Kuwait, IAEA celebrate 6 decades of relations

VIENNA, Sept 19, (KUNA): Kuwait and the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) are celebrating 60 years of diplomatic relations

Thursday at the IAEA headquarters in Vienna.
This event, hosted by IAEA Director General Rafael Grossi and Kuwait's Ambassador to Austria Talal Al-Fassam, coincides with the 68th annual IAEA General Conference, which began on Monday at the United Nations Office in Vienna and will conclude tomorrow, Friday.

The celebration, scheduled for Thursday afternoon, will highlight the achievements of the past six decades, covering all areas of technical coopera-



The event, attended by numerous Arab and for-

eign ambassadors and international officials, will begin with a welcoming speech from Al-Fassam, followed by addresses from Grossi and Acting Director General of the Kuwait Institute for Scientific Research (KISR) Dr. Mashaan Al-Otaibi, and National Liaison Officer (NLO) for IAEA Dr. Nader Al-Awadi, will give a brief presentation on the long-standing cooperation between Kuwait and the agency.

Additionally, a book will be launched, reflecting on the 60-year partnership and providing an analytical review of current trends, challenges, and future prospects in utilizing nuclear energy for sustainable development.

The ceremony will conclude with an exchange of commemorative gifts and group photos.

Kuwait's cooperation with IAEA has been significant, particularly in the responsible use of nuclear technologies, contributing to Kuwait's scientific and technological development.

Over the past 60 years, Kuwait has supported

Al-Huwailah pushes for plan to protect families

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19: Minister of Social, Family and Childhood Affairs and Chairperson of the Supreme Council for Family Affairs Dr. Amthal Al-Huwailah has emphasized the significance of formulating policies and strategies that guarantee the stability of the family and to stop acts of violence, particularly those affecting women and children.

Al-Huwailah made the statement at the recent meeting of the National Committee for Protection from Domestic Violence; with the representatives of civil society organizations, Supreme Council for Family Affairs, and ministries of Interior,

Health and Social Affairs in attendance. She covered a number of topics, such as the need to strengthen and coordinate the efforts of civil society organizations and government agencies to address domestic violence; while underscoring the need to overcome obstacles to the implementation of protection programs, and to take the necessary precautionary measures to safeguard and warn families about the risks of violence

In accordance with the accepted psychological and social standards and foundations, Al-Huwailah also adopted a series of programs designed to qualify employees in the protection centers managed by the Supreme Council for Family Affairs. The goal of these initiatives is to develop the

BEIRUT: The leader of Hezbollah on Thursday said this week's deadly attack on the Lebanon-based militant group's communications devices was a "severe blow" that crossed a "red line."

Hassan Nasrallah said the group is investigating how the two-day attack, which killed more than 30, wounded thousands and was widely believed to be carried out by Israel.

"Yes, we were subjected to a huge and severe blow," Nasrallah said. "The enemy crossed all boundaries and red lines," he added.

As usual, Nasrallah spoke by video from an undisclosed location. Hezbollah typically convenes a rally for supporters to watch his speeches on a big screen, but this time they did not. (AP)

MADRID: The visiting Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas on Thursday praised Spain's efforts within quarters of the European Union in support of the Palestinian cause namely the aspired settlement to establish two states according to relevant UN resolutions.

Abbas, talking to reporters outside the presidential palace in Madrid after meeting Spanish Prime Minister **Pedro Sanchez**, expressed gratitude to the nation for its recent recognition of the independent State of

Court cancels female officer appointments

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19: The Court of Appeals ruled to annul all administrative decisions regarding the appointment of the 13th batch of female officers, known as 'Specialized Officers', at Saad Al-Abdullah Academy for Security Sciences.

This decision affects a total of 190 female officers, with all its resulting implica-

Lawyer Saud Al-Barghash had filed the appeal on behalf of a Kuwaiti citizen who was denied entry into the course, that graduated in 2022.

After the ruling, Al-Barghash stated, "We are witnessing a historic ruling to-day. Following the Ministry of Interior's announcement of the opening of applications for Batch 13 in the Women's Police Institute at Saad Al-Abdullah Academy for Security Sciences, our client applied after ensuring she met all the general and specific conditions set by the Ministry.

She successfully passed all required tests, including medical, physical fitness, psychological, general knowledge, aptitude, and the personal interview.

Despite the decision by the Minister of Interior to accept all those who passed the tests and interviews, the plaintiff was shocked to find herself rejected, which prompted her to file a case against the negative administrative decision of not accepting her in Batch 13 of the Specialized Officers.

He explained that her exclusion came despite the constitutional legislator's commitment to ensuring equality before the law, equal opportunities, and non-discrimination among citizens, in line with the principles embedded in the Constitution.

He added, "While we have won the ruling in our favor, it pains us to see injustice and favoritism. Some are only deterred by the esteemed judiciary, which has always stood by the oppressed.'

'Hi-tech wins in modern-day warfare'

Kuwait, Gulf must boost cybersecurity

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19: While the shock still silences voices in the aftermath of the devastating event two days ago in Lebanon, where nearly 2,800 devices were detonated simultaneously, resulting in numerous deaths and injuries among Hezbollah members in what is now called the "Pager Raid," security and technology experts have shed light on the situation.

They emphasize that modern warfare no longer relies on traditional or even contemporary weapons, but rather the most dangerous weapons -- 'technological'. The victors in today's battles are those who possess the latest technologies, as new advancements emerge

Dr. Ahmed Al-Munais, a professor of computer science at Kuwait University, described the number of casualties among Hezbollah members as a shocking indication of Israeli intelligence's ability to penetrate security measures using advanced technology, particularly in the realm of cybersecurity.

Al-Munais explained that those who followed the operation believe the pagers were likely tampered with during manufacturing or transportation, with small explosive charges planted that could be "acti-

The presence of batteries heightened their destructive potential. He also noted the operation's political implications, highlighting that the Iranian ambassador

Nationality of 112 persons stripped

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19, (KUNA): The Supreme Committee to Investigate the Kuwaiti Citizenship held a meeting on Thursday under chairmanship of the First Deputy Prime Minister, Minister of Defense and Minster of Interior Sheikh Fahad Yousef Saud Al-Sabah, also the head of the commission.

The Ministry of Interior said in a statement that the committee decided to strip 112 individuals of the Kuwaiti citizenship, pending referral to the Cabinet. The statement noted that the Kuwaiti nationality would be withdrawn from one case as per Article 9 15/1959 of the Citizenship Law.

The statement also added that withdrawing the Kuwaiti nationality was in line with article 11 of the Kuwaiti Citizenship Law 15/1959 (12 cases). An identical measure would be taken according to the Provision 21 of the law (15/1959), for 58 case. Moreover, up to 41 individuals will be

stripped of the citizenship according to the Article 13 of the same law, issued the same year, in addition to its amendments.

Hot during day, warm at night: expert formed Kuwait News Agency (KUNA) that Thursday's forecast includes hot weather with northwesterly winds

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19, (KUNA): The Meteorological Department in Kuwait announced on Thursday that the country is currently experiencing the effects of the seasonal Indian depression, accompanied by light to moderate northwesterly to variable winds. As a result, the weather is expected to be hot during the day and warm at night.

Abdulaziz Al-Qarawi, Director of the Department, in-

ranging between 8 to 30 kilometers per hour, and temperatures expected to reach a high of 38 to 41 degrees Celsius. The sea conditions will be relatively calm with light to moderate waves ranging from 1 to 4 feet.

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19, (Agencies): The Kuwaiti Foreign Ministry on Thursday welcomed a resolution adopted by the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) with a majority of 124 votes during its 10th extraordinary session late Wednes-

Based on a previous ruling from the International Court of Justice (ICJ), the latest resolution has something to do with the legal impacts of the Israeli occupation forces' policies and practices in Palestinian territories, including East Jerusalem, and the illegal presence of the Israeli occupation there, the ministry said in a statement.

It commended international unanimity on this resolution as a significant step towards backing the Palestinian rights and finding a just solution based on the Arab Peace Initiative and relevant international legitimacy resolutions, and ensuring the Palestinian people's self-determination, including an independent statehood on the 1967 border with East Jerusalem as its capital.

The U.N. General Assembly strongly supported a nonbinding Palestinian resolution Wednesday demanding that Israel end its "unlawful presence" in Gaza and the occupied West Bank within a year.

Women's Social and Cultural Society organizes first 'Brief' session

'My Paper' aims to strengthen Kuwait's efforts to legally empower women

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19: Lulwa Al-Mulla, the Chair of the Board of Directors of the Women's Social and Cultural Society, says the "My Paper" project aims to strengthen Kuwait's efforts to legally empower women and inform them of their rights as outlined in the country's legislation and Constitution, and in accordance with its international obliga-

In a press statement issued during the first "Brief" discussion session organized by the society under the slogan "No right

is lost when demanding it" to discuss issues raised potentially amend some local laws, Al-Mulla said the project supports the initiatives of the UNDP Office in Kuwait to empower women in various development fields.



Al-Mulla

Al-Mulla explained that the selection of the society as a local partner for the project was intended to preserve its distinctive local character and serve as a long-term sustainability strategy. This decision was partly motivated by the project's remarkable success in six Arab countries, which encouraged Kuwait to adopt it as the first nation among Gulf Cooperation Council member states.

The project was submitted to the Supreme Family Council along with an integrated plan to build and operate shelters for abused women and girls.

The project is divided into four sections: women's rights in family and marriage, their rights to citizenship, nationality, and political participation, protection against violence, and enhancement of women's economic rights.

Empower

Meanwhile, Head of the "My Paper" project at the society Haifa Al-Mousa announced the launch of the "Brief" series. which will organize discussion sessions aimed at legally empowering women through the "My Paper" initiative.

She explained that "Brief 1" focused on the unfair laws affecting women that have been changed or abolished due to cases filed by women.

For instance, the first paragraph of Article 15 of Law No. 11/1968, which restricted a married woman's ability to obtain a passport without her husband's consent, was canceled after a woman affected by this law filed a case. Lawyer Adel Qurban successfully argued the case, resulting in the cancellation of the article and benefiting all women.

Lawyer Adel Qurban will be the keynote speaker at the first discussion panel "Brief 1" during which he will elaborate on the ruling he obtained for his client the woman who filed a lawsuit to annul the aforementioned article

In conclusion, Al-Mousa called on all women who were harmed by such laws and legislation to seek recourse through the Kuwaiti judiciary to annul or amend these laws.

Describing the judiciary as fair and just, she revealed that many laws have

been successfully annulled or amended due to Kuwaiti judicial rulings.

With over 40 years of legal experience, Lawyer Adel Qurban, who is a lawyer for both the Constitutional Court and the Court of Cassation, expressed his gratitude to the Women's Social and Cultural Society for selecting him as the keynote speaker for its first discussion session

He explained that the ruling he secured on behalf of his client resulted in the repeal of Article 15 of the Nationality and Passports Law, which required a married woman to obtain her husband's consent to secure a travel document.

This article was exploited as a tool by some men to control their wives and impose conditions on them.

The decision to repeal that article benefited all married women, as the rulings of the Constitutional Court are highly enforceable and the court has the authority to amend or repeal laws.

Regarding the reasons behind the revocation of Article 15, Lawyer Qurban explained that the revoked article conflicted with the provisions related to freedom of movement outlined in articles 29, 30, and 31 of the Kuwaiti Constitution. An individual cannot be restricted in their movement unless legally required, such as in cases of criminal charges or detention while awaiting trial.

The canceled article made a woman's freedom of movement contingent upon her husband's consent, which constituted a constitutional obstacle.

Litigation

The deliberations of the case took six months, a relatively reasonable timeframe considering the typically lengthy litigation process in Kuwait.

Regarding the most notable laws modified or overturned by court decisions to better represent women, Lawyer Qurban stated that the provision in the housing law that prohibits women from obtaining a housing document without the approval of the housing authority has been removed.

He explained that such unfair laws often allowed some husbands to exploit guardianship as a means of pressuring and humiliating women. Now, following a judicial ruling obtained by a client who was harmed by the previous law, women can secure a housing document without needing their husband's ap-

In his closing remarks, Lawyer Qurban listed several laws that need to be reviewed, particularly the one concerning the citizenship of children born to a Kuwaiti woman married to a non-Kuwaiti man. He highlighted a significant case that has not been previously discussed, which is the death of a Kuwaiti mother whose children are non-Kuwaiti and who owns a private home.

Under the current law, her non-Kuwaiti children are required to sell the property within one year of her death, as non-Kuwaitis are not entitled to own property according to housing regulations.

He indicated that there are many such cases where laws must be amended to ensure that the children of Kuwaiti women married to non-Kuwaiti men can remain in the country and are not forced to leave due to the severing of their connection to their deceased Kuwaiti mother.

Global indices mirror Kuwait's development in various sectors

Kuwait ranks 35th among 163 states in GPI in 2023: report

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19, (KUNA): International indices have shown the State of Kuwait's progress in various sectors thus bringing into the limelight the government's successful steps regarding economic and financial reforms.

The government rapid steps to achieve actual development at diverse levels and enhance its ranking in the eyes of the international quarters is seen in its 2024-2025 development scheme, inspired from the 2023 new Kuwait vision.

Its development plans aim at elevating its classification in the economic and administrative indexes, also related to transparency and integrity, and the highest form possible of progress.

According to a report released by the Secretariat General of the Supreme Council of Planning and Development the main indexes of the Kuwaiti economy between 2023 and 2024 made progress as compared to the previous period. Kuwait ranked 35th among 163 states in the Global Peace Index (GPI) in 2023, improving by four tanks as compared to 2022.

the Gender Gap (2023), Kuwait came in the 120th status among 146 countries and in the Financial Index, it was in the 82nd among 132 states.

In the Corruption Perceptions Index (2023), the report by the supreme council showed that Kuwait came 63rd among 180 countries and maintained its 69th point among 193 with respect of the Government AI (artificial intelligence) Readiness (2023.

Achievement

As to the Index of Economic Freedom (2024), it ranked 13th among 143 states and 49th among 193 in the Human Development Index (HDI).

For the second year in a row, Kuwait came top in the Global Communication and Information Technology Development Index (2024) released by the International Telecommunication Union (ITU), an achievement that would provide greater confidence for external investors, help in creating new jobs and boost expertise

Moreover, Kuwait ranked 37th at the international level for administrative development, according to the 2024 Global Competitiveness Index released by the International Institute for Management Development (IMD).

The index that measures competitiveness of 67 states is based on 335 sub-indices partly showing that the Kuwait Government has moved forward by four points in terms of efficiency.

Regarding the Global Infrastructure Index (GII), Kuwait moved forward by three points, ranking 46th. As to the Global Knowledge Index (2023), it came 44th improving by three points compared to the previous year.

The GKI assesses pre-university education, technological and vocational teaching, higher education, research and development, innovation, IT, communications, economy and empowerment environments.

Other international indexes that showed Kuwait's concrete progress in various realms was the Global Index on Investment Insurance where it came fourth at the Arab level and 41st at the international level (2023).

The Kuwaiti Government's 2024-2025 development plan aims at improving the country's status in global indices to be among the first 35 ones by 2035.

'From proposal to failure ... unpacking the Afia project'

"THE pensioners' insurance project – Afia – has undoubtedly been a major governmental blunder – one that came at a staggering cost and lacked a solid plan," columnist Asrar Hayat Jowhar wrote for Al-Qabas daily.

"Yet, the response to this blunder has only compounded the problem: the abrupt and unannounced suspension of Afia services for pensioners.

