1,647 face revocation of Kuwaiti nationality

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 21, (Agencies): The Supreme Committee on Kuwaiti citizenship announced on Thursday the revocation of citizenship for 1,647 individuals, with the matter now referred to the Cabinet for final approval. This decision came during a meeting chaired by Acting Prime Minister, Minister of Defense and Minister of Interior Sheikh Fahad Yousef Saud Al-Sabah.

Recent statistics reveal that over 1,800 individuals whose citizenship was revoked had previously received the KD30,000 construction subsidy, typically granted to housing plot owners. Authorities are currently determining the number of those who received housing loans of up to KD70,000 from Kuwait Credit Bank (KCB).

The Public Authority for Civil Information (PACI) disclosed that as of mid-2024; a total of 97,622 expatriates fall under the abovementioned category.

The newspaper obtained a copy of the statistics released by PACI, indicating that the number of expatriate university degree holders reached 143,488; while 6,561 are postgraduate degree holders (Master's and PhD); 82,258 are illiterate; 175,672 have elementary certificates and those with intermediate level reached 632,017.

The same statistics reavealed that 795,349 expatriates are classified as unspecified; while those with high school certificate totaled 248,697 and those with diploma reached 79,902.

In addition, the total number of expatriates in the country has reached 3,358,654.

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 21: In a detailed report released by the Central Bank of Kuwait, several key financial indicators revealed a mixed performance in October 2024, marking incremental changes in the country's financial landscape.

The broad money supply (M2) saw a modest increase of 0.2 percent in October, rising to 40.5 billion dinars (approximately \$133.6 billion).

This slight increase was largely attributed to growth in the private sector deposits within local banks. Specifically, deposits in Kuwaiti dinars rose by 0.1 percent, reaching 37 billion dinars (about \$122 billion).

On the other hand, private sector deposits in foreign currencies saw a more substantial rise, increasing by 1.6 percent to reach 1.9 billion dinars (ap-

În terms of credit facilities, which include loans for both residents and nonresidents, there was a 1 percent increase in the balances of new credit facilities, bringing the total to 56.373 billion dinars by the end of October, compared to 55.827 billion dinars at the end of September. This growth highlights a continued demand for financing in the local economy.

Kuwait pressed to speed up 39 key laws for 'Vision 2035' development

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 21: In a pressing appeal to accelerate Kuwait's developmental progress, the 2023-2024 Annual Plan Follow-Up Report has spotlighted a backlog of 39 legislative requirements that remain in preparation.

These laws are deemed vital to laying the groundwork for achieving Kuwait's ambitious "New Kuwait 2035" vision, a comprehensive plan to position the nation as a global financial and commercial hub.

The report, issued by the General Secretariat of the Supreme Council for Planning and Development, emphasizes that creating a supportive legislative environment is an "urgent necessity" to propel development

While the legislative program initially identified 64 draft laws, only 25 have been enacted thus far, leaving significant gaps.

The breakdown of the pending laws is as follows -- 21 laws are under review in the National Assembly; 4 laws are being deliberated within the Council of Ministers; 2 laws remain at the drafting and review phase with the Fatwa and Legislation Department and 12 laws are still in preliminary stages with the relevant

The report highlights the importance of expediting these legislations to support development programs across various sectors. These include initiatives aimed at fostering a private-sector-led economy and improving Kuwait's position in global indices, targeting a spot among the top 35 countries by 2035.

Some progress has been made in recent weeks. The Council of Ministers recently approved a draft decree on foreign residency and the Ministry of Interior announced the completion of a new traffic law draft, which has now been submitted for review. Both measures are part of the legislative program

aimed at enhancing governance and societal infrastruc-The legislative requirements are part of a broader

governance framework designed to ensure the success of the development plan.

By monitoring progress through structured systems, Kuwait aims to achieve tangible results aligned with its strategic policies and objectives.

As the clock ticks toward 2035, Kuwait faces mounting pressure to overcome legislative bottlenecks. The completion of these laws is seen as a cornerstone for unlocking the nation's potential and ensuring a prosperous future for its people.

Netanyahu & Hamas officials named in ICC arrest warrants

THE HAGUE, Nov 21, (AP): The International Criminal Court issued arrest warrants on Thursday for Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, his former defense minister and Hamas officials, accusing them of war crimes and crimes against humanity over the war in Gaza and the October 2023 attacks that triggered Israel's offensive in the Palestinian territory.

The decision turns Netanyahu and the others into internationally wanted

suspects and is likely to further isolate them and complicate efforts to negotiate a cease-fire to end the 13-month conflict. But its practical implications could be limited since Israel and its major ally, the United States, are not members of the court and several of the Hamas officials have been subsequently killed in the conflict.

Netanyahu and other Israeli leaders have condemned ICC Chief Prosecutor Karim Khan's request for warrants as disgraceful and antisemitic. U.S. President Joe Biden also blasted the prosecutor and expressed support for Israel's right to defend itself against Hamas. Hamas also slammed the re-

"The Chamber considered that there are reasonable grounds to believe that both individuals intentionally and knowingly deprived the civilian population in Gaza of objects indispensable to their survival, including food, water, and medicine and medical supplies, as well as fuel and electricity," the threejudge panel wrote in its unanimous decision to issue warrants for Netanyahu and his former defense minister, Yoav

Kuwait trip to help assess investment chances: King

LONDON, Nov 21, (KUNA): Kuwait's visit will be a great opportunity to assess the investment opportunities available and present the capabilities and expertise of the British capital, London, in sustainable finance, said the Lord Mayor of London, Alastair John Naisbitt King. During an interview with KUNA Wednesday, the Lord Mayor affirmed



that during his two-day visit to Kuwait starting next Tuesday, he would assess the completed investment projects and share with Kuwait the capabilities and expertise of the British capital, London, in sustainable finance. He pointed out that the investment

sectors available to British companies in Kuwait include four types of services: financial, legal, professional and marine, with expertise that he described as 'unparalleled in the world.'

"We can provide the services of British legal firms to prepare business operations in the GCC countries, in addition to the promising opportunities for them to benefit from asset management and banking services, as the efficiency of the level of services in these two sectors is ranked second in the world," he added.

He explained that the distinguished maritime services that the UK can provide are of international standards and include, for example, training and securing naval fleets, noting that the headquarters of the International Maritime Organization is located in London.

In response to a question about the need for fossil fuel products, Lord Alistair stressed that the British economy and others will need hydrocarbons for life and that investment in these sectors is needed to make them more efficient and reduce the amount of carbon they produce.

He stressed that the oil industry is very important, in addition to supporting an "incredible" number of highly skilled jobs and "will always be part of our economy", pointing out that there are major oil companies based in London.

On the other hand, the lord mayor highly valued the volime of Kuwaiti investments in the UK through the Public Investment Authority, represented by the Kuwait Investment Office in London, which was established 70 years

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 21: The Ministry of Health (MoH) has reaffirmed its commitment to implement the decisions of the Gulf Committee for Drug Pricing at the Gulf Health Council by striking a balance between supplying medications at affordable prices and assisting the local pharmaceutical sector.

In a press statement Thursday, the ministry stated that the Drug Pricing Committee periodically reduces the prices of medicines based on the studies conducted by the Drug Pricing Depart-

ment at the Drug Control Sector. The ministry explained that the main reason behind the drug price reductions is the expiration of the patent for innovative drugs, which causes them to drop by 30 to 80 percent, depending on the country and drug type; while the availability of non-innovative generic drugs and therapeutic alternatives in the local market increases competition and lowers

It stressed that the quest to reduce drug prices aims to meet the needs of citizens and expatriates for medicines at reasonable prices, ease the financial burdens of patients, and reduce medical costs for visitors to ensure that they obtain the necessary medicines at reasonable

It also disclosed that the process of setting drug prices takes into account a number of variables, such as expenditures on clinical trials, research and development, manufacturing, packaging, transportation, storage, and the use of technology in the industry. Therefore, it is feasible to create flexible pricing models, evaluate market data and enhance the supply chain, it added.

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 21: As part of the series of promotions that it has been doing over the past several months to pump fresh blood into middle positions, the Board of Directors of Kuwait Airways Corporation (KAC) -- headed by Abdul Mohsen Al-Faqan -- recently appointed Eng Ali Abu Al-Banat as Director of the Quality and Inspection Department in the Engineering Sector.

Sources confirmed that the Board of Directors, which assumed duties in September 2023, continues to intensify its activities in all work corridors at KAC through the promotions campaign that was launched at the end of the period of the decision to suspend transfers, secondments, promotions and appointments in the public sector. Sources said the Board of Directors is keen on putting the right person in the right middle and senior positions in order to develop the performance of the national carrier.

