for 26 countries and regions.

Given the number of top inter-national athletes competing in U.S. systems, WADA expressed concern for their welfare, performance, and health. "We are sure it horrifies you to know that top overseas athletes may be taking 'doping vacations' on U.S. soil." WADA further criticized US-

ADA's testing performance as inad-equate. In 2023, according to its own data, USADA collected just 7,773 samples from 3,011 athletes. WADA labeled this as a "disappointing number' given the country's population, the large pool of athletes, and the size of its Olympic team.

"The French National Anti-Doping Organization (NADO) collects significantly more samples than US-ADA, despite having a budget that is just a little more than one-third of UŠADA's. USADA also collected fewer samples than the NADOs in China, Russia, Italy, and Great Brit-ain," WADA pointed out. Additionally, WADA criticized

USADA for reportedly running a scheme that allowed certain athletes who committed serious doping offenses to go undercover and continue competing for several years, which WADA deemed unfair to

F1 car design great crosses over Newey to 'join' Aston Martin after leaving Red Bull team

SILVERSTONE, England, Sept 10, (AP): Formula 1's most influential car designer, Adrian Newey, is joining Aston Martin in March 2025 after leaving Red Bull, ending months of speculation over a backroom figure who seemed more in-demand than any driver.

Newey has spent nearly two decades with Red Bull and is widely credited with putting the team on its path to dominance in F1. Now he's joining a team that has big ambitions to chal-lenge for the title and the backing of

billionaire Lawrence Stroll - but no race wins yet.

Newey will arrive in his new role as "managing technical partner" in time to help shape how Aston Martin responds to the new F1 car regulations coming for 2026. He'll also be made a

shareholder in the team. Newey said he and Stroll got to know each other while training in the gym during F1 race weekends in Asia. Newey visited Aston Martin's new headquarters in June as Stroll closed in on a signing which the Canadian billionaire called "another demonstration of our ambition to build a Formula 1 team capable of fighting for world championships.

"You have to be honest with your-self and you have to keep yourself fresh and so I felt I needed a new chal-

lenge," Newey said. He added that Stroll's hands-on ap-proach as an owner was an "old-school model" that reminded him of his old bosses at teams like Williams and McLaren, which both won titles with Newey-designed cars in the 1990s.

"I was very flattered to have a lot of

Lawrence Stroll. Newey said he'd known Lance Stroll from his teenage years competing against Newey's son in Formula 3, and said Alonso seemed like "a kind of archenemy at times" when he was challenging for wins against Newey's previous employers.

Newey joined Red Bull in 2006 and helped the team win seven drivers' titles including the last three seasons with Verstappen - and six constructors' titles.

Red Bull said in May that its chief technical officer would be stepping back from F1 design and focus on a production car, the RB17, before leavng in the first quarter of 2025.

The announcement comes ahead of this week's Azerbaijan Grand Prix, and at a time when Red Bull's dominance

Uganda blanks Republic of Congo in Africa Cup of Nations qualifier

Cranes top group with victory

KAMPALA, Sept 10, (Xinhua): Uganda Cranes secured their first win in Group K of the CAF Africa **Cup of Nations (AFCON)** 2025 qualifiers, defeating the Republic of Congo 2-0 at the Nelson Mandela Stadium in Namboole, Kampala.

The Republic of Congo started the game strongly, making several attacking moves toward Uganda's goal, but it was Czech Republicbased player Abdu Aziz Kayondo who opened the scoring for the hosts after 21 minutes. He delivered a perfect curling shot from outside the box, beating goalkeeper Pavelh Ndzila.

In the second half, the Republic of Congo intensified their attacks, with skipper Silvere Ganvoula Mboussy

and Mons Rogeani Andre Bassouamina dominating play. However, Uganda's defense stood firm, repelling the opposition's efforts.

Jude Ssemugabi extended Uganda's lead in the 85th minute with a simple tap-in after receiving a well-placed pass from substitute Allan Okello.

The victory propels Uganda to the top of Group K with four points, following their 2-2 draw against South Africa in their opening match last Saturday. South Sudan, who lost 1-0 to the Republic of Congo in their first game, will host South Africa on

Tuesday in Juba.

Paul Put, the Uganda Cranes coach, praised his team's efforts and the fans' support. "I thank the players for the job well done and the fans for coming in large numbers to cheer the team," said Put.

Republic of Congo coach Isaac Ngata acknowledged his team's shortcomings. "We did not defend well and gave the opponents some space to score," Ngata told Xinhua.