"To understand the issue better, I need to explain why I opposed the Afia insurance project and considered it a governmental misstep.
"With a ten-

lion Kuwaiti dinars, the project failed to deliver the expected results. It was poorly conceived, and its shortcomings cannot be overshadowed by the mere fact that it was a failed endeavor.

"For the same colossal amount, we could have built and managed two to three major public hospitals that could compete internationally, or six to eight specialized hospitals offering

top-tier healthcare.
"Instead, the government opted for the Afia insurance project, which proved to be a financial and operational miscalculation.

"Another reason for the project's failure and its classification as an unforgivable error is the apparent lack of thorough study and oversight.

"There was no effective monitoring of how the project was utilized, nor was there sufficient government control over hospital pricing and healthcare quality.

"Some healthcare providers have exploited the insurance scheme, inflating prices and delivering unnecessary treatments, all while the costs are absorbed by the scheme.

"However, the cancellation and suspension of the service whether the government plans to renew the contract with a different company or not, are unacceptable. Announcing the service's suspension suddenly, without prior notice, leaves retirees -- some of whom are in the midst of critical treatments -- stranded.

"If the government's intention is indeed to revoke the Afia Law, as some rumors suggest, then transparency and honesty with citizens are imperative.

"The government should have openly communicated its plans to cancel the law, which has proven to be ineffective and a waste of resources.

"Citizens should have been given adequate time to complete their treatments before the service was abruptly cut off. The original mistake was severe, but the handling of it has been "a mistake and a half"!

"The pressing question now is: Will hospitals be able to manage the sudden increase in patients?"

"With the commencement of the new school year, the Ministry of Interior, particularly the Public Security, Operations, and Traffic departments, demonstrated remarkable commitment under the guidance of the First Deputy Prime Minister, Minister of Defense and Minister of Interior Sheikh Fahd Al-Yousef, along with Lieutenant General Sheikh Salem Al-Nawaf, Major General Hamad Al-Munifi, and Major General Yousef Al-Khudah," columnist **Moham**med Al-Jalahma wrote for Al-Anba

"Their focused efforts were geared towards ensuring the safety and security of students and road users, as well as facilitating smooth traffic flow, especially around schools.

"The deployment was meticulously organized, aiming to enhance security and manage traffic effectively around educational institutions and their access routes. This involved deploying patrols on all main and secondary roads, addressing traffic congestion promptly, and implementing necessary legal measures for traffic viola-

"During my visit to Ahmadi Governorate on the first day of school, I observed Brigadier General Mohammed Ahmed Rajab, Director General of Ahmadi Security Directorate, actively overseeing the entry of students into schools and supervising the security

"His diligent efforts were mirrored by his colleagues across other Kuwaiti governorates and traffic monitoring

'The plan of the Ministry of Interior for the start of the school year involved comprehensive security coordination and a media campaign launched under the slogan 'With our determination, we achieve our dream'.

"This campaign was a collaborative effort involving the ministries of Interior, Education, Information, and the Government Communication Center.

"Despite these well-coordinated efforts, some roads experienced heavy traffic due to the high volume of vehicles at peak times -- something beyond the Ministry of Interior's control.

"As parents, our role is to support these initiatives by encouraging our children to use public transportation provided by schools and adhering to traffic regulations.

"It's crucial to avoid obstructing traffic by idling in front of schools unnecessarily and to cooperate with security personnel to ensure a smooth and safe school run."

"The devastating Israeli strike known as the "Pager War" resulted in the loss of several lives and left hundreds wounded. This happened at a time when the world was waiting for Iran's response to the killing of Ismail Haniyeh in Tehran," columnist By M. Adel Al-Jarallah Al Kharafi wrote for Al-Seyassah daily.

"This incident came as an unexpected shock. The Israeli intelligence used advanced technological methods to carry out its operation, thus adding new tactics to its extensive record.

"This approach to assassination using modern communication technologies sends a clear message that Israel, undeterred by the international community, can target anyone it chooses. This is evident from the string of highprofile assassinations, beginning with Soleimani, continuing with Haniyeh, and culminating in the "Pager" at-

"In this context, it is expected that Israel will escalate its assassination operations to unprecedented levels, with no apparent response to counter-act them. This situation leaves Arab citizens feeling anxious and confused. particularly concerning the future of stability in Lebanon and the Palestinian issue.

"The evolving dynamics of the Arab-Israeli conflict, along with Iran's involvement, have brought the prospects for peace in the region to a dangerous turning point, potentially jeopardizing the two-state solution. Are Arab countries prepared for such developments? Can they ensure the legitimate national rights of the Palestinians amidst these challenges?

"The official Arab response to the events in Gaza, including the recent assassinations, has largely been limited to denunciation and condemnation. Such reactions are unlikely to halt Israeli actions or lead to a just peace in the Middle East. It merely serves as an implicit acknowledgment of the status

"This dynamic places the governments of Islamic countries in a difficult position between the hammer of Israel's transgressions and anvil of public demand to end its criminal practices. This situation could have serious repercussions and conse-

Court fines two officials KD 3,000

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19: The Court of Appeals sentenced former MP Dr. Walid Al-Tabtabaei to two-year imprisonment with hard labor in the State Security case filed against him on charges of challenging the powers and rights of His Highness the Amir via his X account.

On June 24, the Criminal Court had sentenced him to four-year imprisonment with hard labor.

However, Al-Tabtabaei had denied all charges against him in the first session of his trial. He said, "The post for which he is being tried was fabricated by his opponents.

His brother Anwar Al-Tabtabaei explained that the bad health condition of his brother Walid had prevented him from attending his three trial sessions. His son had submitted a medical report on his condition to the court yesterday, but the judge decided to reserve the case for judgment. He felt very tired vesterday and his heart rate in after the dawn prayer. A group of doctors came to the hospital where he was admitted and conducted tests. They decided to discharge him from the hospital and transfer him in a wheelchair to the Ministry of Interior vehicle with the discharge paper. However, the officer returned him to the hospital after photographing the paper.

KD 3,000 fine upheld: The Court of Cassation upheld a ruling issued by a lower court which imposed a fine of KD 3,000 on an undersecretary and an Iranian correspondent who were accused of salary usurpation through fingerprint

Earlier, the Criminal Court had sentenced the undersecretary and the correspondent to seven-year imprisonment with hard labor, dismissed the undersecretary from his position, and imposed a fine of KD 113,000, after proving that the correspondent had falsely logged the attendance of the undersecretary using fake fingerprint molds. Also, the undersecretary had requested a COVID-19 frontliner bonus, which was granted even though he did not record any actual work performance.

10 injured in bus collision: Ten individuals, mostly of Asian nationality, sustained injuries when two passenger buses collided near Souk Mubarakiya Thursday morning. The injured individuals have been taken to Amiri Hospital for treat-

According to security sources, when the Operations Room of the Ministry of Interior received information about the accident near Safaat Square, police officers, an emergency medical team, and firefighters were quickly dispatched to the location.

Upon arrival, responders found that the accident had resulted in injuries to ten people, most of whom were Asians and one was an Egyptian.

Initial investigations indicate that one of the buses ran a red light due to a brake malfunction, which caused the collision. Police officers and firefighters worked to clear the buses from the road following the accident.

Citizen's house burgled: A citizen filed a report at Jahra Police Station that his house has been burgled and the culprit stole an undisclosed amount, official documents and a mobile phone, reports Al-Anba daily.

The citizen said he discovered that the suspect broke the lock in the back door of his house, entered his diwaniya and stole a bag containing the abovementioned

'Appeals' closes 7 real estate rental sections following new Decree 95/24

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19: Head of the Court of Appeals, Counselor Mohamed El-Rifai, decided to close seven real estate rental appeal sections following the issuance of Decree 95/2024, which

appeal sections following the issuance of Decree 95/2024, which stipulates "the General Court sections shall deal with rent-related appeals in an appellate capacity," reports Al-Qabas daily.

The daily obtained a copy of the decision stating that "Article Two of Decree-Law No. 15/2024 on amending some provisions of Decree-Law No. 35/1978 regarding real estate rent; which was published in the official gazette – Kuwait Al-Youm, stipulates the referral of pending cases in all sections at the Court of Appeals to the Court of First Instance, except those scheduled for ruling, provided the ruling is appropriated within a scheduled for ruling, provided the ruling is announced within a month of the issuance of this Decree-Law and after reviewing the list of rental appeals. This decision is in line with the authorization granted to us by the General Assembly of the court on June 10, 2024 when it was decided to close the first and second Capital Rent sections, first and second Hawally Rent sections, in addition to the Farwaniya, Ahmadi and Jahra sections.'

The decision also stipulates that the Book Administration, in coordination with the Technical Office, shall refer the appeals in progress in the sections subject to the first clause, which have not been decided until the date of the issuance of Decree No. 95/2024 on Sept15, 2024; to the Technical Office to take the necessary measures in order to refer them to the Court of First Instance in implementation of the aforementioned law.

As for the appeals scheduled for ruling in the sections subject to the first clause and the sessions for pronouncing the ruling after the date of issuance of the decree, the concerned sections shall issue the ruling as per their previous capacity within one month in implementation of Article Two of Decree-Law 95/2024.

Appeals that will be returned for pleading for any reason shall be referred to the Technical Office to take the necessary measures in accordance with the second clause of this decision, as well as to look into petitions to rectify material errors in the rulings issued by the concerned sections.

150,000 Lyrica pills, firearms seized

in stables in recent major drug bust

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19: The Criminal Security Sector in the Ministry of Interior, headed by Major General Hamed Al-Dawas, dealt a severe blow to drug dealers when securitymen raided two stables recently, reports Al-Anba daily.

One of these stables is located in the northern part of the country and belongs to a Border Security Sector officer with the rank of lieutenant. Around 150,000 Lyrica pills, a kilogram of hashish and four Kalashnikovs were found inside the

The other stable is also located in the north and it belongs to a Bedoun. The securitymen found 30,000 Lyrica pills, eight kilograms of shabu and four kilograms of marijuana in this stable.

Earlier, the daily reported about the case of the lieutenant who was promoted from the rank of deputy officer and entered the drug trafficking corps. The illegal substances confiscated include 13 kilograms of hashish, shabu and marijuana; in addition to 180,000 narcotic

The ministry issued two separate state-

ments regarding these cases. In one of the statements, it revealed that the Drug Control General Department (DCGD) at the Criminal Security Sector arrested a Kuwaiti and a jobless Bedoun after raiding a stable in the north. It confirmed that a large quantity of psychotropic substances and drugs were found in their possession --150,000 Lyrica and Captagon pills and one kilogram of hashish, as well as four firearms and ammunition.

In the other statement, the ministry disclosed that DCGD arrested a Bedoun for the possession of about 30,000 Lyrica pills, eight kilograms of shabu and four kilograms of marijuana. The Bedoun confessed that he owns the confiscated drugs for personal use and trafficking. The ministry confirmed the referral of the accused and the confiscated items to the Public Prosecution.

It added that the criminal securitymen are firm in dealing with drug dealers, calling on everyone to cooperate with the securitymen and report any negative phenomena through Emergency No. 112 and the Hotline of DCGD 1884141.

Sponsorship forgery

Female employee held

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19: A citizen submitted a complaint to the Public Prosecution immediately after finding out an expatriate employee was registered under his sponsorship without his knowledge, reports Al-Anba

The Residency Affairs Investigation Department at the Ministry of Interior conducted investigations, leading to the discovery of the illegal act of a female employee at a citizens service center who completed the transaction, and that she previously committed nine similar crimes, but managed to compromise with the informants.

The deputy public prosecutor ordered the detention of the female employee on charges of forgery and registering workers under the sponsorship of citizens without their knowledge in exchange for money.

According to a security source, the female employee denied the accusation in the initial investigations. The expatriate worker, who was registered under the citizen, was arrested, and he admitted that he paid an undisclosed amount to the female employee who completed the residency transaction for him. The female employee was re-investigated, during which the officers confronted her about the statement of the expatriate. She then confessed that she previously put several expatriates under the sponsorship of citizens without the latter's knowledge.

KFF shuts 35 establishments

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19, (KUNA): On Thursday, the Kuwait Fire Force (KFF) announced the closure of 35 shops and establishments across multiple governorates due to violations of fire safety regulations.

The KFF stated that the closures were a result of these businesses failing to secure the required fire-related licenses and not adhering to mandated safety and fire prevention standards. This action followed earlier warnings given to the establishments to correct their

228 cases reported in 2023

KCCC reveals lymphoma as among top cancer in Kuwait

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19: Director of the Hematology Department at Kuwait Cancer Control Center (KCCC) affiliated with the Ministry of Health and Chairman of Leukemia and Lymphoma Society Dr. Abdulaziz Hamada revealed that about 228 cases of lymphoma (lymph node cancer) were diagnosed in 2023, indicating most of the patients need chemotherapy while some need radiotherapy and antibodies cancer treatment, reports Al-Rai daily.

In a statement to Kuwait News Agency (KUNA) on the sidelines of the society's celebration of World Lym-phoma Awareness Day, which falls on Sept 15 of each year, Hamada explained that lymphoma is a common type of blood cancer. He said the central registry at KCCC listed it as the fourth most common tumor among males and the fifth among females from 2010 and 2019.

Moreover, Dr. Pandita's commitment extended beyond his regular duties. During the COVID-19 pandemic, despite his advanced age and health challenges, he remained actively involved in the fight against the virus, demonstrating profound

PAHW allocates 70% of South Saad Al-Abdullah housing plots

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19: The Public Authority for Housing Welfare (PAHW) has confirmed the distribution of 70 percent of the plots in South Saad Al-Abdullah Housing Project -- 16,643 out of 23,551 plots.

The newspaper obtained a copy of the statistics that the authority issued in August; revealing the allocation of 4,423 plots in the abovementioned housing project that consists of 957 housing units.

In a press statement, Deputy Director General of the Public Relations and Development Sector and official spokesperson of the authority Omar Al-Ruwaih stated that the concerned departments dealt with 37,356 transactions in August.

He said 26,000 housing related transactions were processed through the Sahel application; in addition to responding to the citizens' queries while transactions were followed up through the hotline -- more than

He disclosed the number of building permits issued to citizens in three housing projects reached 32,122 27,489 for Mutla'a Housing City plots; 3,237 for South Abdullah Al-Mubarak and 1,396 for South Khaitan.

He affirmed that the Implementation Sector in the authority completed 26.54 percent of South Sabah Al-Ahmad City project, stressing this is 14.79 percent ahead of the contractual completion rate. He added the South Saad Al-Abdullah project is also witnessing progress with a completion rate of 5.07 percent by the end of last month. He went on to say that the authority is closely monitoring the East Sabah Al-Ahmad project that consists of 1,184

On the allocation transactions, Al-Ruwaih indicated that plots in South Saad Al-Abdullah housing project were allocated to 4,423 citizens who submitted housing applications as at June 2007.

He continued saying that PAHW signed two contracts -- one for the establishment and maintenance of a center for girls in Sabah Al-Ahmad Residential City (Sector A) and the other for a similar center in Saad Al-Abdullah City (Ninth Sector).

The number of public buildings under construction reached 122 -- 68 in Mutla'a Residential City, 31 in South Abdullah Al-Mubarak, seven in East Sabah Al-Ahmad, one building in South Khaitan, one in Jaber Al-Ahmad City and 14 in Sabah Al-Ahmad City," he concluded.

The vote in the 193-member world body was 124-14, with 43 abstentions. Among those in opposition was the United States, Israel's closest ally.