The newspaper inquired about the increase in the number of non-Kuwaiti employees in the corporation compared to citizens, according to the latest statistics issued by the Public Authority for Civil Information (PACI, which revealed that the number of national employees at the beginning of 2024 reached 1,119 --987 males and 132 females, while the number of non-Kuwaiti employees reached 4,492.

In response, sources confirmed that the Board of Directors has been fully aware of this difference; but it opted to focus first on organizing and screening positions through the promotions campaign, and then it will pump fresh blood through new appointments, in preparation for increasing the percentage of national employees.

Certain positions at KAC are not attractive for Kuwaitis, such as the simple jobs and those not suitable to their specializations, and they are replaced by appointing non-Kuwaitis under certain conditions. The upcoming series of appointments will include the highest number of Kuwaitis, as this is the goal of the Board of Directors, sources added.

Sources clarified the current board is not asking about increasing the number of non-Kuwaiti employees, but it is working hard to raise the Kuwaitization rate by prioritizing Kuwaitis in the appointments.

MoE starts using solar energy in its schools

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 21: As part of its efforts to achieve sustainable development and rationalize energy consumption, the Ministry of Education has started using solar energy in

Mudi Burjas Al-Sour Intermediate School for Girls has achieved technical and environmental advancements in this field to be a model for other schools in the country.

The Educational Facilities and Planning Sector at the ministry has completed the design and implementation of the Mudi Burjas Al-Sour Intermediate School for Girls project in Sabah Al-Nasser (Block Seven), affiliated with Farwaniya Educational District.

The project includes an integrated solar power station -- one of the most important sources of renewable energy used in the building. The station converts sunlight into electrical energy using photovoltaic panels, which contributes to reducing reliance on traditional energy sources and rationalizing electricity consumption.

The number of photovoltaic panels reached 474 and each panel has 660 watts power. The project includes electrical cables for continuously transmitting electrical energy from the panels to three inverter units with a capacity of 110 kilowatts each.

This is in addition to an automatic washing system designed to clean the solar panels regularly to ensure production efficiency. It operates by entering data that determine the appropriate days and times for cleaning; thereby, enhancing the overall performance of the system.

Merchants, craftsmen played equal role in building Kuwait

"A STATEMENT by a Kuwaiti merchant recently circulated on social media, claimed that 'Kuwait was founded by merchant families'. In response, economist Dr. Jamal Abdul Rahim provided an explanatory counterpoint, stating that 'Kuwait was built by craftsmen and seafarers'," columnist Prof. Dr. Bahija Behbehani wrote for Al-Qabas daily.

"Merchants were present in Iraq, Muhammarah and Bandar Abbas. Merchants

do not come to poor areas. They came to Kuwait only when Britain allowed them to.

"Most of them were not in Kuwait before 1920. I am preparing a book titled Homelands Under Captivity to document this history.
"While

individuals make valid points, it is important to clarify that both perspectives are complementary. Kuwait was built with the combined efforts of merchants' wealth and the skills of craftsmen.

"Merchants relied on the expertise of craftsmen to facilitate their trade with other countries, using ships, built by local shipbuilders known as gallaleefs, to bring essential goods such as food, wood and other commodities. "Shipbuilding, in particular, was a vi-

tal and renowned craft in Kuwait, playing a key role in the growth and prosperity of its economy. "In addition to shipbuilding, carpentry was another significant craft, as carpenters used wood imported by merchants

from India and Africa to produce essential items like doors, windows, yachts and pastel barriers. "Blacksmithing, cage-making, quilting, weaving, beading and other crafts were also important sources of livelihood

for Kuwaitis in the past. "The merchants also contributed significantly to the spread of education. They were instrumental in the establishment of Al-Mubarakiya School on December 22, 1911, which is regarded as the first regular school in Kuwait and the Gulf region.

'The school, named after Sheikh Mubarak Al-Sabah, was initially funded through donations from merchant citizens, as well as student registration fees.

"Before the discovery of oil, Kuwait's economy relied heavily on two main sources: fishing and pearl diving, both of which were supported by the merchants' trade networks and the use of ships and

"By 1765, Kuwait boasted around 800 boats engaged in pearl diving, solidifying its position as a crucial commercial and economic hub in the Arabian Gulf.

"The merchants' market in Kuwait City was the central marketplace, where basic goods such as dates, spices, rice, wheat, legumes and various grains were sold. It was also a marketplace for wholesale goods that were distributed to other merchants.

"Thus, Kuwait's development was a collaborative effort between both merchants and craftsmen, each contributing to the nation's growth and prosperity in equal measure.

not just concerning for those involved, but for the safety of the country as a whole. Undoubtedly, others may have entered the country under similar circumstances banned individuals slipping through

unnoticed.

"We urge the concerned authorities to handle this matter with utmost seriousness, since the report came from a credible security source and it is not fabricated. If a Kuwaiti is detained at the airport until they provide a fingerprint or is prevented from renewing their car registration due to traffic violations, how did these seven individuals manage to cross the borders without detection? How did they gain entry, while others are scrutinized rigorously?

"These questions remain unanswered: How did they enter the country? Who is responsible for allowing this to happen? We do not wish to jump to conclusions, but we hope the authorities will promptly announce the findings of their investigaessential for the public to know where the breakdown occurred -- whether the problem lies with the border protection authorities or elsewhere.

"It is deeply troubling to witness a situation where an expatriate, who is banned from leaving the country, is able to enter it with ease. This raises serious concerns about the safety and security of our nation. How can we feel secure in our own country when such lapses occur?

"This issue is far bigger than just an individual worker or a simple case of entry. The real problem lies within the internal mechanisms of our security system. We do not want to delve further into the specifics, but it is clear that something within our system needs to be addressed. This is a matter of national security, and it is critical that it be treated with the seriousness it deserves... Good."

"Without a doubt, the wheel of change has started turning, and citizens can feel this shift. The era of discontent has passed. We are now entering a new era of optimism and reform. Alhough the process may take time, the crucial point is that it has started," Major General **Faisal**

Al-Jazzaf wrote for Al-Seyassah daily.
"Kuwait has many problems, but with determination; we are beginning to ad-



dress them and toe the path of reform. The leadership has taken bold and decisive actions, setting us on the right path and there is no turning back.

"Yes, this journey will require effort and continuous monitoring, but it is necessary to turn Al-Jazzat the page on the

past. A new Kuwait will rise, God willing, and the citizen plays a vital role in this transformation. We all share the responsibility to promote positive change, and one of the simplest yet most significant actions is maintaining the cleanliness of our country.

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 22: The International Organization for Migration (IOM) - UN Migration agency in Kuwait, in collaboration with the Ministry of Interior (MoI), successfully conducted a comprehensive one-week training session titled 'The Role of Frontline Police Officers in Combatting Human Trafficking', which targeted officers from several departments, including residence affairs, airport security, traffic department, legal affairs, public relation and security media, coast guards, port security, criminal investigation and the Saad Al-Abdullah academy for security sciences. This initiative is part of an ongoing series of trainings aimed at strengthening efforts to combat human trafficking and enhance the skills

of law enforcement officers.

Some of the key topics covered during the training were 'Indicators for the identification of human trafficking cases', the 'National Anti-Human Trafficking Act' the 'International criminal law on Trafficking in Persons' and the 'National referral mechanism. By aligning their efforts with national and international laws participants gained a comprehensive understanding of the broader socio-economic factors that drive human trafficking. This approach underscores the importance of addressing the issue holistically to effectively combat this global challenge.

"Human trafficking is a complex global challenge that requires collaboration and a deep

understanding of both legal frameworks and practical identification strategies," said Mazen AboulHosn, the IOM Kuwait Chief of Mission. "This training empowered police officers with the necessary tools and knowledge to effectively combat this global phenomenon; the training is also aligned with the efforts of the State of Kuwait in the field of combating human trafficking including the work of the national committee on counter trafficking"

The collaboration between IOM Kuwait and the Ministry of Interior underscores the collective commitment to combatting human trafficking and protecting human rights and emphasize the longstanding partnership between the two institutions.

Jail & fine cancelled as court acquits royal in money-wash

No penalty for lending money on huge interest

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 21: The Court of Cassation acquitted a sheikh of laundering KD14,000; leading to the cancellation of the five-year imprisonment sentence and KD10,000 fine imposed on him; while it refrained from pronouncing his punishment on the charge of lending money with exorbitant interest on bail of KD1,000 and ordered him to sign a pledge of good conduct for one year.