Uganda last participated in the Africa Cup of Nations in 2019, held in Egypt.

Deadline approaching for appeals in the case that exonerated Sinner

ROME, Sept 10, (AP): Time is running out for appeals to be filed in the case that exonerated U.S. Open champion Jannik Sinner from doping.

The World Anti-Doping Agency and Nado Italia, Italy's anti-doping agency, likely have only a few more days to challenge the decision announced by the International Tennis Integrity Agency on Aug. 20.

There is a 21-day window to appeal that started when the parties received the decision. Any appeal would be filed to the Switzerland-based Court of Arbitration for Sport.

Sinner tested positive twice for an anabolic steroid in March but was not suspended because the ITIA determined the banned performanceenhancer entered his system unintentionally through a massage from his physiotherapist.

The doping case was kept secret until last month's announcement and the top-ranked Sinner went on to beat Taylor Fritz in the U.S. Open final on Sunday.

An appeal could jeopardize his U.S. Open title but Sinner and his legal team have provided detailed scientific evidence to show that his explanation is credible.

Sinner said after winning his second Grand Slam title that the months before his case was resolved were not easy.

"It was very difficult for me to enjoy in certain moments," he said, "so whoever knows me better, they know that something was wrong. But during this tournament, slowly I restarted to feel a little bit more how I am as a person."

While other players have expressed concern with how Sinner's case was kept secret, WADA and Nado Italia would likely be interested only in the scientific details.

TENNIS

An appeal verdict at CAS could come quickly - even within just a few months - if the parties agree to cooperate. At least that's how it worked in another high-profile doping case in tennis involving Maria Sharapova. Sharapova tested positive at the

Australian Open in January 2016 for the newly-banned heart medication meldonium. She was banned for two years in June that year by the International Tennis Federation.

The Russian star appealed to CAS, had an appeal hearing in New York before three judges that September. and four weeks later got the verdict that cut her ban to 15 months.

The entire process for Sharapova with CAS took just four months far shorter than most doping cases, which typically last about one year. The timeline can stall with the complexities of picking a judging panel, finding a hearing date and parties exchanging documents and evidence from expert witnesses.

Australia launches major athletic talent search ahead of Games

CANBERRA, Sept 10, (Xinhua): The Australian Institute of Sport (AIS) has launched its largest-ever search for athletic talent for the 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games in Brisbane.

The AIS, Australia's government-funded highperformance sports training center, on Tuesday announced it has partnered with all states and territories, Paralympics Australia and over 40 major sports for the Future Green and Gold campaign.

Under the campaign, the AIS will lead Australia's greatest talent search to identify the next generation of the country's sport champions and fast-track their development in the lead-up to Brisbane 2032.

"We have an ambitious goal to have the best Olympic and Paralympic team ever in Brisbane, and to achieve this, we need to significantly boost our current talent pool, in particular our para-athletes," Matti Clements, Executive General Manager of AIS Performance, said in a statement.

"Off the back of Australia's success in Paris, this is the best time to leverage that passion and encourage eligible Australians to put their names forward."

The search will focus on Australians aged 13-23 for Olympic sports and 13-plus for Paralympic sports.

Eligible participants will be invited to their closest clinic to have their strengths and skills measured. Those who show potential will undertake a trial with a recommended sport before potentially being offered a position in a Talent Development Program. Current athletes will also be offered the opportu-

nity to transition to a different sport.

Brisbane, the capital of the northeastern state of Queensland, was awarded hosting rights for the 2032 Summer Olympics and Paralympics in 2021 It will mark the third time the Olympics have been held in Australia after Melbourne in 1956 and Sydney in 2000.

In May, the federal government committed 249.7 million Australian dollars (166.1 million U.S. dollars) to upgrade AIS facilities in Canberra ahead of the 2032 games.

In August, the AIS said it would double the number of Australia's Paralympic coaches in the lead-up to 2032.

Toyota likely to keep its Paralympic Games sponsorship

Top Olympic sponsor Panasonic ending contract with IOC

TOKYO, Sept 10, (AP): Olympic sponsor Panasonic is terminating its contract with the IOC at the end of the year, the company said in a statement Tuesday.

Panasonic is one of 15 companies that are so-called TOP sponsors for the International Olympic Committee. It's not known the value of the Panasonic sponsorship, but sponsors contribute more than \$2 billion in a four-year cycle to the IOC.

In a statement, Panasonic said it became an IOC sponsor in 1987 and expanded to the Paralympics in 2014. It did not make clear why it was changing course and said only that is was related to continual "reviews how sponsorship should evolve."