The resolution was adopted as Israel's war against Hamas in Gaza approaches its first anniversary and as violence in the West Bank reaches new highs. Troubled efforts to broker a cease-fire deal in Gaza and are pressing ahead, with Secretary of State Antony Blinken meeting fellow mediators Wednesday in Egypt, even as attacks elsewhere in the region raise fears of escalating conflict in the Middle East. Riyad Mansour, the Palestinian U.N. ambassador, called the vote a turning point "in our struggle for free-

dom and justice.' "It sends a clear message that Israel's occupation must end as soon as

possible and that the Palestinian people's right to self-determination must be realized," he said. Israel's U.N. Ambassador, Danny

Danon, slammed the vote as "a shameful decision that backs the Palestinian Authority's diplomatic terrorism."

"Instead of marking the anniversary of the Oct. 7 massacre by condemning Hamas and calling for the release of all 101 of the remaining hostages, the General Assembly continues to dance to the music of the Palestinian Authority, which backs the Hamas murderers," Danon said.

While the resolution is not legally binding, the extent of its support reflects world opinion. There are no vetoes in the General Assembly, unlike in

the 15-member Security Council. The resolution also demands the withdrawal of all Israeli forces and the evacuation of settlers from the occupied Palestinian territories "without delay." And it urges countries to impose sanctions on those responsible for maintaining Israel's presence in the territories and halt arms exports to Israel if they're suspected of being used

In addition, the resolution calls for Israel to pay reparations to Palestinians for the damage caused by its occupation and urges countries to take steps to prevent trade or investments that maintain Israel's presence in the territories.

It comes in response to a ruling by the top United Nations court in July that said Israel's presence in the Palestinian territories is unlawful and must end.

In the sweeping condemnation of Israel's rule over the lands it captured during the 1967 war, the International Court of Justice said Israel had no right to sovereignty over the Palestinian territories and was violating international laws against acquiring the lands by force.

The court's opinion also is not legally binding. Nonetheless, the Palestinians drafted the resolution to try to implement the ruling.

The General Assembly's consideration of the resolution began Tuesday with Mansour stressing that any country that thinks the Palestinian people "will accept a life of servitude" - or that claims peace is possible without a just solution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict - is "not being realistic."

The solution remains an independent Palestinian state based on the 1967 borders, with East Jerusalem as its capital, living side by side in peace and security with Israel, he said.

U.S. Ambassador to the U.N. Linda Thomas Greenfield told reporters Tuesday that the resolution has "a significant number of flaws.'

She said it goes beyond the ICJ ruling and doesn't recognize that "Hamas is a terrorist organization" in control of Gaza or that Israel has a right to defend

"In our view, the resolution does not bring about tangible benefits across the board for the Palestinian people,' Thomas-Greenfield said. "I think it could complicate the situation on the ground, complicate what we're trying to do to end the conflict, and I think it impedes reinvigorating steps toward a two-state solution.'

exploded, underlining the involvement of Iranian interests.

Dr. Safaa Zaman, head of the Information Security Association and professor of computer science at Kuwait University, suggested that the explosion of pagers could have been executed through various methods, such as sending heat waves to the batteries or using specific software designed to target Hezbollah members.

Dr. Safaa explained that this technology has become incredibly frightening and complex, as it is hacked through extremely advanced techniques.

She pointed out that with modern technologies, any device can be hacked, even if it is not connected to the internet, as it can be accessed through a nearby internet network.

She stressed that in modern wars, those who possess advanced technological capabilities have the upper hand, and that both Israel and the United States have the technologies that enabled Israel to carry out this operation.

Dr. Zaman also warned that global technologies and applications could pose a significant threat to Arab countries, as these applications can easily hack into all kinds of information. She explained that mobile phones

can be detonated, noting that the same technology used to explode pager batteries can also be used to detonate mobile phones.

While the pager explosions were tragic, Dr. Zaman emphasized the importance of learning from this experi-

She called for increased awareness and cybersecurity protection in Kuwait and the Gulf countries, highlighting that more dangerous than device explosions is the hacking of state data through complex technologies. She stressed that the devices people carry

can be easily used for espionage. Cybersecurity expert Hoda Al-Kribani warned of the risks posed by all mobile phones and laptops, which can be detonated or used for eavesdropping in specific ways. She explained that even TV screens could be embedded with explosive materials, making them vulnerable to detonation via vi-

brations Al-Kribani stated that the pagers that exploded two days ago in Lebanon were part of a premeditated operation. She suggested that high-tech modifications were made to these devices, and the detonation command could have been sent via a drone or by software that raised the temperature of the pager batteries to extreme levels, triggering the explosion.

She highlighted that these devices had only been delivered to Hezbollah six months ago, and Israel was fully aware that the individuals using the pagers held highly sensitive positions. Retired Major General and security

expert Hamad Al-Suraye commented that this operation was of the highest intelligence caliber, executed with skill and precision by the Israeli entity, underscoring that current wars are technological in nature.

He revealed that the pagers that exploded, killing and injuring many Hezbollah members, were made in Taiwan. The Taiwanese government is now investigating whether the modifications to the pagers were made in Taiwan or elsewhere.

Al-Suraye explained that the operation specifically targeted the pagers, as Hezbollah members had abandoned using mobile phones, some of which had been previously compromised. He suggested that the operation confirms that there was an infiltration within Hezbollah's ranks, with some members recruited by Israel. He concluded by urging Kuwait to take every precaution against such operations and emphasized the need for vigilance within the Kuwaiti security apparatus.

Experts have provided a set of important tips and guidelines to protect yourself in case your phone or pager

battery explodes: - Inspect any new device before purchasing to ensure it hasn't been tam-

- Regularly monitor your phone to ensure it doesn't overheat.

- Avoid charging your phone or pager while sleeping to reduce the risk of overheating. - Let your phone cool down before

charging it again. - Use original charging equipment,

such as a USB-C port or Quick Charge. - Do not place your phone under your pillow while sleeping, as it can lead to overheating.

These scenarios suggest that attackers are using advanced knowledge of electromagnetic wave technology to target devices, requiring thorough investigations to determine the methods and technologies involved.

Major General Ashraf Fawzi, former Deputy Chief of Staff of the Egyptian Intelligence Service, told Al-Seyassah daily, that the recent Israeli operation was no coincidence, coming shortly after Israel thwarted an assassination attempt involving a 'Klimagor' explosive device planted by Hezbollah to target an Israeli security official.

In his statement, Fawzi explained that the operation marks a new phase in the ongoing conflict with Hezbollah. It underscores key field realities, including Israel's intention to "cool down" the front and send a clear message of its ability to strike Hezbollah effectively without incurring significant military costs or losses. At the same time, Fawzi emphasized that Israel felt the need to demonstrate its

superiority. Fawzi elaborated that Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's strategy involved a sophisticated security and cyber attack aimed at testing Hezbollah's logistical capabilities and disrupting its health and social infrastructure.

This move, he suggested, could be part of broader preparations for a potential military operation in southern Lebanon or the Bekaa region. After striking the group's communications infrastructure and causing substantial casualties, Hezbollah now faces a new challenge, reminiscent of the one it encountered after the assassination of its leader, Fouad Shukr. Fawzi also touched on speculation that the operation might be a precursor to a ground invasion south of the Litani River, with the goal of pushing settlers back to the north.

However, he cautioned that, despite the speculation, Israeli military logic likely recognizes the potentially disastrous consequences of a ground war with Hezbollah, which would be far more severe than the results of Israel's invasion of Gaza, primarily due to Hezbollah's formidable combat capabilities in southern Lebanon.

UK's PM criticized for taking freebies

LONDON, Sept 19, (AP): Less than three months after he was elected on a promise to restore trust in politics, British Prime Minister Keir Starmer is trying to shake off criticism over donations from a wealthy businessman and the hefty salary of his most senior

The Labour Party leader, who won power in a landslide victory on July 4, denies impropriety over thousands of pounds (dollars) worth of clothes and eyeglasses paid for by Waheed Alli, a media entrepreneur and longtime Labour donor.

Starmer is also facing grumbling among his own employees over the salary of chief of staff Sue Gray. The BBC disclosed that she is paid 170,000 pounds

(\$225,000) a year - about 3,000 pounds more than the prime

minister's salary. Gray's salary is at the top of a set of pay bands for political advisers, which have been raised since the election. The government said it did not in-

terfere in setting the pay scale. "The pay bands for any official, any adviser, are not set by politicians. There's an official process that does that,"

Business Secretary Jonathan Reynolds said Thursday.

In recent days British media have been full of large ly anonymous grumbling from government officials about Gray, a former senior civil servant best known for leading an investigation into lockdown-breaching parties in government buildings during the COVID-19

Gray's findings helped topple Conservative Prime Minister Boris Johnson, and her subsequent move to work for Starmer led the Conservatives to claim the "partygate" probe was politically biased, something Gray denies.

Italy floods force 1,000 to evacuate: About a thousand residents were evacuated in the northern Italian region of Emilia-Romagna after it was hit by torrential rains and severe flooding overnight, local media reported Thursday.

Rivers flooded in three of the region's provinces -Ravenna, Bologna and Faenza - as local mayors asked people to stay on upper floors or leave their houses. At least 800 residents in the Ravenna area and almost

200 in Bologna province spent the night in shelters, schools and sports centers as local rivers overflowed. Trains were suspended and schools closed across

the affected areas, and residents have been advised to avoid travel and work from home where possible. The Faenza area was just recovering from the devastating floods that hit Emilia-Romagna in May 2023, claiming 17 lives and causing billions of euros in dam-

ages.
"The night was dramatic, we waited for the river flood to cross the city," Faenza mayor Massimo Isola told state TV Rainews. "It rose really close to the limit,

but thanks to the works done over the past year we managed to avoid an overflow in the center of the city." Several Central and Eastern European nations have been plagued by severe flooding in recent days, including Austria, the Czech Republic, Poland and Romania, with the death toll rising over 20 people across the region.

Italy hails ties with China: China and Italy, as inheritors of millennium-old civilization, will be able to use their wisdom to jointly promote global peace, stability and sustainable development, Italian Deputy Prime Minister Matteo Salvini has said.

"In the name of peace and global stability, the friendship between Italy and China is crucial," said Salvini on Tuesday at a reception hosted by the Chinese Embassy to Italy to celebrate the 75th anniversary of the founding of the People's Republic of China and the 20th anniversary of comprehensive strategic partnership of the two nations.

He also said that he believes that dialogue, friendship, partnership, and collaboration between China and Europe are absolutely beneficial, positive, and

As Italy's minister of infrastructure and transport, Salvini also told Xinhua that he had great admiration for the path China has taken over the past 75 years. He thanked the Chinese community "for the contribution it brings to many Italian cities.

Teachers in Belarus detained: Dozens of teachers in Belarus have been detained or interrogated by authorities as part of the country's wide-ranging crackdown on dissent, a respected local human rights organization said Wednesday.

Pavel Sapelka, a spokesman for the Viasna rights group told The Associated Press that moves against teachers began in September and that all those detained or questioned have taken part in an online teacher-education project that the KGB, Belarus' main security agency, declared to be an extremist group in August.

The project, named Adukavanka, gave guidance on technological innovations in education and offered suggested lesson plans. Hundreds of teachers joined. Sapelka did not give precise figures for how many

teachers have been detained or questioned. In a post on the Telegram messaging service, Adukavanka advised all subscribers to its channel who live in Belarus to cancel their registrations. "Strong education is done with brains, not with truncheons, the post said.

Belarus has suppressed opposition and independent media for three decades under President Alexander Lukashenko, but the efforts to crush dissent intensified sharply in 2020 when nationwide protests arose after a presidential election whose disputed results gave Lukashenko a sixth term in office.

Hungary refuses to pay fines: The European Union on Wednesday began the process of clawing back hundreds of millions of euros in funds meant to go Hungary after its anti-migrant government refused to pay a huge fine for breaking the bloc's asylum rules.

In June, the EU's top court ordered Hungary to pay 200 million euros (\$223 million) for persistently depriving migrants of their right to apply for asylum. The court imposed an additional fine of 1 million euros for every day it failed to comply.

The European Court of Justice described Hungary's actions as "an unprecedented and extremely serious infringement of EU law." Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orbán slammed its ruling as "outrageous and unacceptable.'

VP hits Trump promise of mass deportations

WASHINGTON, Sept 19, (AP): US Vice President Kamala Harris criticized Republican Donald Trump 's promise to deport millions of people who are in the United States illegally, questioning whether he would rely on massive raids and detention camps to carry it out.

Harris, the Democratic presidential nominee, told the Congressional Hispanic Caucus Institute's annual leadership conference that the nation can find both a pathway to citizenship for those who want to come and at the same time secure the border.

"We can do both, and we must do both," she said.

Focus

Trump, for his part, leaned heavily on his alarmist message on immigration as he held a rally in Uniondale on New York's Long Island, focusing the bulk of his remarks on the subject.

"We're just destroying the fabric of life in our country. And we're not going to take it any longer. And you got to get rid of these people. Give me a shot," Trump said.

Both candidates took a break Wednesday from campaigning in the toss-up states that will likely decide the Nov. 5 election. The former president drew a large, roaring crowd, giving him a chance to show deep support even in a blue state.

He ripped into Democratic leadership in New York City and state, blaming them for homeless people living in what he called "horrible, disgusting, dangerous, filthy encampments," and even the conditions on the New York City subway, which he called "squalid and unsafe" and promised to renovate. "What the hell do you have to lose?"

he said in asking for their votes. Before heading out to the suburbs, Trump stopped at a Bitcoin cafe in New York City. Trump has recently embraced cryptocurrency and on Monday night helped launch his family's

House 'rejects' temporary funding bill to avoid government shutdown

WASHINGTON, Sept 19, (AP): The House on Wednesday rejected Speaker Mike Johnson's proposal that would have linked temporary funding for the federal government with a mandate that states require proof of citizenship when people register to vote.

Next steps on government funding are uncertain. Lawmakers are not close to completing work on the dozen annual appropriations bills that will fund federal agencies during the next fiscal year, so they'll need to approve a stopgap measure to prevent a partial shutdown when that budget year begins Oct.

The vote was 220-202, with 14 Republicans and all but three Democrats opposing the bill. Johnson, who said after the vote he was "disappointed," will likely pursue a Plan B to avoid a partial shutdown, though he was not yet ready to share details.

"We'll draw up another play and we'll come up with a solution," Johnson said. "I'm already talking to colleague about their many ideas. We have time to fix the situation

keep trying to pull us backward," Harris said. "We all remember what they did to tear families apart, and now they have pledged to carry out the largest deportation, a mass deportation, in

American history.' "Imagine what that would look like and what that would be? How's that going to happen? Massive raids? Massive detention camps? What are they talking about?" she said.

Star Tribune that he was pinned beneath the 200-pound bruin on Sept. 6 when his son, Owen, fired a shot from the boy's hunting rifle. "Owen was a hero. He shot that bear and

killed it on top of me," said Beierman, who suffered bites to his forehead, arm and leg. He also needed stitches to reattach a flap of skin on his cheek that was ripped during the attack.

Earlier, he and Owen spotted the bear from a tree stand near Siren, Wisconsin, about 90 miles (144 kilometers) northeast of Minneapolis. Owen fired a shot, wounding the bear which then ran away. The pair waited about 20 minutes before starting to look for the bear and used a neighbor's tracking dog to try and find it. (AP)

Haiti govt creates electoral council

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico, Sept 19, (AP): Haiti's government on Wednesday created a provisional electoral council long sought by the international community to prepare the troubled Caribbean country for its first general elections since 2016.