The Public Prosecution had earlier charged the accused and another individual with money laundering KD14,400; knowing the money was obtained through the crime that is the subject of the charge in item one by lending money to the victims through a general trading and contracting company with an interest estimated at more than the loaned amount. They then deposited and transferred the money to the bank accounts indicated in the investigations, with the aim of concealing the illegal source.

The prosecution added they exploited the financial need of the victims and lent money with exorbitant interest, forcing the latter to pay the excessive interest.

Truck fire blocks traffic: Firefighters from Bairaq Fire Brigade doused the fire that broke out in a heavy equipment loaded with a crane on the Seventh Ring Road.

The firefighting team rushed to the site of the fire incident and extinguished the fire within a short period, then they removed the truck from the road. No injuries or casualties were reported.

Safety regulations: The Public Relations Department at Kuwait Municipality announced that the supervisory team at the Safety Department in the Ahmadi Governorate Municipality branch conducted an extensive field inspection to ensure that safety protocols are being implemented in investment and commercial properties.

The department reported that the team's inspections led to the issuance of 14 warnings for non-compliance with safety regulations, which were found to pose potential risks to public safety.

The Municipality urged property owners to promptly implement necessary safety measures and comply with local regulations, including the removal of construction debris by both contractors and property owners, to avoid legal consequences. The Safety Department's supervisory team emphasized that it will take strict legal action against any violations.

Al-Ajeel announces major overhaul of building material subsidy system

Ration card benefits halted for 4,000 over citizenship pull

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 21: Khalifa Al-Aieel, the Minister of Commerce and Industry, has announced Ministerial Resolution No. 222 of 2024, outlining new rules for the disbursement of subsidized building materials.

The resolution aims to optimize the use of public funds and better benefit citizens by providing greater flexibility in choosing materials

according to their construction needs.

This update marks the first major overhaul of the construction subsidy system since 2012. Unlike the previous system, which had fixed support with capped prices, the new framework introduces flexible pricing for materials while maintaining fixed support levels.

This adjustment will encourage competition among local suppliers and expand the variety of available products, introducing eight new materials into the support program such as air-conditioning support has increased from 5,000 dinars to 6,000 dinars and ready-mix concrete support has risen from 8,500 dinars to 9,000 dinars.

Moreover, the aluminum windows have been added to the list of subsidized materials with a support limit of 1,000 dinars.

An optional beneficiary option of 1,000 dinars for four products (sanitary sets, waterproof insulation, wires, and sigma) has been introduced, allowing citizens more choice in their subsidies.

The decision will take effect in one month, and the Undersecretary of the Ministry of Commerce and Industry has been authorized to approve adjustments based on market conditions or public interest.

Meanwhile, the Al-Rai reported that more than 1,800 individuals whose Kuwaiti citizenship were revoked had received the state's construction support of 30,000 dinars, intended for owners of residential plots.

The Ministry of Commerce and Industry is conducting an audit to identify which individuals have benefited from construction support and housing loans worth 70,000 dinars, provided by the Credit Bank.

The authorities are expected to take necessary measures, including halting or adjusting support payments for those whose citizenship was revoked before or after receiving aid.

In addition, the ministry has suspended the ration card benefits for about 4,000 beneficiaries, including their family members, due to the withdrawal of their nationalities.

This suspension is not limited to financial support but also includes traditional entitlements, such as food rations, affecting transactions across various state agencies and banks.

Samples of miserable times

Over the past two decades, or even over the past fifty years, Kuwait has gone through a phase

ness by all measures.

Multiple parties played roles in actions and decisions that turned out to be disastrous for all of us.

Many years of hard work lie ahead to undo the damage caused by that phase, with its flawed actions, decisions and the dozens of decrees granting citizenship

to countless individuals who were never worthy of the honor of belonging to this country.

For many decades, Kuwait was a haven for wealth creation for those who claimed virtue, piety, righteousness and a desire for reform.

Instead, they spread corruption across the nation, degraded moral values, harmed the faith and amassed vast sums of money for themselves, often to fund strange and misguided objectives.

Through my professional banking work, I encountered some individuals who managed to deceive tens of thousands of naive people.

They claimed to possess unconventional healing methods that others were unaware of. They wore long beards, kept their clothes short, frequently uttered religious phrases like "Bismillah" and "Hawqala," and carried prayer beads, among other outward signs.

One such individual was born in Kuwait to a Kuwaiti mother and was later granted citizenship under the "noble deeds" clause, often with the support of his group.

He understood from the very start that a regular job wouldn't make him rich and that a salary alone wasn't enough.

So, he turned to the practice of exorcism and Quranic healing. Unfortunately, during one of his sessions, a mentally ill citizen died under his care while he attempted to force out a "genie" from the person's body. He was sentenced to prison but, thanks to the influence of his powerful allies, he was pardoned.

Following this, he decided to reinvent himself as a cleric, despite having no formal education or training in the field, which highlights a flaw in government administration.

He quickly became a wellknown preacher and religious leader, working under the banner of charitable organizations, sharing a generous portion of the proceeds with those in charge of these institutions.

His fame grew after a controversial TV channel adopted him, crafting him into a "religious star." Subsequently, several so-called charitable organizations sought to exploit his fame to raise funds.

It's naive to believe that the millions he collected over the past three decades were used for their intended purpose. He wasn't foolish and easy, unmonitored money is an irresistible temptation, encouraging even the most dishonest individuals to take advantage of it.

During the Arab Spring, he became deeply involved in the politi-cal and social movements, contributing financially and militarily to fighters in Syria.

He aligned himself with the movement and insulted the Minister of the Interior at the time, growing increasingly brazen.

His citizenship was eventually revoked, but he sought refuge in a Gulf state and later in Turkey, where his investments in both Turkey and Bosnia allowed him to enjoy a luxurious life.

For the tenth time, luck intervened in his favor. With the help of his influential group, his citizenship was reinstated and he returned to his familiar game of collecting donations.

Finally, through various agencies and a small army of helpers, he offered to perform Umrah or Hajj on behalf of people unable to go, for a generous fee.

Despite being fully immersed in his "charitable" endeavors, he somehow manages to juggle a government job for which he receives a generous salary.

It's unclear how he manages to reconcile collecting donations through various associations with his roles as a therapist, preacher, imam, faculty member, director of dawah (Islamic outreach), trainer, family expert, journalist and supervisor of guidance centers across multiple countries.

This is just one example of the lowest point we've reached, but there are many others like him.

Red flags surface

Lawmakers concerned about background checks of Trump's Cabinet picks

WASHINGTON, Nov 21, (AP): As senators prepare to consider President-elect Donald Trump's picks for his Cabinet, they may be doing so without a well-established staple of the confirmation process: an FBI background

The Trump transition team has so far not signed the requisite agreements with the White House or the Justice Department to allow the FBI to screen his personnel choices, both for the process of obtaining security clearances and meeting the Senate's usual standards for nominations.

That means the Senate could be asked to vote on Trump's picks without the usual rigorous background checking meant to uncover personal problems, criminal histories or other red flags that would raise questions about a nominee's suitability for the job. There already are questions about problematic issues related to a number of the people Trump wants in his administration.

"There are very real liabilities on the security side if you don't get this right," said Dan Meyer, a Washington lawyer at the Tully Rinckey law firm who specializes in background checks, security clearances and federal employment law

At issue is a memorandum of understanding under which a president - or in this case, an incoming one - submits requests for name and background checks and the FBI commits to flagging to the White House any adverse information uncovered during the process.

But that document has not yet been signed, with the Trump transition team relying instead on internal campaign aides, allied groups and law firms on the outside to support the personnel effort. Trump for years has regarded FBI leadership with suspicion, in part because of the Russian election interference investigation that shadowed his first term and more recently because of FBI investigations into his hoarding of classified documents and his efforts to undo the results of the 2020 election that led to his indictment last year.

A Justice Department spokesperson said Wednesday that discussions were ongoing with the Trump transition team about signing the memo.

In a statement last week, the department said it was "committed to ensuring an orderly and effective transition" to the part administration

tion" to the next administration.

"We are prepared to deliver briefings to the transition team on our operations and responsibilities, and we stand ready to process requests for security clearances for those who will need access to national security information," the statement said.

For those appointees whose jobs involve a security clearance, a background check would be required. But once Trump takes office on Jan. 20, 2025, he could simply order that people be given a security clearance, as he was reported to have done for son-in-law Jared Kushner during his first term

Biden has become notably quiet after 2024 election and Democrats' loss

WASHINGTON, Nov 21, (AP): US President Joe Biden has been notably quiet since the Democrats' gut-wrenching defeat at the polls.

After warning voters for years that a Donald Trump win would be calamitous for American democracy, Biden has gone largely silent on his concerns about what lays ahead for America and he has yet to substantively reflect on why Democrats were decisively defeated up and down the ballot.