Two other Japanese companies are also among the IOC's 15 leading sponsors. Toyota, which for several months has been reportedly ready to end its contract, was contacted Tuesday by The Associated Press but offered no new information.

"Toyota has been supporting the Olympic and Paralympic movements since 2015 and continues to do so," Toyota said in a statement. "No announcement to suggest otherwise has been made by Toyota."

Japanese sponsors seem to have turned away from the Olympics, likely related to the one-year delay in holding the 2020 Tokyo Olympics. The COVID-19 delay reduced sponsors' visibility with no fans allowed to attend competition venues, ran up the costs, and unearthed myriad corruption scandals around the Games.

Tiremaker Bridgestone told AP "nothing has been decided."

Toyota had a contact valued at \$835 million - reported to be the IOC's largest when it was an-

nounced in 2015. It included four Olympics beginning with the Pyeongchang 2018 Winter Games in South Korea and ran through the just-completed Paris Olympics and Paralympics.

Reports in Japan suggest Toyota may keep its Paralympic Olympic sponsorship.

sponsorship. The IOC TOP sponsors are: ABInBev, Airbnb, Alibaba, Allianz, Atos, Bridgestone, Coca-Cola, Deloitte, Intel, Omega, Panasonic, P&G, Samsung, Toyoto, and Visa.

In a report several months ago by the Japanese news agency Kyodo, unnamed sources said Toyota was unhappy with how the IOC uses sponsorship money. It said the money was "not used effectively to support athletes and promote sports."

OLYMPICS

Japan was once a major font of revenue, but increasingly the IOC has sought out sponsors from China, with increasing interest from the Middle East and India.

"We would love to welcome a first new TOP sponsor from India and I am sure that this is going to happen very, very soon," the IOC's marketing director, Anne-Sophie Voumard, said last month at the Paris Olympics.

"It's a very, very dynamic program," Voumard said on Aug. 7 of the TOP slate, adding "partners come and go depending on their business strategy."

Japan officially spent \$13 billion on the Tokyo Olympics, at least half of which was public money. A government audit suggested the real cost was twice that. The IOC contribution was about \$1.8 billion.

The Tokyo Games were mired in corruption scandals linked to local sponsorships and the awarding of contracts. Dentsu Inc, the huge Japanese marketing and public relations company, was the marketing arm of the Tokyo Olympics and raised a record-\$3.3 billion in local sponsorship money. This is separate from TOP sponsors.

French prosecutors also looked into alleged vote-buying in the IOC's decision in 2013 to pick Tokyo as the host for the 2020 Summer Games.

The IOC had income of \$7.6 billion in the last four-year cycle ending with the Tokyo Games. Figures have not been released yet for the cycle ending with the Paris Olympics.

The IOC's TOP sponsors paid over \$2 billion in that period. The figure is expected to reach \$3 billion in the next cycle.

Haaland late goal secures Norway victory

GENEVA, Sept 10, (AP): Even after leaving star forward Kylian Mbappé on the bench, France handed Belgium yet another loss in the Nations League.

Two of Mbappé's former teammates at Paris Saint-Germain, Randal Kolo Muani and Ousmane Dembélé, struck with powerful shots on either side of halftime in a 2-0 win in Lyon.

The latest win helped France make up ground in the top-tier Nations League group after losing to Italy 3-1 in Paris on Friday. Italy beat Israel 2-1 with goals from Davide Frattesi and Moise Kean and leads the four-team group.

Match-fixing and bribery cases uncovered

China's Football Association bans 43 for life after corruption investigation

DALIAN, China, Sept 10, (AP): China's Football Association has banned 43 people for life over allegations of match-fixing and other forms of corruption in the latest effort to weed out graft in the country's notoriously underperforming team sport. The official Xinhua News Agency on Tuesday reported that Zhang Xiaopeng, a top police official, attended a news conference at Dalian to release details of a "two-year investigation that uncovered a series of online gambling, match-fixing and bribery cases."

England calls up Carse and Cox

LONDON, Sept 10, (AP): England dropped batter Dan Lawrence and called up uncapped seam bowler Brydon Carse, weeks after he completed a ban for breaching betting violations, for the three-match test tour of Pakistan in October.

England's 17-man squad was announced on Tuesday and included opener Zak Crawley and captain Ben Stokes, who both missed the recent series against Sri Lanka because of finger and hamstring injuries, respectively.