Smith Augustin, a member of the country's transitional presidential council, confirmed to The Associated Press that the electoral council was created, albeit with only seven of what by law is supposed to be a nine-member panel. He said the two other members would likely be announced in upcoming days.

The electoral council, which represents groups including farmers, journalists, human rights activists



and the Vodou community, is tasked with organizing the elections and helping create the legal framework to hold them. Haiti has not had a president

since July 2021, and it last held elections in 2016.

The previous electoral council had been dissolved in September 2021 by former prime minister Ariel Henry, who accused it of being "partisan." His move delayed elections planned for November 2021

and prompted critics to accuse Henry of holding on to power, accusations he rejected. Henry was himself a transitional leader. He was

sworn in as prime minister roughly two weeks after former president Jovenel Moïse was assassinated at his private home in July 2021. Henry repeatedly pledged to hold elections but blamed worsening gang violence for his failure to do so.

Attacks

Earlier this year, gangs that control 80% of the capital of Port-au-Prince launched coordinated attacks on critical government infrastructure, a move that eventually led to Henry's resignation.

A transitional presidential council was then created and tasked with holding presidential elections by February 2026.

The assassination of Moïse had left a major political vacuum.

In addition, the terms of 10 remaining senators expired in January 2023, stripping Haiti of its last demo-cratically elected institution. The country had failed to hold legislative elections since October 2019, with Moïse ruling by decree before he was killed.

The newly formed provisional electoral council faces numerous obstacles, including persistent gang violence blamed for the killing of more than 3,200 people from January to May.

González forced to sign letter: Venezuela's former opposition candidate, Edmundo González, on Wednesday said he was coerced into signing a letter effectively recognizing his defeat in July's presidential election, which electoral authorities claim was

won by President Nicolás Maduro. The revelation of the letter is the latest strain to the country's political crisis, which was exacerbated by the disputed election results and González's recent departure for exile in Spain. González and the Unitary Platform coalition he represented on July 28 claim they defeated Maduro by a wide margin.

The document states it was meant to be confidential, but Jorge Rodríguez, head of the National Assembly and Maduro's chief negotiator, presented it during a nationally televised press conference hours after a local news outlet published parts of it. The letter shows González as the sender and is addressed to Rodriguez, who signed it as recipient.

Rodríguez told reporters González signed the letter of his own volition. González, however, in a video posted on social media said he signed it under duress.

"They showed up with a document that I would have to sign to allow my departure from the country," González said. "In other words, either I signed or I would face consequences. There were very tense hours of coercion, blackmail and pressure.

Rodríguez, questioned about González video message, threatened to reveal audio of his conversations with González if he did not take back his assertions.

Colombia suspends peace talks with ELN: Colombia on Wednesday suspended peace talks with the National Liberation Army, or ELN, after blaming the rebel group for an attack that killed two soldiers and injured more than 20.

"Today the dialogue process is suspended," said the government's peace delegation in a statement. "Its viability is severely damaged, and its continuity can only be recovered with an unequivocal manifestation of the ELN's will for peace."

This is the deepest crisis of the peace negotiations with the ELN since November 2022 and after President Gustavo Petro took power as the first leftist president launching talks with that and other armed groups under a policy known as total peace.

The National Liberation Army, or ELN, ended a cease-fire with the Colombian government in August, but was still involved in peace talks aimed at ending more than five decades of conflict.

The army said Tuesday that the group fired homemade rockets from a cargo truck that had been parked near a base in Puerto Jordan, a small town in Arauca province. The rebel group has not claimed responsibility for

the attack.


'Show proof of alleged cartel ties': Mexican President Andrés Manuel López Obrador on Wednesday demanded that former Secretary of Public Security Genaro García Luna, who was convicted on drug trafficking charges in the United States last year, present evidence to support his accusations that the presi-

dent has links to drug trafficking. López Obrador was responding to a jailhouse letter from García Luna that his attorney distributed to the press. García Luna alleged contact between López Obrador and the faction of the Sinaloa cartel led by Ismael "El Mayo" Zambada, who was arrested in July

The letter comes just weeks before López Obrador leaves office and after earlier allegations that López Obrador's previous presidential campaign took contributions from drug traffickers.

"He writes that there is proof, there are videos, there are calls, there are audios. It's very simple, he should share them with the public," said López Obrador in his morning news briefing.

"He needs to show proof," said the president. He suggested that he ask, "his friends at the DEA."

Kim bolsters nuke, conventional weapons

SEOUL, South Korea, Sept 19, (AP): North Korea said Thursday that leader Kim Jong Un supervised successful tests of two types of missiles - one designed to carry a "super-large conventional warhead" and the other likely for a nuclear warhead, as he ordered officials to bolster up his country's military capabilities to repel United States-led threats.

The tests appear to be the same as the multiple missile launches that neighboring countries said North Korea performed Wednesday, extending its run of weapons displays as confrontations with the U.S. and South Korea escalate.

Launch

The official Korean Central News Agency said that Kim oversaw the launch of the country's newly built Hwasongpho-11-Da-4.5 ballistic missile tipped with a dummy "4.5-ton super-large conventional warhead." It said the test-firing was meant to verify an ability to accurately hit a 320 kilometer (200 mile) -range target, suggesting it's a weapon aimed at striking sites in South Korea.

KCNA said Kim also guided the launch of an improved "strategic" cruise missile, a word implying the weapon was developed to carry a nuclear warhead.

After the tests, Kim stressed the need to continue to "bolster up the nuclear force" and acquire "overwhelming offensive capability in the field of conventional weapons, too," according to KCNA. It cited the Kim as saying that North Korea can thwart its enemies' intentions to invade only when it has strong military power. KCNA released photos of a missile

hitting a ground target. South Korea's military said later Thursday it assessed that both ballistic and cruise missiles fired by North Korea the previous day landed in the North's mountainous northeastern region.

Chu gets 14 months in HK: The first person convicted under a tough new Hong Kong national security law was sentenced on Thursday to 14 months in prison for wearing a T-shirt with a protest slogan.

Chu Kai-pong, 27, wore a shirt on June 12 reading "Liberate Hong Kong, revolution of our times," a slogan chanted during anti-government protests in 2019. That day was the fifth anniversary of a demonstration in which thousands of people surrounded the city's legislative council complex to protest a now-withdrawn extradition bill. Months of often-violent protests followed as demonstrators expanded their demands to call for greater police accountability and democracy.

Authorities have said the protest slogan could imply the separation of Hong Kong from China - a red line for Beijing.

Chu pleaded guilty in court on Monday to the charge of carrying out an act or acts with a seditious intent.

The city's new security law, which critics say further stifles freedom of expression, took effect in March and imposes stiffer punishments for sedition offenses. Offenders face up to seven years in prison, up from the previous maximum sentence of two years for a first offense and three years for a subsequent offense.

Vietnam tycoon faces trial: The second trial for Vietnamese real estate typcoon Truong My Lan - who was sentenced to death for financial fraud in April - started on Thursday, state media reported.

The 67-year-old chair of the real estate company Van Thinh Phat was convicted for orchestrating Vietnam's biggest ever financial fraud case. amounting to \$12.5 billion - nearly 3%

of the country's 2022 GDP and for illegally controlling a major bank allowing loans that resulted in losses of \$27 billion, state media said.

Her arrest and conviction was one of the highest profile cases in an anti-corruption drive that has intensified since 2022. The so-called blazing furnace campaign has also singed the highest echelons of Vietnamese politics and led to the resignation of a former president who was implicated in it.

Lan is being tried on fresh charges of appropriating property fraudulently and money laundering. According to a police investigation, she raised \$1.2 billion from nearly 36,000 investors by issuing bonds illegally through four companies, state media reports say.

Investigators found 21 companies controlled by Lan's Van Thinh Phat that illegally transferred over \$4.5 billion in and out of Vietnam between 2012-2022

She is also accused of siphoning off \$18 billion obtained through fraud.

Kamikawa said she also instructed Japanese schools in China to review their safety measures, and requested China to provide details of the attack and do its utmost to prevent a recurrence of similar attacks on the Japa-

Kuwaiti real estate sector sees significant growth in bank financing and transactions

Real estate loans surge by 23.8% in July

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19: Local banks have significantly increased their financing to Kuwait's real estate sector, with loans reaching a total of 10 billion dinars in July, up from 9.949 billion dinars the previous month.

This represents a 1.1 percent monthly increase and a 4.5 percent annual rise from the 9.625 billion dinars recorded in July 2023.

In the first seven months of the year, banks extended approximately 3.7 billion dinars in credit to the real estate sector.

Interestingly, real estate financing surged by 125.1 million dinars, or 23.8 percent, in July alone, reaching 649.6 million dinars compared to 524.5 million dinars in June.

On a yearly basis, financing in July increased by 303.2 million dinars, or 87.5 percent, from 346.4 million dinars in July 2023.

The real estate activity was also robust last month, with 448 properties traded for a total value of 359.07 million dinars (about \$1.2 billion).

The private real estate transactions led with 321 properties valued at 153 million dinars, followed by investment real estate with 105 properties worth 62.105 million dinars.

Other transactions included 11 commercial properties for 9.65 million dinars, five craft real estate contracts for 6.1 million dinars, and three exhibition sector properties valued at 28 million dinars.

Additionally, transactions in the warehouse sector and coastal strip were valued at 2.5 million dinars and 6.15 million dinars, respectively.

This uptick in both financing and transactions reflects a growing confidence

and active engagement in Kuwait's real estate market.

By the end of July, consumer loans had risen by 59 million dinars, or 3 percent, reaching a total of 2.03 billion dinars. This compares to 1.97 billion dinars at the end of December 2023.

During this period, the total volume of loans granted by Kuwaiti banks

amounted to 1.82 billion dinars, marking a 3.4 percent increase. Consequently, the overall credit extended in Kuwait grew to 55.37 billion dinars by the end of July, up from 53.55 billion dinars at the end of 2023.

The rise in loan volumes is attributed to broader credit expansion across various economic sectors. Housing loans, which are long-term personal loans for purchasing, building, or renovating residential properties, totaled 16.24 billion dinars by July's end

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19, (KUNA): The price of Kuwaiti oil went up by 17 cents to USD 74.71 per barrel on Wednesday as opposed USD 74.54 pb the day before, said the Kuwait Petroleum Corpo-

ration (KPC) on Thursday.

The price of the Brent crude and West Texas Intermediate went down respectively by 5 and 28 cents to settle each at USD 73.56 per barrel and 71.91 pb.

16.01 billion dinars recorded at the end of December 2023. Personal facilities also saw growth, with the total balance reaching 19.01 billion dinars, up by 250 million dinars or 1.35 percent from 18.76 billion dinars.

In terms of deposits, Kuwaiti banks saw a rise in total deposits to 49.48 billion dinars as of July, an increase of 755 million dinars or 1.55 percent from the 48.72 billion dinars recorded at the end of 2023.

This growth was driven primarily by an increase in private sector deposits, which grew by 2.58 percent to 36.53 billion dinars, reflecting a rise of 1.01 billion dinars. Deposits in foreign currencies also increased slightly, reaching 1.83 billion dinars, up 1.04 percent from 1.81 billion dinars at the end of 2023.

Conversely, deposits from public financial and non-financial institutions decreased by 11.5 percent, falling to 5.98 billion dinars from 6.76 billion dinars at the end of December 2023.

Overall, the data indicates a robust expansion in both consumer loans and deposits, underscoring a dynamic financial environment in Kuwait during the first half of 2024.

Inflation rate dips to 3% in July

Central bank 'cuts' discount rate by 25 basis points to 4%

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19, (KUNA): In light of its vigilant monitoring of the domestic and international economic developments and the end of the monetary tightening cycle initiated since March 2022 at most of global central banks, the Board of Directors of the Central Bank of Kuwait (CBK) decided to cut the discount rate by 25 Basis Points from 4.25 percent to 4 percent effective Thursday, September 19.

In a press statement released on Wednesday, the Governor and Chairman of the CBK's Board of Directors, Basel A. Al-Haroon, pointed out that the decision is informed by the latest developments in the local and global economic, monetary, and banking conditions including the domestic liquidity indicators, movements in deposits, banking credit, and interest rates on KWD and the

major currencies.
The Governor

The Governor further explained that this decision aims at fostering an environment conducive to sustainable growth in various economic sectors through stimulating aggregate demand. Given the declining inflationary pressures in the national economy, the annual inflation rate has slowed down from 4.71 percent recorded in April 2022 to 3 percent in July 2024.

The Governor concluded by stress-

ing the CBK's unwavering policy of monitoring economic, monetary and banking developments, and readiness to act, whenever needed, to direct the various monetary policy tools that support the sustainable economic growth, maintain the competitiveness and attractiveness of KWD as a lucrative and reliable store of local savings, and bolster the monetary stability and financial stability.

GCC economies forecasted to grow 4.4% by 2025, up from 2.1% in 2024

KUWAIT CITY, Sept 19: According to a recent report from Oxford Economics and the Institute of Chartered Accountants of the Middle East, Gulf economies are poised for significant growth, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

The report forecasts that economic growth in the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) countries will reach 4.4 percent by 2025, reflecting a major recovery and acceleration from the 2.1 percent expected in 2024.

Key highlights from the report include:

Growth in Non-Energy Sectors: Non-energy sectors within the GCC are expected to grow by 4.2 percent this year and continue to expand by 4.4 percent in 2025. This growth is attributed to the diversification efforts in tourism, trade, and finance, which have become crucial to the re-

gion's economic development.

(PMI): Recent PMI readings indicate strong local activity, suggesting a robust economic environment. The anticipated interest rate cuts are expected to further boost private consumption and investment.

Scott Livermore, ICAEW Economic Advisor and Chief Economist at Oxford Economics Middle East, highlighted that the GCC's proactive investments and economic strategies are crucial in showcasing the region's resilience and potential for strong growth in the coming years.

Inflation moderates to 51.97% in August, lowest in years

Türkiye's central bank expects to maintain tight monetary policy

ANKARA, Sept 19, (Xinhua): Easing monetary policy right now is premature as it may hinder disinflation efforts that have yielded successful results in Türkiye, said analysts as Türkiye's central bank is expected to announce the next rate decision this Thursday.

Türkiye has been struggling with rising inflation

and one of the worst cost-of-living crises of its history. Since June 2023, the central bank has raised its key interest rate from 8.5 percent to 50 percent, tightening monetary policy.

The country's annual inflation rate moderated to 51.97 percent in August, marking its lowest yearly

level. The figure, released by official data in early September, came in slightly below market expectations.

"Annual inflation is expected to drop below 50 percent in September," Turkish Treasury and Fi-

nance Minister Mehmet Simsek said Friday. In July, Moody's Ratings upgraded Ankara's sovereign credit rating, the first of its kind in over a decade, citing improvements in governance and economic policies. S&P Global Ratings also lifted

Türkiye's rating.

Fitch Ratings upgraded Türkiye's rating last week, the second upgrade this year, citing success-

ful disinflation efforts and policies to narrow the current account deficit.

Türkiye needs to maintain a tight monetary policy to improve inflation expectations even after a potential easing cycle, Arispe Morales, senior director at Fitch Ratings, told the semi-official Anadolu Agency following the upgrade.

Although the Turkish central bank has indicated that it does not favor a rate cut this year, a deepening cost-of-living crisis in the country out of tight monetary policies coupled with austerity measures might put the bank under great pressure to start easing in the short term, noted Atilla Yesilada, country advisor at business management consultancy Global Source Partners.