His only public discussion of the outcome of the election came in a roughly six-minute speech in the Rose Garden two days after the election, when he urged people to "see each other not as adversaries but as fellow Americans" and to "bring down the temperature." Since then, there's been hardly a public peep - including over the course of Biden's six-day visit to South America that concluded on Tuesday evening. His only public comments during the trip came during brief remarks before meetings with government officials and a climate-related speech during a visit to the Amazon.

At a delicate moment in the US - and for the world - Biden's silence may be leaving a vacuum. But his public reticence has also underscored a new reality: America and the rest of the world is already moving on.

"His race is over. His day is done," said David Axelrod, who served as a senior adviser in the Obama-Biden White House. "It's up to a new generation of leaders to chart the path forward, as I'm sure they will."

Edward Frantz, a historian at the University of Indianapolis, said Biden's relative silence in the aftermath of the Republican win is in some ways understandable. Still, he argued, there's good reason for Biden to be more active in trying to shape the narrative during his final months in

"The last time a president left office so irrelevant or rejected by the populace was Jimmy Carter," said Frantz, referring to the last one-term Democrat in the White House. "History has allowed for the great rehabilitation of Carter, in part, because of all he did in his post-presidency. At 82, I'm not sure Biden has the luxury of time. The longer he waits, the longer he can't find something to say, he risks ceding shaping his legacy at least in how he's seen in the near term."

Biden's allies say the president -- like Democrats writ large -- is privately processing the election defeat, stressing that it's barely been two weeks since Trump's win. Biden hasn't been vocally introspective about his role in the loss, and still has a lot to unpack, they said.

Biden, in his speech after the election, said: "Campaigns are contests of competing visions. The country chooses one or the other. We accept the choice the country made. I've said many times you can't love your country only when you win."

Biden's aides say the president's insistence on following electoral traditions - ensuring an orderly transition and inviting Trump to the White House - is especially important because Trump flouted them four years ago, when he actively tried to overturn the results of the election he lost and helped incite a mob that rioted at the U.S.

Russia launches intercontinental missile in an attack for first time in war: Ukraine

KYIV, Ukraine, Nov 21, (AP): Ukraine says Russia launched an intercontinental ballistic missile overnight targeting Dnipro city in the central-east of the country, which, if confirmed, would be the first time Moscow has used such a missile in the war.

In a statement Thursday on the Telegram messaging app, Ukraine's air force did not specify the exact type of missile, but said it was launched from Russia's Astrakhan region, which borders the Caspian Sea.

It said an intercontinental ballistic missile was fired at

It said an intercontinental ballistic missile was fired at Dnipro city along with eight other missiles, and that the Ukrainian military shot down six of them.

Two people were wounded as a result of the attack, and an industrial facility and a rehabilitation center for people with disabilities were damaged, according to local officials.

While the range of an ICBM would seem excessive for use against Ukraine, such missiles are designed to carry nuclear warheads, and the use of one would serve as a chilling reminder of Russia's nuclear capability and a powerful message of potential escalation.

The attack comes two days after Russian President Vladimir Putin signed a revised nuclear doctrine that formally lowers the threshold for the country's use of nuclear weapons. Ukraine on Tuesday fired several American-supplied longer-range missiles and reportedly fired U.K.-made Storm Shadows on Wednesday into Russia.

The Russian Defense Ministry said in a statement

Thursday that its air defense systems shot down two British-made Storm Shadow missiles, six HIMARS rockets, and 67 drones. The announcement came in the ministry's daily roundup regarding the military actions in Ukraine.

The statement didn't say when or where exactly it happened or what the missiles were targeting. This is not Moscow's first public announcement of the shooting down of Storm Shadow missiles, as Russia earlier reported downing some over the annexed Crimean Peninsula

The developments come as the war has taken on a growing international dimension with the arrival of North Korean troops to help Russia on the battlefield - a development that U.S. officials said prompted U.S. President Joe Biden's policy shift on allowing Ukraine to fire longer-range US missiles into Russia. The Kremlin responded with threats to escalate further.

Putin has previously warned the U.S. and other NATO allies that allowing Ukraine to use Western-supplied longer-range weapons to hit Russian territory would mean that Russia and NATO are at war.

And the new doctrine allows for a potential nuclear response by Moscow even to a conventional attack on Russia by any nation that is supported by a nuclear power.

While the doctrine envisions a possible nuclear response by Russia to a conventional strike, it is formulated broadly to avoid a firm commitment to use nuclear weapons and keep Putin's options open.

Serbia arrests 11: Eleven people have been arrested in Serbia in connection with a roof collapse earlier this month at a train station in the northern city of Novi Sad that killed 15 people and severely injured two others, prosecutors said Thursday.

The suspects, who have not been identified, face charges of committing criminal acts against public security, causing public danger and irregular construction work, the Higher Prosecutor's Office in Novi Sad said in a statement. They face up to 12 years in prison.

Serbian media reported that Goran Vesic, who resigned as construction minister after the collapse, was among those detained. Vesic said on X he came in voluntarily. (AP)

Czech to buy tanks: The Czech Defense Ministry said on Wednesday it plans to buy 14 Leopard 2A4 tanks from Germany in a \$167 million deal that's part of a major modernization of the country's military amid Russia's war against Ukraine.

The ministry said it hopes the deal, worth almost 4 billion Czech crowns or koruna, would be signed with Germany's Rheinmetall Landsysteme GmbH by the end of the year, with the tanks to be delivered by the

end of 2026.

Germany has already donated 28 Leopard 2A4 tanks to the Czechs in exchange for the weapons they gave to Ukraine. (AP)

'Working-class hero'

Former UK deputy prime minister Prescott dies

LONDON, Nov 21, (AP): British politician John Prescott, a pugnacious and personable former merchant seaman who rose to the post of deputy prime minister in Tony Blair's Labour government, has died at age 86.

Prescott's family announced his death on Thursday. They said the politician, who had been suffering from Alzheimer's disease, died in a care home on Wednesday "surrounded by the love of his family and the jazz music of Marian Montgomery."

The family said Prescott had "spent his life trying to improve the lives of others, fighting for social justice and protecting the environment."

For a decade, Prescott brought grit, humor and working-class authenticity to the government of the young, polished Blair, who became prime minister in 1997.

"He was one of the most talented

people I ever encountered in politics,

one of the most committed and loyal, and definitely the most unusual," Blair


An amateur boxer in his youth, Prescott had a defining moment when he punched a man who threw an egg at him during the 2001 general election.

Prescott helped ease the sometimes tense relationship between Blair and his Treasury chief, Gordon Brown, and acted as a bridge between the party's traditionalists and Blair's modernizing faction. Brown said he was key to keeping the party together after Blair's controversial decision to join the US-

led invasion of Iraq in 2003.

Brown, who succeeded Blair as prime minister, described Prescott as a true working-class hero.

"He wanted the good things in life for everyone and not just himself," Brown said. "And he showed that Britain can be a country where if you work hard you can fill your potential."

Volcano on Iceland's Reykjanes Peninsula erupts for seventh time in a year

GRINDAVIK, Iceland, Nov 21, (AP): A volcano on the Reykjanes Peninsula in southwestern Iceland has erupted for the seventh time since December.

The eruption started with little warning at 11:14 p.m. Wednesday and created a fissure around 3 kilometers (1.8 miles) long. The activity is estimated to be considerably smaller than the previous eruption in August, Iceland's meteorological office that monitors seismic activity said.

"In the big picture, this is a bit smaller than the last eruption, and the eruption that occurred in May," Magnús Tumi Guðmundsson, a professor of geophysics who flew over the scene with the Civil Protection agency to monitor the event,

told the national RUV broadcaster.

While the eruption poses no threat to air travel, authorities warned of gas emissions across parts of the peninsula, including the nearby town of Grindavík.

Around 50 houses were evacuated after the Civil Protection agency issued the alert, along with guests at the famous Blue Lagoon resort, according to RUV.

The repeated volcanic eruptions close to Grindavík, which is about 50 kilometers (30 miles) southwest of the capital, Reykjavík, and has a population of 3,800 people, have damaged infrastructure and property and forced many residents to relocate to guarantee their safety. "Grindavík is not in danger as it looks and it is unlikely that this crack will get any longer, although nothing can be ruled out," Magnús Tumi said.

Iceland, which sits above a volcanic hot spot in the North Atlantic, averages one eruption every four to five years. The most disruptive in recent times was the 2010 eruption of the Eyjafjallajokull volcano, which spewed clouds of ash into the atmosphere and disrupted trans-Atlantic air travel for months.