CRICKET

Lawrence played as a makeshift opener against the Sri Lankans in Crawley's absence but failed to impress, with his highest score being 35. Jordan Cox, who is uncapped at test level and will play for England for the first time in the upcoming white-ball matches against Australia, replaced Lawrence.

Carse is the other uncapped player summoned after serving a threemonth ban for historical breaches of betting rules. The South Africa-born pacer was banned for 16 months, but 13 of them were suspended and he was free to resume playing on Aug. 28.

England will take three spinners to the subcontinent in Shoaib Bashir, Rehan Ahmed and Jack Leach, the latter two having been overlooked

for this summer's test series against the West Indies and Sri Lanka.

Josh Hull, the 20-year-old leftarmer who made his debut in the third test against Sri Lanka and is seen as the future of England's pace attack, was one of seven seamers in the squad. Among them is Chris Woakes, who was selected for an overseas test series for the first time since 2022.

The venues for the three-match series are yet to be confirmed. The England and Wales Cricket Board said an announcement is expected from the Pakistan Cricket Board this week.

Play in the one-off test between Afghanistan and New Zealand was abandoned without a ball bowled for a second consecutive day on Tuesday because of a wet outfield.

Day two developed in a similar fashion to Monday as the toss was first delayed while grounds staff worked to replace the top layer of the wet outfield with patches from practice areas. But it did not dry out sufficiently and an inspection was delayed again until 3 p.m. local time before play was called off again.

The toss is now scheduled for 9 a.m. Wednesday with play to begin 30 minutes later if the weather and conditions allow for it.

This is Afghanistan's third cricket test in 2024, following once-off matches against Ireland and Sri Lanka.

Afghanistan is staging the match near India's capital because it cannot host international cricket on home soil. The region has received incessant rainfall over the past week.

New Zealand is kicking off a three-month subcontinental tour that will involve a series against Afghanistan, two tests in Sri Lanka and then another three in India.

This first test between the two countries is not part of the 2025 World Test Championship.

Also, Erling Haaland scored a decisive 80th-minute goal in Norway's 2-1 win over Austria, and Slovenia star Benjamin Šeško scored a hat trick in a 3-0 win over Kazakhstan. Haaland and Šeško once were clubmates in Austria at Salzburg.

Mbappé was rested from the start despite France seeking to avoid a third straight loss, two months after a European Championship semifinals exit against eventual title winner Spain.

Real Madrid's new star had little preseason preparation after Euro 2024 and played a full game against Italy. He was eased in against Belgium by coach Didier Deschamps, who sent on his captain in the 67th minute to replace Kolo Muani.

France extended its winning run over Belgium to four games in the Mbappé era. Starting in the 2018 World Cup semifinals, Les Bleus also eliminated Belgium in the 2021 Nations League semifinals and in the Euro 2024 round of 16.

Monday's game was 43 years to the day since France lost a competition game against Belgium, in 1981 in Brussels in a World Cup qualifier.

Belgium started with fierce intent and France survived a wave of early attacks in an increasingly testy atmosphere. Belgium forward Lois Openda was at the heart of most of the action and confrontations.

"Belgium created plenty of problems for us, especially in the first 25 minutes," Deschamps acknowledged.

France led in the 30th when Kolo Muani lashed in a shot from close range after goalkeeper Koen Casteels pushed out a weak bouncing effort from Dembélé.

Turkey leads its second-tier group from Wales on goal difference with both on four points after wins.

Kerem Aktürkoğlu scored a hat trick for Turkey, starting in the second minute, in a 3-1 result over Iceland just days after his move from Galatasaray to Benfica restored his chance to play in the Champions League this season.

Wales scored twice in the first three minutes in Montenegro and hung on for a rain-soaked 2-1 win. The second goal was a dipping shot from 25 meters by Harry Wilson. China was No. 87 in the latest FIFA world rankings for men's national teams, just below Curaçao (population 150,000), and just above Equatorial Guinea (1.7 million).

On a night for early goals, Romania took a fourth-minute lead in a 3-1 win against Lithuania in thirdtier Group 2. In the same group, it took Kosovo until the ninth minute to open the scoring in Cyprus, and Vedat Muriqi also added a second soon after in a 4-0 win.

Cyprus faces a possible disciplinary case from UEFA after images circulated of fans displaying a pro-Serbia political banner. Cyprus does not recognize Kosovo's declaration of independence in 2008 from Serbia.