However, Yesilada stressed that "authorities have to maintain the tight policy for some time to obtain further concrete results in the fight against inflation."

An early rate cut could worsen inflation as it is cooling and fueling a run for hard currencies, Yesilada told Xinhua.

Türkiye's economic growth slowed to 2.5 percent in the second quarter from 5.3 percent in the first quarter this year, according to official data released last week.

Meanwhile, recent data from the Union of Chambers and Commodity Exchanges of Türkiye showed that 15,000 companies in the country have closed so far in 2024, up 28 percent from last year.

"Inflation has proven to be stubborn, and as a result, there will be consequences in terms of employment and growth," noted Istanbul-based economist Mustafa Sonmez.

Still, the government has no other option but to continue with tight monetary and fiscal policies to control inflation for the foreseeable future, Sonmez said, adding that domestic demand needs to weaken further, and so policy will need to be kept tight for a longer time.

"Even though year-on-year inflation has

dropped significantly compared to last year, Turkish inflation is still high, in fact, one of the highest in the world," said Sonmez.

In early September, the Turkish government

raised its expected inflation rate for 2024 from 33 percent to 41.5 percent.

More financial difficulties await low and middle-income households in 2025 due to the ongoing implementation of austerity measures, said Sonmez.

Eliminating tariffs on 99% of products

Australia, UAE finalize trade agreement

CANBERRA, Sept 19, (Xinhua): Australia and the United Arab Emirates (UAE) have reached a deal on a free trade agreement. Don Farrell, Australia's minister for Trade and Tourism, on Tuesday announced that negotiations on the Australia-UAE Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement have concluded. He said at a press conference in Canberra that the deal would eliminate tariffs on more than 99 percent of Australian products entering the UAE.

"This is the first trade agreement with the Middle East," Farrell said. "The UAE is not only our largest trade and investment partner in the Middle East, but it is always one of our most important strategic diplomatic and defense partners in the region."

According to the government, Australian exports to the UAE are expected to increase by 678 million Austral-

ian dollars (457.3 million U.S. dollars) per year under the trade agreement.

Additionally, Farrell said it would open up investment from the UAE's sovereign wealth funds in Australia's critical minerals sector.

"The UAE has some of the largest sovereign wealth funds in the world. A trade agreement with the UAE will facilitate investment, which is important to achieving the government's ambition of becoming a renewable energy superpower," he said in a statement.

Two-way trade between Australia and the UAE was worth 9.9 billion Australian dollars (6.6 billion U.S. dollars) in 2023 and two-way investment was worth 20.6 billion Australian dollars (13.8 billion U.S. dollars).

Farrell said both nations are working on formalizing the legal treaty text in preparation for signing later in 2024.

resembles a surreal, high-tech oasis where innovation meets the boundless energy of the desert sun.

This is the fourth phase of the Mohammed bin Rashid Al

This is the fourth phase of the Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum Solar Park in Dubai, a key cooperative project to promote the construction of a Green Silk Road between China and the United Arab Emirates (UAE). In November 2018,

Shanghai Electric Group Co., Ltd. undertook the project as the engineering, procurement, and construction contractor. With a total installed capacity of 950 MW, including 700 MW of solar thermal-electric power units and 250 MW of photovoltaic power units, the project covers an area of 44 square km, equivalent to over 6,000 standard soccer fields.

As of February this year, all power generation units in the project have been successfully connected to the grid and started commercial operation, with a cumulative electricity generation of 3.5 billion kilowatt-hours. During the construction phase, this project has created approximately 50,000 local jobs. Omar Al Hassan, executive managing director of the project, told Xinhua that the project supplies green energy to 320,000 local

households and reduces carbon dioxide emissions by more than 1.6 million tons annually.

"We keep the sun at night and light up Dubai after sunset," said Zhao Hui, the project manager.

The project, he said, utilizes world-leading solar thermal technology, and is capable of consistently and stably converting solar energy into electricity. Unlike traditional photovoltaic power plants, which experience significant load fluctuations in different solar exposure situations and cannot generate power at night, the solar thermal storage plant can store large amounts of heat generated during sunny periods, ensuring stable power generation across day and night, and even under adverse weather conditions.

The EU has ignored fresh proposals from Chinese automakers aimed at resolving the dispute over Chinese EVs in the European market, undermining efforts to ease tensions through dialogue

The decision to impose tariffs on China-made EVs, despite several offers from Chinese manufacturers, has sparked a new wave of outcry within the bloc. GROWING OPPOSITION

Spanish Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez, during a recent visit to China, voiced his opposition to the proposed EU tariffs on Chinese EVs, urging the EU to reconsider and seek a compromise with China to avoid a trade war. His concern's were echoed by German Chancellor Olaf Scholz, who also criticized the tariff plan.

In May, Swedish Prime Minister Ulf Kristersson warned against levying tariffs on Chinese EVs, saying that "a wider trade war where we block each other's products is not the way to go for industrial nations such as Germany and Sweden.

Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orban described the tariffs as a "brutal" punishment against Chinese automakers and called for open competition.

These dissenting voices suggest that the decision to impose tariffs on Chinese EVs lacks unanimous support among all EU member states. "Many be-

EU tariffs on Chinese EVs raise trade war concerns

lieve that this is a step towards a trade war between Europe and China, which will ultimately harm the European economy," said Croatian political analyst Mladen Plese.

German automotive expert Ferdinand Dudenhoeffer, director of the Center for Automotive Research (CAR) in Bochum, said that such a protectionist approach might push EU automakers to increase investments in China, the world's largest car market

and a leader in the rapidly growing EV industry.

He warned that protectionism and tariffs are misguided strategies and would result in losses for Ger-

"The European Commission's punitive tariffs hit German companies and their top products. Cars become cheaper through more competition, open markets, and significantly better business conditions in the EU, not through trade war and market isolation," said German Transport Minister Volker Wissing in a message posted on X

Norwegian Prime Minister Jonas Gahr Store openly opposed punitive tariffs on Chinese EVs. In a recent interview with Chinese media, he emphasized that as a non-EU member, Norway is not bound by EU policies. "Consumers in Norway should have access to the cars they want to buy," he stated. (Xinhua)

Asian markets forge higher after Fed cuts interest rates

NEW YORK, Sept 19, (AP): Asian markets forged higher on Thursday after the Federal Reserve kicked off its efforts to prevent a recession in the U.S. with a biggerthan-usual cut to interest rates.

In Tokyo, the Nikkei 225 index jumped 2.1% to 37,155.33, lifted by major export manufacturers' shares. Toyota Motor Corp. jumped 5.1%, Sony Group Corp. added 2.9% and Hitachi Ltd. advanced 5.8%.

Hong Kong's Hang Seng gained 1.9% to 17,993.30. The Shanghai Composite index climbed 0.7% to 2,736.51, while Taiwan's Taiex was up 1.7%.

South Korea's Kospi rose 0.2% to 2,579.86. The Bank of Japan and the Bank of England are also

holding monetary policy meetings this week. Neither central bank is expected to move on rates, though the language of what the officials say could be an indicator of later moves and still influence markets.

Because the Fed's half-percentage point rate cut was so well telegraphed, markets had already climbed in anticipation. So, Wall Street's reactions to the 180-degree turn on its policy rate were relatively muted.

"Markets barely reacted to the Fed's 50 (basis point) rate cut, on balance, and our base case is that further cuts won't move the needle too much either," Thomas Mathews of Capital Economics said in a commentary.

It was the first cut to the federal funds rate in over four years, ending a stretch where the Fed kept rates at a twodecade high to slow the U.S. economy enough to stifle the worst inflation in generations.

On Wednesday, the S&P 500 slipped 0.3%, closing at 5,618.26. The Dow Jones Industrial Average dipped 0.2% to 41,503.10. The Nasdaq composite lost 0.3% to

The Fed's move can help financial markets in two big ways. It eases the brakes off the economy, which has been slowing under the weight of higher rates, and it gives a boost to prices for all kinds of investments. Besides stocks, gold and bond prices had already rallied in recent months on expectations that rate cuts were coming.

Now that inflation has eased significantly from its peak two summers ago and appears to be heading toward 2%, the Fed says it it can turn more of its attention toward protecting the slowing job market and overall

"The time to support the labor market is when it's strong and not when you begin to see the layoffs," Fed Chair Jerome Powell said. "That's the situation we're in."

Some critics say the Federal Reserve may have already kept interest rates too high for too long, but Powell said that "We don't think we're behind." "We think this is timely. But I think you can take this

as a sign of our commitment not to get behind," Powell said in a press conference following the Fed's announce-"The focus has now decisively shifted to the labor market, and there's a sense that the Fed is trying to strike a

better balance between jobs and inflation," Stephen Innes of SPI Asset Management Like stock prices, Treasury yields wavered up and

down repeatedly immediately after the Fed announced its cut and published its projections. Trading in Tupperware Brands remained halted after

the company filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection. Its stock has been sinking, down to 51 cents, since a minirevival early in the pandemic sent its stock above \$30.

All told, the S&P 500 slipped 16.32 points to 5,618.26. The Dow dropped 103.08 to 41,503.10, and the Nasdaq composite lost 54.76 to 17,573.30.

In other dealings, U.S. benchmark crude oil lost 20 cents to \$69.68 per barrel in electronic trading on the New York Mercantile Exchange.

Brent crude, the international standard, declined 22 cents to \$73.43 per barrel.

The dollar rose to 142.58 Japanese yen from 142.29 yen. The euro rose to \$1.1132 from \$1.1120.

Boeing CEO says co will furlough workers soon to preserve cash during labor strike

SEATTLE, Sept 19, (AP): Boeing's CEO said Wednesday that the company will begin furloughing "a large number" of employees to conserve cash during the strike by union machinists that began last week.

Chief Executive Kelly Ortberg said the people who would be required to take time off without pay starting in the coming days include executives, managers and other employees based in the U.S.

"While this is a tough decision that impacts everybody, it is in an effort to preserve our long-term future and help us navigate through this very difficult time," Ortberg said in a company-wide message to staff.

Boeing didn't say how many people will face rolling furloughs, but the number is expected to run into the tens of thousands. The aerospace giant had 171,000 employees at the start of the year.

About 33,000 Boeing factory workers in the Pacific Northwest began a strike Friday after rejecting a proposal to raise pay by 25% over four years. They want raises of at least 40%, the return of a traditional pension plan and other

improvements in the contract offer they voted down. The strike is halting production of several airplane models, including Boeing's best-selling plane, the 737 Max. The company gets more than half of the purchase price when new planes are delivered to buyers, so the strike will quickly hurt

Boeing's cash flow. Ortberg said selected employees will be furloughed for one week every four weeks while retaining their benefits. The CEO and other senior executives will take pay cuts during the duration of the strike, he said, without stating how

deep the cuts will be. All work related to safety, quality, customer support and

certification of new planes will continue during the furloughs, he said, including production of 787 Dreamliner jets, which are built by nonunion workers in South Carolina.

Ortberg said in a memo to employees that the company is talking to the International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers about a new contract agreement that could be ratified.

"However, with production paused across many key programs in the Pacific Northwest, our business faces substantial challenges and it is important that we take difficult steps to preserve cash and ensure that Boeing is able to successfully recover," he said.

Boeing's chief financial officer warned employees earlier this week that temporary layoffs were possible

The company, which is based in Arlington, Virginia, but has most of its commercial-airplanes business located in the Pacific Northwest, is also cutting spending on suppliers, freezing hiring and eliminating most travel.

Company and union representatives met with federal mediators Tuesday to restart negotiations and were expected to meet again Wednesday. In a website post addressed to members, the union said it was frustrated by the first day of new talks.

"The company was not prepared and was unwilling to address the issues you've made clear are essential for ending this strike: Wages and Pension," the union said. "The company doesn't seem to be taking mediation seriously.

Striking workers are picketing at several locations in the Seattle area, Oregon and California. The union, which recommended the offer that members later rejected by a 96% vote, is surveying the workers to learn what they want in a new contract. The union's last strike at Boeing, in 2008, lasted about two months.

Airline to remain separate

Alaska Airlines completes acquisition of Hawaiian Air

SEATTLE, Sept 19, (AP): Alaska Airlines closed its \$1 billion purchase of Hawaiian Airlines on Wednesday, a day after the federal government removed the last major regulatory obstacle to the deal

Alaska will also assume about \$900 million in Hawaiian debt. Alaska says it will keep Hawaiian as a separate brand, eliminating the need to repaint planes.

To win approval from the Transportation Department this week, the air-lines agreed to maintain current levels of service on key routes within Hawaii and between the island state and the U.S. mainland where they don't face much competition.

Alaska Air Group stock fell 3% Wednesday. The shares are up 2% since the start of the year.

The Justice Department, which had opposed previous deals between large airlines, including JetBlue's attempt to buy Spirit Airlines, has not challenged the Alaska-Hawaiian deal on antitrust grounds. Alaska and Hawaiian also agreed

to a handful of consumer protections, including not lowering value of frequent-flyer rewards as they combine their loyalty programs, and promising to compensate passengers for cancellations and significant delays that are the carriers' fault.

Seattle-based Alaska Airlines said those conditions were similar to its plans from the time it announced the

deal in December. The deal solidifies Alaska's position as the fifth-largest U.S. airline by rev-

Fed signals end to inflation fight with a sizable half-point rate cut

Reduction reflects the central bank's new focus

WASHINGTON, 19, (AP): The Federal Reserve on Wednesday cut its benchmark interest rate by an unusually large halfpoint, a dramatic shift after more than two years of high rates that helped tame inflation but also made borrowing painfully expensive for American consumers.

The rate cut, the Fed's first in more than four years, reflects its new focus on bolstering the job market, which has shown clear signs of slowing. Coming just weeks before the presidential election, the Fed's move also has the potential to scramble the economic landscape just as Americans prepare to vote.

The central bank's action lowered its key rate to roughly 4.8%, down from a two-decade high of 5.3%, where it had stood for 14 months as it struggled to curb the worst inflation streak in four decades. Inflation has tumbled from a peak of 9.1% in mid-2022 to a threeyear low of 2.5% in August, not far above the Fed's 2% target.

The Fed's policymakers also signaled that they expect to cut their key rate by an additional half-point in their final two meetings this year, in November and December. And they envision four more rate cuts in 2025 and two in 2026.


In a statement and in a news conference with Chair Jerome Powell, the Fed came closer than it has before to declaring victory over inflation.

"We know it is time to recalibrate our (interest rate) policy to something that's more appropriate given the progress on inflation," Powell said. "We're not saying, 'mission accomplished' ... but I have to say, though, we're encouraged by the progress that we have

"The U.S. economy is in a good place," he added, "and our decision today is designed to keep it there." Though the central bank now be-

lieves inflation is largely defeated, many Americans remain upset with still-high prices for groceries, gas, rent and other necessities. Former President Donald Trump blames the Biden-Harris administration for sparking an inflationary surge. Vice President Kamala Harris, in turn, has charged that Trump's promise to slap tariffs on all imports would raise prices for consumers even further.

Rate cuts by the Fed should, over time, lead to lower borrowing costs for mortgages, auto loans and credit cards, boosting Americans' finances and supporting more spending and growth. Homeowners will be able to refinance mortgages at lower rates, saving on monthly payments, and even shift credit card debt to lower-cost personal loans or home equity lines. Businesses may also borrow and invest more.

BoE keeps main interest rate on hold at 5% in wake of big Fed cut

LONDON, Sept 19, (AP): The Bank of England kept its main interest rate unchanged at 5% Thursday de-spite a big cut from the U.S. Federal Reserve, its first since the onset of the coronavirus pandemic more than four years ago.