Begich beats Peltola: Republican Nick Begich has won Alaska's US House race, defeating Democratic Rep. Mary Peltola to claim the seat once held by his grandfather.

Begich was among the opponents Peltola defeated during her special and regular election wins in 2022, following the death of Republican Rep. Don Young. Young had held the seat for 49 years. Peltola, who is Yup'ik, was the first Alaska Native in Congress.

Republicans, seeking to maintain control of the House, eagerly sought to win back the seat. (AP)

'Dismiss conviction': A day after New York prosecutors said they will fight efforts to dismiss Donald Trump's hush money conviction, the president-elect's lawyers urged a judge to ignore them and dispose of the case before he takes office in January.

Echoing their arguments since Trump's win, his lawyers said in a letter Wednesday to Judge Juan M. Merchan that continuing with the case will interfere with Trump's preparations for returning to the White House and impede his ability to run the country.

The lawyers, Todd Blanche and Emil Bove, said they will file paperwork formalizing their dismissal request and asked Merchan for a deadline of Dec. 20, after Special Counsel Jack Smith's team is expected to disclose the next steps it intends to take in two federal cases against Trump. (AP)

Ties between countries strengthen

Brazil welcomes China's Xi for state visit

RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov 21, (AP): Brazilian President Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva on Wednesday welcomed China's President Xi Jinping for a state visit at the Alvorada Palace in Brasilia, the latest sign of deepening ties between the two countries that analysts say may accelerate as Donald Trump returns to the White House in 2025.

China overtook the US as Brazil's biggest export market in 2009. Since then, the links between the two nations have strengthened in trade and investment - and on Wednesday the two leaders signed 37 agreements in areas ranging from trade and tourism to agriculture, industry, science and technology, health, energy, culture and education.

That reflects a broader trend, experts said. Last week, Xi inaugurated a \$1.3 billion megaport in Peru, perhaps the clearest sign of Latin America's reorientation.

"Latin America has always been forgotten by the United States and the European Union. Who fills that void? China," said Flavia Loss, an international relations professor at Foundation School of Sociology and Politics in Sao Paulo.

"Donald Trump's election is already accelerating this proximity. We're clearly seeing it happening now, live," she added.

The state visit by the Chinese leader comes more than a year after Lula visited China seeking to strengthen ties and mend relations with its biggest trade partner after a rocky period under his predecessor, Jair Bolsonaro.

Bolsonaro's lawmaker son Eduardo blamed the COVID-19 pandemic on the Chinese Communist Party and referred to the giant Chinese technology company Huawei as "Chinese espionage," prompting sharp rebukes. During eight months in 2022, China did not have an ambassador in Brazil.


Lula has taken an opposite stance. Repairing relations with China is also part of his strategy to replace Brazil on the international scene after a period of isolation under Bolsonaro who showed little interest in global affairs.

In remarks to journalists on Wednesday, Lula said that what China and Brazil do together "reverberates around the world" highlighting the collaboration of both countries within the United Nations and BRICS group of developing nations.

Xi referred to China and Brazil as "reliable friends with a shared destiny and positive forces to promote peace."

From January to October 2024, trade between the countries amounted to \$136.3 billion, according to a Nov 13 statement from Brazil's presidential palace.

GEORGETOWN, Guyana, Nov 21, (Agencies): Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi said Wednesday he would share technology for combatting seaweed infestation with Caribbean nations, as he visited Guyana in the first such visit by an Indian leader in more than 50 years.

Guyana, a South American nation with many citizens of Indian origin, serves as headquarters for the 15-member Caribbean trade bloc known as Caricom, and Modi met with regional leaders Wednesday as part of the India-Caricom summit.

They last met in 2019.

Modi arrived with promises to help the region in areas including health, energy and agriculture. He also announced more than 1,000 scholarships over the next five years for trade bloc nations, mobile hospitals for rural areas and drug-testing laboratories as well as river and sea ferries for marine transport.

ries for marine transport.

But Caribbean leaders reserved their loudest applause when Modi announced that India had made tre-

mendous progress in converting large quantities of sargassum into fertilizer and other economic uses as he urged the region to take advantage of his offer.

"We are willing to share this with all the countries," he said, calling the seaweed invasion on beaches in the tourism-dependent region "a very big problem."

Modi also was thinking of home. Noting Guyana's growing impor-

tance as an oil-producing nation after vast quantities of oil and gas were discovered off its coast in 2015, he said: "Guyana will play an important role in India's energy security."

He added that his government also is

He added that his government also is willing to fully equip at least one government building in each of the trade bloc nations with a solar power system.

Speaking after meeting with Guyanese President Irfaan Ali, the

Guyanese President Irfaan Ali, the country's first Muslim leader, Modi promised to help Guyana and the region improve agriculture production, saying food security is important to island nations.

Trade between India and Guyana

has strengthened in recent years, with India providing Guyana lines of credit for military passenger planes and funding to buy a fast river ferry that services far-flung jungle areas close to neighboring Venezuela.

Modi also noted that indentured laborers from India were brought to Guyana during the British colonial era and now make a significant contribution to the country. Nearly 40% of the population is East Indian.

Modi's visit marks the first time an Indian prime minister has come to Guyana since Indira Gandhi in 1968.

Meanwhile, Nigeria and India on Sunday agreed to build a robust strategic partnership, pledging to strengthen ties in key areas including economic development, defense, healthcare, and food security.

During their meeting in Abuja, the capital of Nigeria, Nigerian President Bola Tinubu and Modi who was on a two-day state visit to the West African country, agreed to tighter collaboration in counterterrorism, maritime security, and intelligence sharing.

Southeast Asian defense chiefs discuss regional security with US, China, other partner nations

VIENTIANE, Laos, Nov 21, (AP): Southeast Asian defense chiefs met Thursday with China, the United States and other partner nations in Laos for security talks, which come as Beijing's increasingly assertive stance in its claim to most of the South China

Sea is leading to more confrontations.

The closed-door talks put US Secretary of Defense Lloyd Austin and Chinese Defense Minister Dong Jun in the same room a day after Dong refused a request to meet with Austin one-onone on the sidelines of the ASEAN Defense Ministers Meetings

Defense Ministers Meetings.

The U.S. and China have been working to improve frayed military-to-military communications and Austin said he regretted Dong's decision, call-

ing it "a setback for the whole region."

The ASEAN meetings come as member nations are looking warily toward the change in American administrations at a time of increasing maritime disputes with China. The U.S. has firmly pushed a "free and open Indo-Pacific" policy under outgoing President Joe Biden and it is not yet clear how the incoming administration

of President-elect Donald Trump will address the South China Sea situation.

In addition to the United States and

In addition to the United States and China, other nations attending the ASE-AN meeting from outside Southeast Asia include Japan, South Korea, India, Russia, Australia and New Zealand.

The meetings with the ASEAN dialogue partners were also expected address tensions in the Korean Peninsula, the Russia-Ukraine war, and wars in the Middle East.

Before heading to Laos, Austin concluded meetings in Australia with officials there and with Japan's defense minister. They pledged to support ASEAN and expressed their "serious concern about destabilizing actions in the East and South China Seas, including dangerous conduct by the People's Republic of China against Philippines

and other coastal state vessels."

Along with the Philippines, ASEAN members Vietnam, Malaysia and Brunei have competing claims with China in the South China Sea, which Beijing claims almost entirely as its own territory.

Indonesia, Thailand, Singapore, Myanmar, Cambodia and Laos are the other ASEAN members.

As China has grown more assertive in pushing its territorial claims in recent years, it and ASEAN have been negotiating a code of conduct to govern behavior in the sea, but progress has been slow.

Officials have agreed to try to complete the code by 2026, but talks have been hampered by thorny issues, including disagreements over whether the pact should be binding.

the pact should be binding.

Chinese and Philippine vessels have clashed repeatedly this year, and Vietnam in October charged that Chinese forces assaulted its fishermen in disputed areas in the South China Sea. China has also sent patrol vessels to areas that Indonesia and Malaysia claim

as their exclusive economic zones.

Another thorny regional issue is the civil war and humanitarian crisis in ASEAN member Myanmar. The group's credibility has been severely tested by the war in Myanmar, where the army ousted an elected government in 2021, and fighting has continued with pro-democracy guerillas and ethnic rebels.

1,500 migrants form new caravan in Mexico

About 1,500 migrants formed a new caravan Wednesday in southern Mexico, hoping to walk or catch rides to the U.S. border. The migrants are mainly from Central and South America. Some say they are hoping to reach the United States before Donald Trump's inauguration in January, saying they think it might be more difficult after that. They started out walking from the city of Tapachula, near the border with Guatemala, where thousands of migrants are stranded because they do not have permission to cross further into Mexico.