Kuwait powers through to T20 Cricket World Cup qualifiers

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 10: In a pivotal clash during the ICC T20 World Cup Sub Regional Qualifiers A, Kuwait faced Hong Kong China in a match that saw fluctuating fortunes before being interrupted by heavy rain. Captain Aslam of Kuwait opted to bowl first after winning the toss, and his bowlers delivered in spades. Kong China's bowlers wasted no time in putting them under pressure. With a fiery and disciplined start, Hong Kong China's bowlers struck early blows, reducing Kuwait to 11 for 2 within

Last-gasp Saudi Arabia edges China

Australia held to 0-0 draw by Indonesia, Qatar earns point in Pyongyang

JAKARTA, Indonesia, Sept 10, (AP): Australia's stuttering start to the third round of World Cup qualifying hit another bump Tuesday with a 0-0 draw against Indonesia in Jakarta.

The result follows a 1-0 loss at home to Bahrain last week and leaves the Socceroos still without a goal in Group C as they aim for a sixth successive World Cup appearance.

Australia had 20 shots but was unable to convert and silence the 78,000 home fans at the Gelora Bung Karno Stadium

"Vastly improved performance and the boys showed that," Australia coach Graham Arnold said. "But very disappointed. How many chances do we create? How many chances do we get? It has been a common theme for over a year.

Australia still moved one point ahead of China, which fell to a lastminute 2-1 loss to Saudi Arabia in Dalian despite taking an early lead and then playing most of the match against 10 men.

China took the lead from a corner in the 14th minute when Saudi Arabia's Ali Lajimi put the ball into his own net, and the visitors then went a man down five minutes later when Mohamed Kanno was sent off for kicking out at Jiang Shenglong.

But a bad week for Chinese soccer - which saw China lose 7-0 to Japan last week and the country's Football Association ban 43 people for life over allegations of match-fixing and other forms of corruption - only got worse.

Defender Hasan Kadesh helped Saudi Arabia turn the game around as he first equalized seven minutes before the break by heading home a corner for his first international goal and then added a second in the 90th to give Roberto Mancini's team a vital win to stay on course for a seventh World Cup appearance.

The 18 teams in the third round of

Labrune gets another 4-yr term

PARIS, Sept 10, (AP): French league president Vincent Labrune was re-elected Tuesday to another four-year term with an overwhelming majority.

The league said Labrune, who was formerly club president of nine-time French champion Marseille, received strong support from the board and was then elected by the general assembly in the first round of ballots with 85.67% percent of the votes.

Labrune faced criticism in recent months over the handling of the league's TV rights.

Following the Mediapro collapse four years ago, the league hoped it could get up to 1 billion euros (\$1.1 billion) per year from the sale of broadcasting rights for 2024-29 but had to lower its target. In the end, the league settled for 500 million euros per year after sealing a late deal with British streaming platform DAZN and BeIN Sports.

Kuwait powerboat team secures **3rd at UIM World Championship**

LONDON, Sept 10, (KUNA): Kuwait's national powerboat team secured third place at the Powerboat World Championship, organized by the Union Internationale Motonautique (UIM) in Plymouth, United Kingdom, competing across two categories.

In the B 300-horsepower category, the Kuwaiti team, led by world champion Bader Al-Dousari and his co-pilot Mohammed Al-Essayie, claimed third place. Meanwhile, in the P 150-horsepower category, the duo of Khaled Karam and Adel Al-Sharida also achieved third place, with their teammates Nasser Al-Khadhra and Mishaal Al-Misbah finishing fifth in the final round.

The head of Kuwait's delegation, Ali Al-Shamali, expressed pride in the team's accomplishments in a statement to KUNA. He noted that the team competed in the B category with their boat, "Raheeb 17," powered by a 300-horsepower engine and piloted by 2023 world champion Bader Al-Dousari alongside Mohammed Al-Essayie. The

team earned two silver medals on the first two days of the event, culminating in a third-place overall finish.

Al-Shamali explained that an accident during the second round of the championship, held in Belgium in June, affected the team's chances of retaining their world champion title. However, their strong performance in the first round in Spain, where they earned two silver medals in April, allowed them to accumulate enough points for the overall bronze.

In the P 150-horsepower singleengine category, Kuwait's "Raheeb 171," piloted by Khaled Karam and Adel Al-Sharida, secured second and fourth place during the Spanish round in April. They went on to win first place in Belgium and finished third and fourth in the final round in Plymouth, ultimately securing third place overall and a bronze medal.

A third Kuwaiti boat, competing for the first time, finished fifth overall in the P 150-horsepower category, piloted by Al-Khadhra and Al-Misbah.