The decision was widely expected amid ongoing concerns about inflation within the bank's monetary policy committee, particularly the elevated levels in the crucial services sector, which accounts for around 80% of the British economy. Figures on Wednesday showed that inflation overall in the U.K. held steady at an annual rate of 2.2% in

August, still above the bank's goal.

Minutes to the meeting showed that eight of the nine members of the panel voted to keep rates unchanged, while one backed a quarter-point reduction.

"The economy has been evolv-

ing broadly as we expected. If that continues, we should be able to reduce rates gradually over time," said Bank Gov. Andrew Bailey. "But it's vital that inflation stays low, so we need to be careful not to cut too fast or by too much.

The bank, which last month cut interest rates for the first time since the pandemic, is widely expected to reduce borrowing costs again at its next meeting in November, espe-cially as it will have details of the government's budget on Oct. 30.

On Wednesday, the Fed cut its main interest by half of a percentage point to roughly 4.8% from a two-decade high of 5.3%, where it had stood for 14 months. It also signaled that there will be more cuts to come in the next few months.

Central banks around the world dramatically increased borrowing costs from near zero during the coronavirus pandemic when prices started to shoot up, first as a result of supply chain issues built up and then because of Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine which pushed up energy costs. As inflation rates have fallen from multi-decade highs recently, they have started cutting interest rates.

On Wednesday, the Fed became the latest major central bank to reduce borrowing costs, cutting its main interest by half of a percentage point to roughly 4.8% from a two-decade high of 5.3%, where it had stood for 14 months. It also signaled that there will be more cuts to come in the next few months.

The Bank of England is widely expected to reduce borrowing costs again at its next meeting in November, especially as it will have details of the government's budget on Oct.

Average mortgage rates have already dropped to an 18-month low of 6.2%, according to Freddie Mac, spurring a jump in demand for refinancings.

"It's a step in the right direction," Laura Rosner-Warburton, senior economist of MarcoPolicy Perspectives, said of Wednesday's Fed move.

The additional rate cuts it indicated it will make, she said, will "prevent risks from building and the unemployment rate from rising. They are trying to keep the economy in good

In an updated set of projections, the policymakers collectively envision a faster drop in inflation than they did three months ago but also higher unemployment. They foresee their preferred inflation gauge falling to 2.3% by year's end, from its current 2.5%, and to 2.1% by the end of 2025. And they now expect the unemployment rate to rise further this year, to 4.4%, from 4.2% now, and to remain there by the end of 2025. That's above their previous forecasts of 4% for the end of this year and 4.2% for 2025.

Powell was pressed at his news conference about whether the Fed's decision to cut its key rate by an unusually large half-point is an acknowledgement that it waited too long to begin reducing borrowing rates.

"We don't think we're behind," he replied. "We think this is timely. But I think you can take this as a sign of our commitment not to get behind. We're not seeing rising (unemployment) claims, not seeing rising layoffs, not hearing from companies that that's something that's going to happen."

Treasury rule would expand tax

ify how homeowners and businesses can receive lucrative tax credits for installing electric vehicle chargers. A rule proposed Wednesday by the

Treasury Department would make credits worth up to \$1,000 for individuals and \$100,000 for businesses available for each EV charger that is installed. If finalized, the new rule would be especially valuable to businesses that plan to install multiple chargers and would be eligible for significant credits to offset the expense.

"In order to help more Americans go electric, we need to make sure they can charge their EVs where they live, work and shop - from inner-city neighborhoods to rural areas," said John Podesta, White House senior advisor for international climate policy. The 2022 Inflation Reduction Act is expanding charging access by saving families and businesses up to 30% off the cost of in-

stalling EV chargers, he said. The proposal announced Wednesday follows guidance issued in January that made tax credits for installing EV chargers available in about two-thirds of the country. The guidance responded to a directive from Congress in the climate law to ensure that the credits for EV chargers are limited to lowincome or non-urban areas.

Treasury chose an expansive definition for census tracts covered by those terms to include about two-thirds of the country. The guidance issued in January did not address exactly which parts of an EV charging installation are eligible for the credit. The plan announced Wednesday again opts for an expansive definition - targeting individual charging ports rather than a single credit for a multi-port installation.

Advocates have said the tax credits could play a significant role in expanding use of EVs and reducing pollution from the transportation sector, which accounts for the single-largest source of U.S. climate-warming emissions.

"We appreciate the Treasury's movement on this important incentive, which will help ensure that Americans can benefit from the electric vehicle" provisions of the 2022 climate law, said Katherine García, director of the Sierra Club's Clean Transportation for

Together with other EV provisions in the climate law and the 2021 bipartisan infrastructure law, "this charging incentive will accelerate the transition to clean vehicles, create good-paying jobs and help our nation meet our climate and clean-air goals," Garcia

Congress approved \$7.5 billion in the 2021 infrastructure law to meet President Joe Biden's goal to build a national network of 500,000 publicly available chargers by 2030. The public charging ports, along with a network of private ports, are crucial to the Biden-Harris administration's effort to encourage drivers to move away from gasoline-powered cars and trucks that contribute to global warming.

There are over 192,000 publicly available charging ports nationwide as of late last month, the Transportation Department said - more than double the amount in January 2021 when Biden took office.

The new tax credit will be particularly valuable to communities living near warehouses, who are often exposed to toxic vehicle pollution from gas-powered delivery trucks that pass through their neighborhoods every day, Garcia said, adding that the tax incentives should be particularly attractive for warehouse owners to install EV chargers for thousands of commercial delivery trucks across the U.S.

Albert Gore, executive director of the advocacy group Zero Emission Transportation Association, said the new tax plan would boost the use of chargers where people live and work.

"One of the great things about driving an EV is that drivers can charge while their vehicle is parked, rather than adding another errand to their busy day," said Gore, the son of former Vice President Al Gore.

The alternative-fuel vehicle tax credit, known as "30C" for its location in the U.S. tax code, is designed to provide an incentive for individuals and businesses to build charging infrastructure in homes, businesses and

Soft skills essential for job success amid AI concerns

Despite ongoing worries about how artificial intelligence will affect jobs, research shows that employers increasingly value something that only human workers can provide - soft skills. These include knowing how to communicate with co-workers, put others at ease and navigate conflict.

However, these essential skills are often neglected in traditional higher education. Colleges and universities' primary focus is to teach students how to become experts in their fields, but they often fall short in preparing students for the social and emotional demands of the workplace. This disconnect is not a minor over-

sight. It's a fundamental flaw in how colleges and universities equip young professionals for success. At best, it creates a communication gap between younger and older workers. At worst, it impacts young workers' job performance as well as their mental health as they struggle to prove themselves.

Let me introduce you to a young woman whom I taught. Let's call her Emily to protect her privacy. She represents the qualities and challenges that many employers have observed in their new young hires.

Emily graduated at the top of her class at a public university, eager to make an impact in her new role at a dynamic startup. However, she soon encountered unexpected challenges.

She came to my office often after she graduated and told me she found it difficult to connect with colleagues and articulate her ideas in team meetings. This disconnect was compounded by a lack of understanding of workplace culture, including knowing how the chain of command works and how to communicate with her colleagues and bosses. She misinterpreted feedback as criticism rather than advice and struggled to communicate her thoughts clearly and precisely. She also struggled with how to manage conflict in the office.

As weeks passed, Emily's anxiety mounted. She felt the pressure to prove herself. Meanwhile, her attempts to contribute innovative ideas were often met with confusion or resistance, further complicating her integration into

Her bosses grew increasingly frustrated with what they perceived as Emily's inability to communicate effectively. Accustomed to clear and direct

communication, they found Emily's

approach unengaged. Emily vented her frustrations in online chats and apps, like Snapchat, and even made a TikTok video about it, rather than approach her boss for a one-on-one conversation. This only widened the divide between her and her employer. Emily's experience is far from unique. It represents a growing challenge faced by young professionals transitioning from the structured environment of edu-

the workforce. This period of transition can overwhelm new graduates who find themselves unprepared for the realities of professional life despite their academic achievements. The transition from student to em-

cation into the unpredictable terrain of

ployee often triggers anxiety, stress and frustration. High expectations placed on young workers to quickly adapt and perform, often without sufficient support, exacerbate these feelings.

In Emily's case, her feelings of isolation grew, and she began to believe she was falling short of her potential. Lacking strong coping mechanisms, she became increasingly stressed, further impairing her ability to perform and communicate effectively.

Young professionals' struggles to find their footing in their jobs also have an impact on the workplace as a whole.

One of Emily's key challenges was navigating workplace communication, where the generational gap between young professionals and their more experienced colleagues often led to differing communication styles and

expectations.

While older generations may favor direct, in-person communication, younger workers like Emily are more accustomed to digital communication. They may rely on social media platforms, like X and Snapchat, for feed-

back and support. This generational divide can lead to misunderstandings and frustrations on both sides. In Emily's case, her inclination to seek online feedback was perceived by her employer as unprofessional. Such misalignments highlight the need for better preparation and understanding of workplace dynamics, starting in college. (AP)

How small businesses can recover from break-ins and theft

MINNEAPOLIS, Sept 19, (AP): Break-ins and thefts can happen at any small business, no matter how tight the security.

In the retail sector alone, more than half of small businesses said they had been victims of shoplifting in the prior year, according to a 2022 survey by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. And break-ins and thefts occur across all sectors

So, it is important for small business owners to prepare in advance and have a plan for dealing with a break-in or theft, to minimize damage.

Roxie Lubanovic, co-founder of Frostbeard Studio in Minneapolis, which makes candles, had her studio broken into in 2016 over a holiday weekend. Thieves stole equipment and supplies, then damaged locks and doors getting in and out. Insurance covered the losses, but it was still difficult recovering. "The hardest part was feeling violated in a space we had put so much work into," she said.

There are several steps small business owners should take after a theft or break-First, don't wait to notify the police and file a police report. You can take inven-

tory of stolen or damaged items after the police have finished their investigation. Once you've inventoried and documented the damage, file an insurance claim. You'll need photos or receipts for items stolen. Call your bank and notify them of what has occurred.

Have a transparent conversation with your employees about what happened. Analyze what went wrong and enhance security where needed. Once you have an updated business security plan, inform your employees about how the break-in has been addressed.

Lubanovic reviewed her security plan and upgraded her security system and installed cameras, new locks and an alarm. "I also asked neighbors to keep an eye out, and had employees stagger their

schedules for a while so someone was always present during business hours," she said. "Thankfully, we haven't had another incident since." She advised small businesses to include building a strong relationship with their local community and neighboring businesses as part of their security plan, saying

Combs to stay in jail after bail is denied for a second time

NEW YORK, Sept 19, (AP): Sean "Diddy" Combs is staying locked up after a judge Wednesday rejected the hip-hop mogul's proposal that he await his sex trafficking trial in the luxury of his Florida mansion instead of a grim Brooklyn federal jail.

US District Judge Andrew L. Carter ruled that Combs' plan - which included a \$50 million bail offer, GPS monitoring and strict limitations on visitors - was "insufficient" to ensure the safety of the community and the integrity of his case.

Carter, agreeing with prosecutors who fought to keep Combs in jail, found that "no condition or set of conditions" governing his release could guard against the risk of him threatening or harming witnesses - a central charge in his case.

Combs' lawyers were making their second attempt in as many days to spring him from the Metropolitan Detention Center, where he has been held since pleading not guilty Tuesday to charges he physically and sexually abused women for years. Combs has been in federal custody since his arrest Monday night at

a Manhattan hotel. A federal magistrate on Tuesday rejected Combs' initial bail request. On Wednesday, he and his lawyers struck out with Carter, the judge who will preside over his trial.

Defense lawyer Marc Agnifilo says he will now ask the 2nd US Circuit Court of Appeals to overturn Carter's ruling and release Combs. In the meantime, he wants Combs moved from the Brooklyn lockup, which has been plagued by rampant violence and horrific conditions, to a jail in New Jersey. Carter said decisions on placement are entirely up to the federal Bureau of Prisons.

"I'm not going to let him sit in that jail a day longer than he has to," Agnifilo said to reporters outside the courtroom.

Combs looked at family members and tapped his heart several times as Wednesday's hearing began, then sat stoically as he listened to arguments. Afterward, as federal agents led him away, his relatives somberly embraced and exchanged hand slaps.

Combs, 54, is accused in an indictment of using his "power and prestige" to induce female victims and male sex workers into drugged-up, elaborately produced sexual performances dubbed "Freak Offs" that Combs arranged, participated in and often recorded on video. The events would sometimes last days and Combs and victims would often receive IV fluids to recover, the indictment said.

The indictment alleges Combs coerced and abused women for years, with the help of a network of associates and employees, while using blackmail and violent acts including kidnapping, arson and physical beatings to keep victims from speaking out.

Arguing to keep Combs in jail, prosecutor Emily Johnson told Carter that the once-celebrated rapper has a long history of intimidating both accusers and witnesses to his alleged abuse. She cited text messages from women who said Combs forced them into "Freak Offs" and then threatened to leak videos of them engaging in sex acts.

Johnson said Combs' defense team was "minimizing and horrifically understating" Combs' propensity for violence, taking issue with his lawyer's portrayal of a 2016 assault at a Los Angeles hotel as a lovers quarrel. Security video of the event, which only came to light in May, showed Combs hitting and kicking his then-girlfriend, the R&B singer Cassie, in a hotel hallway.

"What's love got to do with that?" an incredulous Carter asked. Johnson also seized on a text message from a woman who said Combs dragged her down a hallway by her hair. According to Johnson, the woman told the rapper: "I'm not a rag doll, I'm someone's child." "There is a longstanding pattern of abuse here," Johnson said.

Combs' Florida house is on Star Island, a man-made dollop of land in Biscayne Bay near Miami Beach, reachable only by a causeway or boat. It is among the most expensive places to live in the United States. Combs' request echoed that of a long line of wealthy defendants who have offered to post multimillion-dollar bails in exchange for home detention in luxurious surroundings.

If he had been granted bail, Combs would have been confined to his home, with visits restricted to family, property caretakers and friends who are not considered co-conspirators, his lawyers said. After prosecutors said they served a search warrant Tuesday on Combs' private security chief, his lawyers offered to hire a new firm to monitor him and ensure he abided by the proposed agreement.

Two actors' on-screen chemistry steals the show

NEW YORK: Less than two weeks Clooney, Pitt carry the fixer caper 'Wolfs' President Jimmy Carter is receiv-

The overriding tension in "Wolfs," starring George Clooney and Brad Pitt as rival fixers brought in to clean up the same crime, isn't so much the threat of police arrest or Albanian mob assassination - both of which are concerns. It's that

Clooney and Pitt aren't pals. The two start out as strangers to one another. It's a testament to Clooney and Pitt's jovial on-and-off screen chemistry, and their bond in shared moviestar charisma, that it's genuinely discombobulating to hear Pitt tersely call Clooney "sir" as he does in the opening scenes of Jon Watts' winning, clever

Pitt and Clooney first acted together in 2001's "Ocean's Eleven." And like that remake riff on the Rat Pack original, "Wolfs" is as much, if not more, about its movie stars as it is anything else. The movie's appeal is mostly in their easy charm and chemistry - the little eye rolls and games of one-upmanship that accrue until, finally, they're buddies, like we want them to be.

Clooney is 63 and Pitt is 60, and there are few bits about back pain and Advil in Watts' film. But "Wolfs," which opens in limited theaters Friday and streams next week on Apple TV+, is designed to show you that they can still, without ever really breaking a sweat, get the job done.