Migrant caravans began forming in 2018, and they became a final, desperate hope for poorer migrants who do not have the money to pay smugglers.

If migrants try to cross Mexico

alone or in small groups, they are often either detained by authorities and sent back to southern Mexico, or worse, deported back to their home countries.

In that sense, there is safety in

In that sense, there is safety in numbers: it is hard or impossible for immigration agents to detain groups of hundreds of migrants. (AP)

So police and immigration agents often try to pick off smaller groups, and wait for the main body of the caravan to tire itself out. Usually the caravans stop or fall apart within

150 miles (250 kilometers).

There is no safety in numbers, however, against threats, extortion or abduction by drug cartels in Mexico, which have become heavily involved in migrant trafficking.

Nicaragua's Ortega proposes reform to make him and his wife 'copresidents'

MEXICO CITY, Nov 21, (AP): Nicaragua's President Daniel Ortega on Wednesday proposed a constitutional reform that would officially make him and his wife, current Vice President Rosario Murillo, "copresidents" of the Central American nation.

While the initiative has to pass through the country's legislature, Ortega and Murillo's Sandinista party control the congress and all government institutions, so it is likely to be approved.

The proposal also looks to expand the presidential term to six years from five. Ortega put forward another bill Wednesday that would make it illegal for anyone to enforce sanctions from the United States or other foreign bodies "within Nicaraguan territory."

The Organization of American States general secretary's office condemned the proposed constitutional reforms Wednesday.

"The 'reform' document is illegitimate in form and content, it merely constitutes an aberrant form of institutionalization of the matrimonial dictatorship in the Central American country and is a definitive attack on the democratic rule of law," it said in a statement.

The proposals come amid an ongoing crackdown by the Ortega

government since mass social protests in 2018 that the government

Nicaragua's government has imprisoned adversaries, religious leaders, journalists and more, then exiled them, stripping hundreds of their Nicaraguan citizenship and possessions. Since 2018, it has shuttered more than 5,000 organizations, largely religious, and forced thousands to flee the

violently repressed.

Dissident groups including the Nicaraguan University Alliance quickly railed against the measures, calling them an extension of that clampdown.

"They are institutionalizing nepotism and repression, destroying the rule of law. Democracy faces its greatest threat," the organization wrote on the social media platform X on Wednesday.

Clean Energy and Green Hydrogen

Real estate deals reach \$191.8 mln in mid-Nov

Private sector leads with \$129.7m

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 21: According to the latest statistics from the Kuwaiti Ministry of Justice, the total value of real estate contracts registered during the period from November 10 to 14, 2024, amounted was 58.09 million dinars (approximately \$191.8 million).

The Ministry's Real Estate Registration and Documentation Department reported that 112 contracts were transacted across the six governorates of Kuwait.

The distribution of contracts during this period was as follows:

■ 86 private real estate contracts, with a total value of 39.50 million dinars (around \$129.7 million).

■ 23 investment property contracts, amounting to 15.79 million dinars (about \$51.9 million).

Additionally, specific sectors saw some notable transactions:

■ Two properties in the coastal sector, valued at 1.5 million million (around \$4.9 million)

■ One property in the craft sector, registered at 1.3 million dinars (about \$4.3 million).

However, no activity was recorded in sectors such as commercial, warehouse, exhibition, industrial, or banking properties during this period.

For comparison, from November 3 to 7, 2024, the total value of real estate contracts registered amounted to 83.15 million dinars (approximately \$273.6 million), indicating a significant uptick in transaction values.

Looking at a broader timeframe, a report by Finance House highlighted that real estate transactions in O3 2024 reached their highest level since mid-2022, with a total value of 940.9 million dinars (around \$3.1 billion).

This marked a 3.8 percent increase compared to the second quarter of 2024 and a 31.3 percent rise on an annual basis.

Boursa Kuwait ends Thursday with deficits across all indices

General index drops 0.46%

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 21, (KUNA): Boursa Kuwait ended Thursday's trading session with a decline across all its major indices. The General Index fell by 33.64 points (0.46%) to close at 7,319.32 points.

Market activity remained substantial, with 314.7 million shares traded through 19,759 transactions, totaling KD 67.4 million (approximately USD 205.5 million).

The Main Market Index experienced a more pronounced drop of 42.49 points (0.63%) to reach 6,703.40 points. This segment saw 216.4 million shares traded

through 12,174 transactions, valued at KD 35.2 million (USD 107.3 million).

The Premier Market Index also declined by 32.93 points (0.42%) to close at 7,835.97 points. Trading in this market involved 98.2 million shares across 7,585 transactions, worth KD 32.17 million (USD 98.11 million).

The Main 50 Index recorded a modest decrease of 1t5.10 points (0.23%), settling at 6,538.16points. This index saw 124.19 million shares traded through 7,482 transactions, valued at KWD 22.8 million (approximately USD 69.5 million).

Toyota leads despite drop

Kuwaiti car market faces 5.2% dip in Q3 2024 sales

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 21: The Kuwaiti car market has witnessed a decline in sales during the third quarter of 2024, with new car registrations totaling 96,886 units by the end of September, a decrease of 5.2 percent compared to the same period in 2023. September alone saw 10,468 new cars sold, a drop of 14.4 percent year-on-year, reports Al-Seyassah daily.

According to a Fox Tomov report, Toyota remains the market leader, selling 25,533 units and holding a 27.4 percent market share, despite a 17.1 percent decline in sales compared to Nissan follows in second place with

7,673 units sold and a 8 percent market

share, a 3.3 percent decrease from last year. In third place, Ford registered 6,913 vehicles, marking a 14.2 percent increase in sales.

When it comes to specific models, the Toyota Land Cruiser continues to be the best-seller despite a 30 percent year-on-year drop in sales, while the Ford Territory has seen a 19.6 percent growth.

The downturn in the market is partly attributed to the contraction of Kuwait's economy, which is expected to shrink by 1.4 percent in 2024, after a 2.2 percent decline in 2023.

The oil sector is particularly affected, with a 4.3 percent decrease in 2024 due to OPEC+ production cuts.

Green target network helps Zain reduce carbon emissions and mitigate climate change impacts

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 21: Climate change is a global crisis impacting regions worldwide, with the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) identified as a hot spot of climate change. Climate models predict temperature in MENA will rise 20% higher than the global average, intensifying drought and flood conditions, and posing increasing threats to humans, and biodiversity.In response to these challenges,transitioning to Net Zero emissions has become a global

As a leading regional telecom operator, Zain is actively addressing climate-related physical and transition risks while seizing innovation opportunities in sustainable technology.

Zain formally committed to reducing its Scope1 and Scope 2 emissions by 42% compared to 2020 levels, with the goal of achieving Net Zero emissions by 2050. companies (OpCos).

Recently, Zain adopted the simplified green site solution, upgrading conventional diesel-powered sites in a remote desert area of Kuwait to a low-carbon model. Previously, these sites relied on two diesel generators(DG) operating 24/7, resulting in high energy consumption, high challenges for maintenance, and high emissions-up to 90 tons per site per year.

Engineers had to visit these sites on monthly basis in extreme heat and to perform refueling under temperatures up to 50□. Following the simplification, the site energy efficiency increased from 55% to 90% with a reduction of the generator runtime by 73% due to solar power. As a result, fuel consumption was reduced by 18,000 liters per site per year, leading to a reduction of CO2 emissions by 49 tons per site per year. Maintenance visits were also cut by 50%.

Zain's green network solution has been widely deployed across its OpCos in Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, Iraq, and Sudan. Over 1,800 sites have been modernized, cutting carbon emissions by 150,000 tons annually- equivalent to planting 4.8 million trees per year.

In addition to power modernization and clean energy utilization, Zain's green target network adopted advanced technologies across energy, wireless equipment, and Operation and maintenance (O&M). This includes deploying energy-efficient products such as Meta AAUs, ultra-wide band



RRUs, the extremely large antenna array (ELAA) technology, ultra-wide band power amplifiers, and RF algorithms to greatly improve network energy efficiency.

With these innovations, network energy efficiency has significantly improved. The latest "Obit 0 watt" technology that is based on software features and algorithms, further reduces energy consumption by enabling deep hibernation during non-peak hours.

Looking ahead, Zain plans to expand its green network initiatives across all its OpCos, advancing the ambition of achieving Net Zero emissions by 2050. These efforts demonstrate Zain's commitment to mitigate its impact on the environment and build resilience against climate change.

Monopoly at risk

US regulators push to break up Google

NEW YORK, Nov 21, (AP): U.S. regulators want a federal judge to break up Google to prevent the company from continuing to squash competition through its dominant search engine after a court found it had maintained an abusive monopoly over the past decade.