When their characters meet, they are both standing in the penthouse of a luxury New York hotel where a tough-on-crime district attorney (Amy Ryan) is in desperate need of a cover up. A young, nearly naked man is seemingly dead on the floor. She's frantically searched her phone for a number once given for such emergencies. That brings the first never-named fixer (Clooney) to the door. Not long after, the second, also unnamed fixer (Pitt) knocks. After a moment of confusion, he points to a small camera at the ceiling. He's been dispatched by the hotel owner (an unseen Frances McDor-

mand) who doesn't want any bad press. The two fixers are spiritual descendants, you might say, from Harvey Keitel's Winston Wolfe, the fast-driving cleaner of "Pulp Fiction." Each is a specialist, supposedly the only man who can do what they do. "Wolfs" - with an awkwardly spelled title that represents the pained collaboration of these two solo freelancers - is a little bit like the pointing Spider-Men meme brought to life. Fitting, then, that it comes from Watts, director of the three Tom Holland Spider-Man films. He also wrote the

There are more movies that "Wolfs" has some kinship with, too, like Tony Gilroy's "Michael Clayton," a high point for Clooney in which he played the clean-up man of a malicious law firm. "Wolfs" doesn't measure up to anything like "Michael Clayton" - what does? - and isn't trying to, anyway. This is more of an old-school movie-star-driven entertainment featuring two actors with skills as rarified as their characters', the kind of movie that was once regularly at home in theaters but now has instead been built for the streaming era.

Informed that they have to finish the job together, the two fixers begin to go about the business of getting rid of the body. They eye each warily, disinterested in giving away any tricks of the trade. This mostly falls to Clooney's character, whose creative way of lifting the body onto a luggage rack begins to earn the respect of Pitt's character.

They turn out to have much, maybe everything, in common. Slowly, reluctantly, they inch toward a partnership. It's a credit to Watts' keen sense of rhythm and his stars' subtlety that it more or less takes the whole movie to get there. Once outside the hotel, "Wolfs" unspools over the course of one night, shot sleekly in the shadows of downtown Manhattan by cinematographer Larkin Seiple.

The kid, credited only as "Kid," is roused from a drug-induced stupor, and quickly, in tighty whities, goes escaping down the street, forcing the two fixers on an extensive chase leading up to the Brooklyn Bridge. The kid is played with a lot of goofy moxie by Austin Abrams ("Euphoria," "The Walking Dead"), and his account of how he got into this mess, delivered in a cheap motel, may be the film's best sequence. Along with Sean Baker's upcoming "Anora," it's turned into a surprisingly good season for New York nocturnal odysseys propelled by

mop-haired kids who end up in Brighton Beach. But the kid's perspective on his two captors also pushes "Wolfs" along. He's naive enough to think they're his friends, even though they would seem duty-bound to dispatch him. Regarding Clooney and Pitt, both in leather jackets, from the back seat of the car, he otherwise correctly assesses them, calling them "like the two coolest people I've ever

Thankfully, someone has come to the not-hardto-deduce realization that Clooney and Pitt are good together. A sequel has already been announced. "Wolfs" turns out to be both the beginning and the coda of a beautiful friendship.

'Supermodels' pay homage to Cavalli

MILAN, Sept 19, (AP): Milan designers dipped into neutrals and muted tones for next summer - reflecting both a conservative streak in troubled times and a move toward thoughtful production of garments that can anchor any wardrobe.

Boss revamped its trademark suiting with a more relaxed, even deconstructed, vibe that can take men and women from day to after hours. Antonio Marras created joyous silhouettes that hearkened to the 1950s, an era long depicted as fun and carefree. Even Roberto Cavalli opened with white, ivory and ecru cotton dresses before exploding, inevitably, into bright hues.

"For the first fashion week without Roberto, I wanted to involve Eva to celebrate through what I consider seven iconic pieces from the archives, involving the women who most represented Cavalli's glorious period," Puglisi said backstage. Cavalli died in April at

While paying homage to the Cavalli heritage, Puglisi's runway collection aimed to push the brand to a younger generation. He already has done significant outreach in that direction by dressing Taylor Swift during the Eras tour in an ever-shifting color combination of Cavalli bejeweled and sequined mini-skirts and bustier combos.

"Today's woman is not the woman of 25 years ago. She is very independent, she knows when she wants to be sexy and when she wants to be covered. Above all, she doesn't need the judgment of men,' Puglisi said.

Collection

The collection progressed from cotton and linen seaside dresses with cutouts and rope detailing and elaborate macrame weaves to slinky skirts and dresses in fiery sunset and volcano prints, finishing with bodyhugging gowns in bright hues or covered in crystals. Backstage, Eva Cavalli praised Puglisi for his

"great work to continue our legacy." German-born Milan-based designer Daniel Del

Core launched his first all ready-to-wear collection, but he left room for one couture piece, modeled by Naomi Campbell.

Del Core, a Gucci alum who launched his brand during the pandemic, said he had been exchanging Instagram messages with the supermodel, when she said she wanted to wear his creations

"I thought it was a joke," Del Core said backstage. But there she was, closing the show in a white gown with a satin bustier, long skirt trailing.

The ready-to-wear collection was inspired by women scientists who in turn take inspiration from female writers, smart women who want to be smart dressers. Del Core created for her a translucent lab coat that was reinterpreted throughout the collection, paired with protective shoe coverings, and latex gloves in bubblegum pink or bright blue against otherwise soft

Eveningwear had some couture touches, like pleating that framed the neckline and anchored draping sleeves. Del Core said he will break out couture with a presentation in Paris in January.

Boss designer Marco Falcioni is sending a message to the fashion universe: Get out of the office.

LOS ANGELES: John David "JD" Souther, a prolific songwriter and musician who helped shape the country-rock sound that took root in Southern California in the 1970s with his collaborations with the Eagles and Linda Ronstadt, has died at the age of 78.

Souther, who collaborated on some of the Eagles' biggest hits, such as "Best of My Love," "James Dean," "New Kid in Town," and "Heartache Tonight," died Tuesday at his home in **New Mexico**. according to an announcement on his

He also worked with James Taylor, Bob Seger, Bonnie Raitt and many more, and also found success as a solo artist. He was about to start a tour with Karla Bonoff on Sept. 24 in Phoenix, now

When he was inducted into the Songwriters Hall of Fame in 2013, Souther was described as "a principal architect of the Southern California sound and a major influence on a generation of songwrit-ers." He was also at the heart of the social scene, his girlfriends including Ronstadt, Joni Mitchell and Stevie Nicks, who in a 1982 interview with High Times magazine remembered him as "very, very, very male chauvinistic and very sweet and cute and wonderful but very Texas.'

Souther was born in **Detroit** and grew up in Amarillo, Texas. He moved to Los Angeles in the late 1960s, where he met fellow Michigan native Glenn Frey, a founding member and guitarist of the Eagles. The two began a longtime partnership, starting with a band called Longbranch Pennywhistle. Frey would credit Souther with introducing him to country

"Our first year together will always seem like yesterday to me," Souther said in a statement after Frey died in 2016. "His amazing capacity for the big joke and that brilliant groove that lived inside him are with me, even now, in this loss and sorrow. ... The music and the love are indestruct-

Souther was so close to the Eagles, he even appeared on the back cover of their 1973 album, "Desperado," with Souther and others reenacting the capture of the legendary Dalton Gang. He described his start with Frey at The Troubadaour, the popular West Hollywood music club, as "the best study in songwriting I can imagine.'

Show brings new musical magic

Hahn returns as Agatha in new quest

LOS ANGELES, Sept 19, (AP): As she reprises her role as the witch everyone loves to hate, Kathryn Hahn says it "makes total sense" she's continuing

The "Agatha All Along" star, who first introduced Agatha Harkness to the world in the hit 2021 Marvel series "WandaVision," said the rich complexity of her character excites her.

"It's so juicy. You can see her as a simple bad witch, but she's not. No one is bad," Hahn said in a recent interview with The Associated Press. "There's always something that they're covering up that they put all these levels on top of, so the fun was trying to keep the mask on with all these meteors of truth banging at that core.

The Marvel Television series, which premiered Wednesday on Disney+, picks up after "WandaVision" as Agatha forms a makeshift coven to travel down the mythical Witches' Road on a quest to regain her powers. Although Elizabeth Olsen's Wanda Maximoff/ Scarlet Witch captured Agatha's magic in "WandaVision," Hahn said she has felt empowered by the role.

A symbol that has become a crucial part of her character is the Neopagan triple goddess - the maiden, mother and crone as depicted on a brooch Agatha wears in both shows. Hahn says those symbols of transformation in the female life cycle have been reflected in her own life.

"I did feel, walking into this, like I was going to be walking through a portal into my crone area, whatever that means, and it did feel very powerful to feel wise while walking through this journey as a woman," Hahn said.

Beyond references to Neopaganism, Wiccan culture and other witchy motifs, "Agatha All Along" is ripe with allusions. Several films, television shows, musical groups and more permeate the show's otherwise spooky aesthetic, but none appear more prominently than "The Wizard of Oz."

Jac Schaeffer, the series' head writer, director and executive producer who also created and wrote "Wanda-Vision," said the 1939 film felt like a natural touchstone. "We're in the land of witches," she said.

"Early on, it was clear that it needed to be a quest structure. And for me, the movies of my childhood that I love so much are all quests," Schaeffer said.
"Once we were sort of locked into that as the structure, it was like, 'How many allusions can we bring in and what makes sense and what's delightful, what's witchy enough for us?

Allusions

Schaeffer said the series also alludes to Fleetwood Mac, Kate Winslet in the gritty crime drama "Mare of Easttown" and "Big Little Lies," which she described as a "prestige lady drama soap" where everyone has "sweaters and good hair." She also said the group on that show, led by Reese Witherspoon and Nicole Kidman, are a coven in their own right.

The references work because Agatha is "such a performer," Hahn said - and perform she does. In addition to borrowing from "WandaVision's" propensity for allusions and replicating aesthetics, "Agatha All Along" also features another catchy tune the cast sings throughout the series.

Hahn, along with the ensemble cast including Patti LuPone, Aubrey Plaza, Joe Locke, Sasheer Zamata, Ali Ahn and Debra Jo Rupp, sing a memorable song that opens a door to The Witches' Road. Emmy-winning songwriting duo Kristen Anderson-Lopez and Robert Lopez, who also wrote the viral sensation "Agatha All Along" song for "WandaVision," penned the tune.

Although some cast members said they were initially nervous to sing in front of LuPone, a Broadway legend, the three-time Tony winner insisted everyone in the cast could sing and blend their voices well.

"It's magical to be in a chorus. Sometimes, the fates just align. Each member of this coven did have to pick up instruments or we did have to sing, and it all sounds great," LuPone said. "Sometimes, things are fated. I think this was fated.'

The tight-knit bonds of the onscreen coven seem to have transcended off camera, as well. Hahn said the group developed a close bond during the shoot in Atlanta.

'Everybody is such a such a powerhouse in their own right that it was very easy to come to work. Everyone stepped up because we were all so excited to be working with each other," Hahn said. "We were just sitting in a circle on the stage every day, just telling stories and talking about what food we're going to eat next. It just became a dream."

As the cast and creatives behind the series wait for its two-episode premiere, Schaeffer said she is holding her breath while eagle-eyed fans dissect trailers and theorize about the plot. Although she once thought "WandaVision" would be a "huge flop," Schaeffer said she feels confident in the show.

"What 'WandaVision' taught me is it all kind of shakes out," she said. "Not everyone will be satisfied, but the majority of people, I think what they really want is the ride and I feel confident that's what we're providing with 'Agatha.

Air pollution tied to over 4.2 million deaths annually

Robots, Al could offer solutions for clean environments

Many human activities release pollutants into the air, water and soil. These harmful chemicals threaten the health of both people and the ecosystem. According to the World Health Organization, air pollution causes an estimated 4.2 million deaths annually.

Scientists are looking into solutions, and one potential avenue is a class of materials called photocatalysts. When triggered by light, these materials undergo chemical reactions that initial studies have shown can break down common toxic pollutants.

I am a materials science and engineering researcher at the University of Tennessee. With the help of robots and artificial intelligence, my colleagues and I are making and testing new photocatalysts with the goal of mitigating air pollution.

The photocatalysts work by generating charged carriers in the presence of light. These charged carriers are tiny particles that can move around and cause chemical reactions. When they come into contact with water and oxygen in the environment, they produce substances called reactive oxygen species. These highly active reactive oxygen species can bond to parts of the pollutants and then either decompose the pollutants or turn them into harmless - or even useful - products.

But some materials used in the photocatalytic process have limitations. For example, they can't start the reaction unless the light has enough energy - infrared rays with lower energy light, or visible light, won't trigger the reaction.

Another problem is that the charged particles involved in the reaction can recombine too quickly, which means they join back together before finishing the job. In these cases, the pollutants either do not decompose completely or the process takes a long time to accomplish.

Additionally, the surface of these photocatalysts can sometimes change during or after the photocatalytic reaction, which affects how they work and how efficient they are.

To overcome these limitations, scientists on my team are trying to develop new photocatalytic materials that work efficiently to break down pollutants. We also focus on making sure these materials are nontoxic so that our pollution-cleaning materials aren't causing further pollution.

Photocatalyst

Scientists on my team use automated experimentation and artificial intelligence to figure out which photocatalytic materials could be the best candidates to quickly break down pollutants. We're making and testing materials called hybrid perovskites, which are tiny crystals - they're about a 10th the thickness of a strand of hair.

These nanocrystals are made of a blend of organic (carbon-based) and inorganic (non-carbon-based) components.

They have a few unique qualities, like their excellent light-absorbing properties, which come from how they're structured at the atomic level. They're tiny, but mighty. Optically, they're amazing too - they interact with light in fascinating

ways to generate a large number of tiny charge carriers and trigger photocatalytic reactions.

These materials efficiently transport electrical charges, which allows them to transport light energy and drive the chemical reactions. They're also used to make solar panels more efficient and in LED lights, which create the vibrant displays you see on TV screens.

There are thousands of potential types of hybrid nanocrystals. So, my team wanted to figure out how to make and test as many as we can quickly, to see which are the best candidates for cleaning up toxic pollutants.

Instead of making and testing samples by hand - which takes weeks or months - we're using smart robots, which can produce and test at least 100 different materials within an hour. These small liquid-handling robots can precisely move, mix and transfer tiny amounts of liquid from one place to another. They're controlled by a computer that guides their acceleration and accuracy.

We also use machine learning to guide this process. Machine learning algorithms can analyze test data quickly and then learn from that data for the next set of experiments executed by the robots. These machine learning algorithms can quickly identify patterns and insights in collected data that would normally take much longer for a human eye to catch

much longer for a human eye to catch.

Our approach aims to simplify and better understand complex photocatalytic systems, helping to create new strategies and materials. By using automated experimentation guided by machine learning, we can now make these systems easier to analyze and interpret, overcoming challenges that were difficult with traditional matheds.

'BeiDou-3' launched

China unveils world's first multi-modal LLM AI device

BEIJING, Sept 19, (Xinhua): A geographic sciences multi-modal Large Language Model (LLM), the first of its kind in the world, was unveiled in Beijing on Thursday. It could support the integration of geography and artificial intelligence and help accelerate geographical discoveries.

The model, named Sigma Geography, was developed by a team of researchers from the Institute of Geographic Sciences and Natural Resources Research (IGSNRR), the Institute of Tibetan Plateau Research and the Institute of Automation, all under the Chinese Academy of Sciences, and other organizations.