The proposed breakup floated in a 23-page document filed late Wednesday by the U.S. Department of Justice calls for sweeping punishments that would include a sale of Google's industry-leading Chrome web browser and impose restrictions to prevent Android from favoring its own search engine.

A sale of Chrome "will permanently stop Google's control of this critical search access point and allow rival search engines the ability to access the browser that for many users is a gateway to the internet," Justice Department lawyers argued in their filing.

Although regulators stopped short of demanding Google sell Android too, they asserted the judge should make it clear the company could still be required to divest its smartphone operating system if its oversight committee continues to see evidence of misconduct.

The broad scope of the recommended penalties underscores how severely regulators operating under President Joe Biden's administration believe Google should be punished following an August ruling by U.S. District Judge Amit Mehta that branded the company

as a monopolist. The Justice Department decision-makers who will inherit the case after President-elect Donald Trump takes office next year might not be as strident. The Washington, D.C. court hearings on Google's nunishment are sched

uled to begin in April and Mehta is aiming to issue his final decision before Labor Day.



ommendations, Google would be forced to sell its 16-year-old Chrome browser within months of the final ruling. But the company certainly would appeal any punishment, potentially prolonging a legal tussle that has dragged on for more than

four years. Besides seeking a Chrome spinoff and a corralling of the Android

software, the Justice Department wants the judge to ban Google from forging multibilliondollar deals to lock in its dominant search engine as the default option on Apple's iPhone and other devices. It would also ban Google from favoring its own services, such as You-Tube or its recently-launched artificial intelligence platform, Gemini.

Regulators also want Google to license the search index data it collects from people's queries to its rivals, giving them a better chance at competing with the tech giant. On the commercial side of its search engine, Google would be required to provide more transparency into how it sets the prices that advertisers pay to be listed near the top of some targeted search results.

Kent Walker, Google's chief legal officer, lashed out at the Justice Department for pursuing "a radical interventionist agenda that would harm Americans and America's global technology." In a blog post, Walker warned the "overly broad proposal" would threaten personal privacy while undermining Google's early leadership in artificial intelligence, "perhaps the most important innovation of our time.'

Wary of Google's increasing use of artificial intelligence in its search results, regulators also advised Mehta to ensure websites will be able to shield their content from Google's AI training techniques.

The measures, if they are ordered, threaten to upend a business expected to generate more than \$300 billion in revenue this year.

"The playing field is not level because of Google's conduct, and Google's quality reflects the ill-gotten gains of an advantage illegally acquired," the Justice Department asserted in its recommendations. "The remedy must close this gap and deprive Google of these advantages.'

It's still possible that the Justice Department could ease off attempts to break up Google, especially if Trump takes the widely expected step of replacing Assistant Attorney General Jonathan Kanter, who was appointed by Biden

to oversee the agency's antitrust division. Although the case targeting Google was originally filed during the final months of Trump's first term in office, Kanter oversaw the high-profile trial that culminated in Mehta's ruling against Google. Working in tandem with Federal Trade Commission Chair Lina Khan, Kanter took a get-tough stance against Big Tech that triggered other attempted crackdowns on industry powerhouses such as Apple and discouraged many business deals from getting done during the past four years.

Fed signals fewer rate cuts amid strong economy, Trump policies

WASHINGTON, Nov 21, (AP): Just a economy gives us the ability to apfew weeks ago, the path ahead for the Federal Reserve looked straightforward: With inflation cooling and the job market slowing, the Fed appeared on track to steadily cut interest rates.

In September, its officials predicted that they would reduce their benchmark rate four times next year, on top of three rate cuts this year.

Yet that outlook has swiftly changed. Several surprisingly strong economic reports, combined with President-elect Donald Trump's policy proposals, have led to a decidedly more cautious tone from the Fed that could mean fewer cuts and higher interest rates than had been expected.

Fewer rate cuts would likely mean continued high mortgage rates and other borrowing costs for consumers and businesses. Auto loans would remain expensive. Small businesses would still face high loan rates.

In a speech last week in Dallas, Chair Jerome Powell made clear that the Fed isn't necessarily inclined to cut rates each time it meets every six

"The economy is not sending any signals that we need to be in a hurry to lower rates," Powell said. "The strength we are currently seeing in the proach our decisions carefully.

His comments were widely signaling potentially fewer rate cuts in 2025, a view that sent stock prices falling after they had surged with Trump's

Trump has proposed higher tariffs on all imports as well as mass deportations of undocumented immigrants - steps that economists say would worsen inflation. The president-elect has also proposed a menu of tax cuts and deregulation, which might help spur economic growth but would also fan inflation if businesses couldn't find enough workers to meet increased consumer demand.

And recent economic data suggests that inflation pressures could prove more persistent and economic growth more resilient than was thought just a few months ago. At his most recent news conference, Powell suggested that the economy could even accelerate in 2025.

Wall Street traders and some economists now envision just two, rather than four, rate cuts next year. And while the Fed will likely cut its key rate when it meets in mid-December, traders foresee a nearly even likelihood that the central bank could leave the rate unchanged.

Wall Street closes mixed

TOKYO, Nov 21, (AP): Asian shares were mostly lower on Thursday after a mixed close on Wall Street, with regional markets shrugging off a strong profit report from Nvidia that was released after U.S. markets

Nvidia again topped analysts' expectations, but technology shares in Tokyo declined due to the company's lower-than-hoped for profit forecasts. In after-hours trading, Nvidia's shares lost 2.5%.

Japan's benchmark Nikkei 225 shed 0.9% in morning trading to 38,001.80, as shares in semiconductor equipment maker Advantest Corp. dropped 2.7%. Chip maker Tokyo Electron shed 1.5%.

Australia's S&P/ASX 200 slipped nearly 0.2% to 8,313.50. South Korea's Kospi rose nearly 0.5% to 2,493.91. Hong Kong's Hang Seng dipped 0.2% to 19,662.49, while the Shanghai Composite lost 0.2% to 3,361.58.

Stephen Innes, managing partner at SPI Asset Management, noted the market reaction to Nvidia's results was muted, partly because of the positioning that happened before the release. Its long-term prospects remain complex, he added.

"The bigger question remains: where exactly is the bar for Nvidia now?" Innes said in a commentary. "This push to integrate AI into every corner of the corporate world risks backfiring when the technology is forced into roles it isn't fully equipped

ia's profit report was the most anticipated event left in 2024, more than even the Federal Reserve's upcoming meeting on interest rates, according to Barclays Capital. Nvidia has grown into a nearly \$3.6 trillion be-

Trading in the options market suggested Nvid-

hemoth because of nearly insatiable demand for its chips used in artificial-intelligence technology. It's grown so fast, with its stock nearly tripling

for the year so far, that pressure has grown for it to show it can keep leapfrogging past analysts' already high expectations. On Wall Street, the S&P 500 finished the day

virtually unchanged, at 5,917.11 after coming back from a loss of 1%. The Dow Jones Industrial Average eked out a 0.3% gain, to 43,408.47, and the Nasdaq composite slipped 0.1% to 18,966.14.

In other dealings early Thursday, benchmark U.S. crude gained 17 cents to \$68.92 a barrel. Brent crude, the international standard, added 18 cents to \$72.99 a barrel.

In currency trading, the U.S. dollar fell to 155.05 Japanese yen from 155.31 yen. The euro cost \$1.0551, down from \$1.0546.

Solar bribery scheme

Adani Group stocks fall 20% after fraud charges

NEW DELHI, Nov 21, (AP): One of Asia's richest men, controversial Indian tycoon Gautam Adani, is again in the spotlight. His companies' stocks plunged up to 20% on Thursday after he was indicted by U.S. prosecutors on charges he duped investors in a massive solar energy project in India by concealing that it was being facilitated by an alleged bribery scheme.

In an indictment unsealed by federal prosecutors in New York on Wednesday, Adani, 62, was charged with securities fraud and conspiracy to commit securities and wire fraud.

One result of the U.S. legal action is that the Adani group

decided not to proceed with a proposed U.S. dollar-denominated bond offering. Adani Renewables announced the decision in letters to the Bombay Stock Exchange and the National Stock Exchange of India.

In a statement, the group said the allegations against directors of Adani Green "are baseless and denied." The U.S. Department of Justice said "the charges in the indictment are allegations, and the defendants are presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty.

Adani is the son of a middle-class family in Ahmedabad in western India's Gujarat state. He quit college to become a diamond trader in Mumbai, India's financial capital. In the 1980s, he started importing plastics before establishing Adani Enterprises, which traded in everything from shoes to buckets and remains his flagship company.