Sigma Geography can answer professional geographical questions, analyze geographical articles, undertake querying and in-depth analysis of geographical data and draw thematic maps, said Su Fenzhen, deputy director of IGSNRR.

Compared to general LLMs, Sigma Geography has a deeper understanding of the language patterns, domain-specific terminology and professional knowledge in the field of geography, enabling it to better handle specialized issues, Su said.

In addition to answering geographical questions, Sigma Geography can also match the generated textual answers with geographical landscape photos, thematic maps or schematic charts to help users understand the textual answers in a more visual and imaginative way, he added

imaginative way, he added.

The research assistant function developed by the team, based on Sigma Geography, can complete processes such as concept understanding, data acquisition, information analysis and mapping according to user instructions, and ultimately generate professional geographic charts that users

The model could help broaden the general public's understanding of geographic sciences, and support academic research and studies to uncover major geographic scientific discoveries.

So far, Sigma Geography has been cited by over 10 papers published in academic journals such as sub-journals of Nature, The Innovation, and Earth's Future.

The team will continue to upgrade Sigma Geography, aiming to enable it to comprehend maps, and create a platform to facilitate scientists and research teams to collaborate through the sharing of data, models and research ideas.

Experts discover 'black hole' jets

NEW YORK, Sept 19, (AP): Scientists have discovered the longest pair of jets streaming from a black hole in a distant galaxy.

The jets shooting hot plasma are the largest ever spotted - about as long as 140 Milky Way galaxies lined up end-to-end.

"This one has managed to reach a size that's so big," said Eileen Meyer, who studies black holes at University of Maryland, Baltimore County and who was not involved in the study.

The discovery, made using images from a European radio telescope, was reported Wednesday in the journal Nature.

Black holes eat most space debris

that falls their way. Sometimes, heatedup plasma makes a narrow escape by spewing out in thin, high-energy jets. The jets can break apart soon after their creation, jostled by space turbulence or starved in the absence of new

matter. But jets from supermassive black holes can become supersized. The latest combined jets from a faraway supermassive black hole are around 23 million light-years long. That's about 7 million light-years

longer than the previous recordholder. A light-year is 5.8 trillion miles.

Study co-author Martijn Oei said researchers weren't expecting to find long black hole jets so early in the universe's history. The jets date back to when the universe was less than half

KAMITUGA, Congo, Sept 19, (AP): Slumped on the ground over a mound of dirt, Divine Wisoba pulled weeds from her daughter's grave. The 1-month-old died from mpox in eastern Congo in August, but Wisoba, 21, was too traumatized to attend the fu-

In her first visit to the cemetery, she wept into her shirt for the child she lost and worried about the rest of her family. "When she was born, it was as if God had answered our prayers - we wanted a girl," Wisoba said of little Maombi Katengey. "But our biggest joy was transformed into devastation."

Her daughter is one of more than 6,000 people officials suspect have contracted the disease in South Kivu province, the epicenter of the world's latest mpox outbreak, in what the World Health Organization has labeled a global health emergency. A new strain of the virus is spreading, largely through skin-to-skin contact, including but not limited to sex. A lack of funds, vaccines and information is making it difficult to stem the spread, according to alarmed disease experts.

Outbreak

Mpox - which causes mostly mild symptoms like fever and body aches, but can trigger serious cases with prominent blisters on the face, hands, chest and genitals - had been spreading mostly undetected for years in Africa, until a 2022 outbreak reached more than 70 countries. Globally, gay and bisexual men made up the vast majority of cases in that outbreak. But officials note mpox has long disproportionately affected children in Africa, and they say cases are now rising sharply among kids, pregnant women and other vulnerable groups, with many types of close contact responsible for the spread.

Health officials have zeroed in on Kamituga, a remote yet bustling gold mining town of some 300,000 people that attracts miners, sex workers and traders who are constantly on the move. Cases from other parts of eastern Congo can be traced back here, officials say, with the first originating in the nightclub scene.

Since this outbreak began, one year ago, nearly 1,000 people in Kamituga have been infected. Eight have died,

Virus harmless to humans

Norwary reports first case of 'bluetongue' since 2009

AAS, Norway, Sept 19, (Agencies): Norway reported Thursday dozens of confirmed and suspected cases of bluetongue, an insect-borne virus that is harmless to humans but can be fatal to sheep and other livestock, for the first time in the country since 2009.

The Norwegian Veterinary Institute said the virus known as bluetongue serotype 3, or BTV-3, was first detected in livestock in southern Norway on Sept. 6.

The institute said the cases followed outbreaks of bluetongue in several European countries. Cases have also recently been reported in Sweden, Denmark, Germany, the Netherlands and France. The disease is spread by

half of them children.

Last month, the World Health Organization said mpox outbreaks might be stopped in the next six months, with governments' leadership and coopera-

midges and ticks that are typically found in warmer weather.

In Sweden, cases were reported this week along the country's west coast, and earlier this month, several cases in Denmark prompted zoos and animal parks to protectively vaccinate animals to try and contain the spread. The first case in Denmark was recorded in early August, on a Danish farm with sheep and cows near the German border.

Symptoms in animals include high fever, mouth ulcers and swelling of the face and tongue, as well as a blue color of the tongue, known as cyanosis, stemming from a lack of oxygen. Sheep, cattle and goats may also have breathing difficulties.

But in Kamituga, people say they face a starkly different reality.

There's a daily average of five new cases at the general hospital, which

Even that's likely an underestimate, they say, because of a lack of access to rural areas, the inability of many residents to seek care, and Kamituga's transient nature.

Locals say they simply don't have enough information about mpox.

Before her daughter got sick, Wisoba said, she was infected herself but didn't know it.

Painful lesions emerged around her genitals, making walking difficult. She thought she had a common sexually transmitted infection and sought medicine at a pharmacy. Days later, she went to the hospital with her newborn and was diagnosed with mpox. She recovered, but her daughter developed lesions on her foot.

Nearly a week later, Maombi died at the same hospital that treated her mother.

Wisoba said she didn't know about mpox until she got it. She wants the government to invest more in teaching people protective measures.

L'ocal officials can't reach areas more than a few miles outside Kamituga to track suspected cases or inform residents. They broadcast radio messages but say that doesn't reach far enough.

DAKAR, Senegal: The global vaccine alliance Gavi will buy 500,000 doses of mpox vaccine to battle outbreaks of the disease in African countries, the organization said on Wednesday.

The vaccine doses - manufactured by the Danish company Bavarian Nordic - will be available this year, Gavi said, without giving any specific dates.

Gavi said the full costs, including the transportation, delivery and administration of the doses, amounting to \$50 million, would be covered by the group's First Response Fund, a new financial mechanism created in June 2024

Since the beginning of the year, there have been over 25,000 confirmed mpox cases and 723 related deaths, the vast majority in **Congo**, and the World Health Organization declared it a global health emergency.

Englishman takes on Dubois

Joshua bids to emulate Ali as 3-time world champion

LONDON, Sept 19, (AP): Muhammad Ali. Evander Holyfield. Lennox Lewis.

Three boxers from an elite club of heavyweight greats to have been threetime world champions.

Anthony Joshua can put his name on that exclusive list by disposing of a British rival who sees himself as the future of the sport's marquee category.

He can do it on quite the stage, too. Joshua, a darling of British boxing ever since winning Olympic gold at the London Games in 2012, is looking to complete his late-career rebuild by beating Daniel Dubois to reclaim the IBF belt in front of around 96,000 fans at Wembley Stadium in London on Saturday.

BOXING

It is one of the biggest crowds for any British sporting event - and that's something Joshua is used to after selling out the UK's biggest stadia for years. Indeed, it was at Wembley where he produced his greatest performance in defeating Wladimir Klitschko in epic fashion in 2017 to become a two-belt world champ.

As for the 27-year-old Dul somewhat accidental world champion after taking the IBF crown vacated by Oleksandr Usyk, this is fairly new territory. It's his first title defense and second world championship fight -Joshua has had 12 of them, of which 10 have been for unified titles - as he looks to establish his name atop the heavyweight scene.

A win for Dubois (21-2, with 20 KOs) and it will be seen as a definitive changing of the guard. The pretender will then be the big man in town, with huge riches in the offing in potential future fights against Usyk or Tyson Fury, who meet in a rematch on Dec. 21 in Saudi Arabia for Usyk's WBA, WBC and IBO heavyweight belts.

For Joshua (28-3, with 25 KOs), it would mean climbing the mountain once again - or even hanging up his gloves.

"I've been to the well," Joshua said. "Dan's fighting someone who is willing to die in there." The 34-year-old from Watford, just outside London, faced a career reset after losing backto-back fights against Usyk, soon after his first pro defeat - a shocker to Andy Ruiz Jr. in 2019. Joshua got rid of his long-time train-

er, set up camps in the U.S. instead of England, and tried to change his strategy. He had lost twice to Usyk, a smaller man, and it made him realize boxing is as much about skill and ring craft as power and brutality. The rebuild has seen him win four

straight fights - against Jermaine Franklin, Robert Helenius, Otto Wallin and then former UFC champion Francis Ngannou - and each performance has been better than the last.

His devastating punching power is still there, too. Just ask Ngannou, who was knocked out cold in the second round with an unblocked right hand. Ouestions are still being asked of

Joshua, however. Does he belong back in the first tier of the heavyweights? Will that long-awaited fight with Fury - trailed for almost a decade now - ever happen? "Everything I've done in the past, we have to draw a line (through) because I can't take that with me on Saturday night," Joshua said. "In that moment, that's all that matters.' Dubois, nicknamed "Dynamite," told The Associated Press this week he is looking to legitimize his status as the newest world heavyweight champion with what would be the biggest win of his career. He only gained the IBF belt in late-June after Usyk relinquished it, to no longer be undisputed champ.

"I need to show them on the night what I'm all about and then make the world respect me," Dubois told the AP, "and make them put some respect to my name." Joshua is a bigger puncher and Dubois' reputation might still be wounded after he took a knee and was counted out against another Brit. Joe Joyce, in 2020 for his first loss.

Dubois' loss to Usvk in Wroclaw. Poland, is his only experience of bigtime boxing and he said it made him grow "from a boy to a man." Joshua made that leap a long time ago and quickly became a national treasure. unbeaten for his first six years as a pro - three of them as a world champion and establish an aura of invincibility.

After a chastening few years, he can reach those heights again on Saturday when the challenger, unusually, will start as the favorite.

Ashwin & Jadeja dig India out of trouble against Bangladesh

Host reaches 339-6 in 80 overs

CHENNAI, India, Sept 19, (AP): Ravichandran Ashwin scored his sixth test hundred as he and Ravindra Jadeja dug India's cricketers out of trouble against Bangladesh on day one of the first test on Thursday.

Ashwin hit 102 not out in 112 balls - his second test century on his home ground in Chennai - as the home team reached 339-6 in 80 overs.

He put on an unbeaten 195run stand with Jadeja for the seventh wicket - the highest for India against Bangladesh - to rescue the team from a precarious 144-6.

Jadeja finished the day unbeaten on 86 off 117 balls.

Ashwin said: "It is always a special feeling to score in front of the home crowd. It is a ground I've completely loved to play cricket in. I played a domestic T20 tournament here earlier and have been working on my batting. The bounce was good and at times I was trying to hit the ball hard."

Paceman Hasan Mahmud was the chief destroyer as Bangladesh reduced India to 88-3 in the morn-

He played in four other matches after that, every time coming off the bench.

Endrick, who a few days ago announced he got married, was only 16 when he was sold to Madrid by Brazilian club Palmeiras for more than 40 million euros (about \$45 million), plus add-ons, in 2022, but had to wait until he turned 18 before he could start playing for the team. League leader Barcelona will try to extend its perfect record to 6-0 when it visits fourth-place Villarreal on Sunday. Villarreal is one of three teams four points behind the Catalan club, along with Madrid and Atletico Madrid. Atletico visits Rayo Vallecano on Sunday.

PSG scores late to beat Girona

GENEVA, Sept 19, (AP): Where did all the goals go? The 0-0 draws between **Manchester City and Inter** Milan in their rematch of the 2023 final, after Bologna and Shakhtar Donetsk also could not find a goal, capped an untypically goalshy evening for the Champions League.

Just 13 were scored in six games one day after 28 were fired, including nine by Bayern Munich alone.

How unusual was this? Two 0-0 draws after just 12 of 144 games to be played in the new league phase is already halfway to the total of four in 96 games one year ago in the groupstage format that is now abolished. The entire competition averaged three goals per game last season.

Paris Saint-Germain and Girona also were heading for a blank until a horrible 90th-minute error by the Spanish debutant's goalkeeper, Paulo Gazzaniga - spilling a cross by Nuno Mendes through his own legs - gifted a 1-0 win.

"We won't get to where we want to overnight," Girona coach Míchel said. "It requires hard work." Borussia Dortmund needed late goals from substitutes Jamie Gittens, twice, and Serhou Guirassy with a stoppage-time penalty to win 3-0 at Club Brugge.

The new format has welcomed new faces and long-absent friends in European soccer's marquee competition.

Sparta Prague rose to the challenge of its first game for 19 years at this stage of the Champions League by

beating Salzburg 3-0.

Bologna waited 60 years to return and deserved more for its attacking ambition against Champions League veteran Shakhtar. The Ukrainian champion had a penalty saved in the fourth minute by Bologna goalkeeper Lukasz Skorupski.

Slovan Bratislava was overmatched in its first game since 1992-93, the first season of the Champions League rebrand from the old European Cup, and with Georgia defender Guram Kashia making his competition debut at age 37.

They could not keep out Celtic, which won 5-1 in Glasgow. Ireland internationals Liam Scales and Adam Idah, Japan forwards Kyogo Furuhashi and Daizen Maeda, and Arne Engels of Belgium scored for the champion of Scotland.

"The quality of the goals was sensational," Celtic coach Brendan Rodgers said after just a fourth win in 33 Champions League games for the 1967 European Cup winner.

Six games on each of three straight nights are launching the new format. Now, 36 teams each play eight different opponents through January and are ranked in a single league table to decide which teams advance to the knockout phase.

There was nothing to separate the champions of England and Italy, 15 months after Man City beat Inter 1-0 in Istanbul to lift the European Cup trophy for the first time.

Ilkay Gundogan wasted two late chances for manager Pep Guardiola's team, failing to convert two headed

It was the first time City had failed to score at home in Europe's elite tournament since being held 0-0 by Sporting Lisbon in March 2022, and just the second time at home in all competitions since then. The other was a 0-0 draw with Arsenal in the Premier League in March.

But the result saw City extend its six-year unbeaten home run in European games to 32, dating to a 2-1 loss to Lyon.

"I'm pleased with our performance, I liked everything," Guardiola said.

Dortmund's defense had a Champions League-best six clean sheets last

season on its way to the final, where Real Madrid found two late goals to take the title. Somehow, goalkeeper Gregor Kobel kept out Brugge despite 18 goal attempts including a close-range shot by

Hugo Vetlesen that rattled the cross bar

in the 12th minute. Vetlesen's effort ended a manic series of four shots in a matter of seconds from a corner including a diving save by Kobel. The Switzerland 'keeper's five saves meant Dortmund did not pay for its own wastefulness in front of goal until taking the lead in the 76th from a Gittens shot that deflected off two defend-

let into the Brugge net. Few clubs will play more international games this season than Salzburg, under its new coach Pep Lijnders, the former long-time assistant to Jürgen Klopp at Liverpool.