India opened up its economy in the 1990s and a new middle class emerged as tens of millions of people escaped poverty and the economy boomed, prompting Adani to bet on infrastructure and coal.

Adani's first big project, the Mundra port in Gujarat, opened in 1998 and is now India's largest. Adani Ports and Special Economic Zone Ltd. is India's biggest private port operator. Within a decade, Adani became India's largest developer and operator of coal mines. According to Adani Power's website, it has expanded to Australia and Indonesia the world."

Adani companies, India's second-largest conglomerate, operate airports in major cities, build roads, generate electricity, manufacture defense equipment, develop agricultural drones, sell cooking oil and run a media outlet. Despite his fossil fuel roots, the billionaire Adani Green aims to become the world's largest renewable energy

Adani is considered close to the Hindu nationalist government, and the political opposition has long accused Prime Minister Narendra Modi of having close ties with the tycoon. They both hail from the western state of Gu-

Targeted policies and innovation drive sustained economic momentum

China steers global recovery with green growth

BEIJING, Nov 21, (Xinhua): In a world of mounting uncertainties, China is injecting certainty into the global economic landscape with a mix of targeted and effective policies that sustain a steady recovery and unleash new growth drivers.

Building up its impetus of high-quality development, the country has reinforced its role as a world growth engine while strengthening the global industrial chains and spearheading the global green transformation.

Chinese authorities have introduced a range of measures to stimulate growth this year, including a program that promotes large-scale equipment upgrades and consumer goods tradeins, and the issuance of ultra-long special treasury bonds. A raft of incremental policies have been rolled out since late September to intensify counter-cyclical adjustments, support businesses and boost market expectations.

The economic effect of these measures has been clear. In October, retail sales climbed 4.8 percent year on year, accelerating from September's 3.2 percent increase, official data

Offline consumption, particularly in dining and lodging, recorded double-digit growth, signaling strong consumer activity. Additionally, online retail sales of home appliances grew over 40 percent for two consecutive months, driven by incentives targeting the replacement of older products with new, energy-efficient models.

Experts believe these measures will drive further gains in the months ahead. "The recent pro-growth policies effectively address insufficient demand. During the fourth quarter, traditionally a peak consumption season, these steps will further demonstrate their impact by supporting and accelerating

consumption growth," said Lian Ping, president of the China

Chief Economist Forum. In addition to the rise in consumption, statistics showed marked recovery in other key economic indicators including foreign trade and manufacturing activity for the past month, as well as steady performance in investment and industrial

Based on the improved recovery momentum, multiple for-

eign institutions, including UBS and Goldman Sachs, have revised up their China 2024 growth forecasts. With its GDP expanding 4.8 percent year on year in the

first three quarters of the year and on course to realize an annual growth target of around 5 percent, China remains the biggest growth engine of the world economy.

The incremental policy package has played a positive role in driving sustained economic recovery and improvement, further strengthening international investors' confidence in holding Chinese assets, noted Mark Wang, president and CEO of HSBC Bank (China) Company Ltd.

Investments in high-tech manufacturing and services have surged in China, bolstering sectors like green technology, digital economy, and modern infrastructure, and contributing to the resilience and upgrading of the global industrial chains.

Data from the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) highlights the acceleration of innovation-driven growth. In October, the value-added output of high-tech manufacturing industries grew by 9.4 percent year-on-year, with sub-sectors of intelligent drones, electric vehicles and solar cells soaring by 41.9 percent, 48.6 percent, and 13.2 percent, respectively.

Wang Qing, chief macro analyst at Golden Credit Rating, attributed the growth to robust policy support. "Local authorities are focusing on cultivating new productive forces through increased spending on sci-tech innovation in a race to sharpen their industrial competitive edges," Wang noted.

NBS data showed investments in high-tech industries increased by 9.3 percent over the first ten months, far outpacing the growth of overall investments and reflecting China's commitment to fostering innovation and modernizing supply chains.

Shifa Saltagi Safadi wins young people's literature award for 'Kareem Between'

Percival Everett and Jason De León win National Book Awards

NEW YORK, Nov 21, (Agencies): Percival Everett's "James," a daring reworking of "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn," has won the National Book Award for fiction. Jason De León's "Soldiers and Kings: Survival and Hope in the World of Human Smuggling" won for nonfiction, where finalists included Salman Rushdie's memoir about his brutal stabbing in 2022, "Knife."

The prize for young people's literature was given Wednesday night to American-Syrian author Shifa Saltagi Safadi's coming of age story "Kareem Between," and the poetry award went to Arab origin Lena Khalaf Tuffaha's "Something About Living." In the translation category, the winner was Yáng Shuang-zi's "Taiwan Travelogue," translated from the Mandarin Chinese by Lin King.

The Kuwaiti novelist, Bothayna Al-Essa, was among the finalists for the award in translated literature category for her novel (The Book Censor's Library), published by Restless Books and translated by Sawad Hussain and Ranya Abdul-

Al-Essa's Arabic novel was published in 2019 by Arab Scientific Publishers and Takween Publications, and was included in the list of 100 Books to Read in 2024 by the American Time magazine.

Judging panels, made up of writers, critics, booksellers and others in the literary community, made their selections from hundreds of submissions, with publishers nominating more than 1,900 books in all. Each of the winners in the five competitive categories received \$10,000.

Everett's win continues his remarkable rise in the past few years. Little known to general readers for decades, the 67-yearold has been a Booker Prize and Pulitzer Prize finalist for such novels as "Trees" and "Dr. No" and has seen the novel "Erasure" adapted into the Oscar-nominated "American Fiction."

In taking on Mark Twain's classic about the wayward Southern boy Huck and the enslaved Jim, Everett tells the story from the latter's perspective and emphasizes how differently Jim behaves and even speaks when whites are not around. The novel was a Booker finalist and last month won the Kirkus Prize for fiction.

"James" has been nicely received," Everett noted during his acceptance speech.

"Demon Copperhead" novelist Barbara Kingsolver and Black Classic Press publisher W. Paul Coates received lifetime achievement medals from the National Book Foundation, which presents the awards.

Speakers praised diversity, disruption and autonomy, whether Taiwanese independence or the rights of immigrants in the U.S. Two winners, Safadi and Tuffaha, condemned the year-old Gaza war and U.S. military support for Israel. Neither mentioned Israel by name, but both called the conflict "genocide" and were met with cheers - and more subdued responses - after calling for support of the Palestinians.

Tuffaha, who is Palestinian American, dedicated her award in part to "to all the deeply beautiful Palestinians that this world has lost and all those miraculous ones who endured, waiting for us, waiting for us to wake up.'

Last year publisher Zibby Owens withdrew support for the awards after hearing that finalists were planning to condemn the Gaza war. This year the World Jewish Congress was among those criticizing Coates' award, citing in part his reissue of the essay "The Jewish Onslaught," which has been called anti-Semitic.

Honored

National Book Foundation Executive Director Ruth Dickey said in a recent statement that Coates was being honored for a body of work rather than any individual book, and added that while the foundation condemns anti-Semitism and other forms of bigotry, it also believes in free expression.

"Anyone examining the work of any publisher, over the course of almost five decades, will find individual works or opinions with which they disagree or find offensive," she added.

The National Book Awards have long taken place in mid-November, shortly after the elections, and they're an early snapshot of the book world's reaction: Hopeful after Barack Obama's victory in 2008, when publisher and honorary winner Barney Rosset anticipated "a new and uplifting agenda"; grim but determined in 2016, after Donald Trump's first victory, with fiction winner Colson Whitehead urging the audience to "be kind to everybody, make art, and fight the power."


This year, as hundreds gathered for the dinner ceremony at Cipriani Wall Street in downtown Manhattan for the awards' 75th anniversary, the mood was one of sobriety, resolve and willed good cheer.

Host Kate McKinnon joked that she was recruited because the National Book Foundation wanted "something fun and light and to distract from the fact that the world is a bonfire." Musical guest Jon Batiste led the audience in a round of "When the Saints Go Marching In" and sang a few lines from "Hallelujah," the Leonard Cohen standard which Mc-Kinnon somberly performed at the start of the first "Saturday Night Live" after the 2016 election.

Kingsolver acknowledged feeling "smacked down, at the moment," but added that she has known despair before. She likened truth and love to forces of nature, like gravity and the sun, always there whether you see them or not. The writer's job is to imagine "a better ending than the one we've been

At a Tuesday night reading by awards finalists, some spoke of community and support. Everett began his turn by confiding that he really "needed this kind of inspiration after the last couple of weeks. We kind of need each other right now." After warning that "hope is not a strategy," he paused and said, "Never had a situation felt so absurd, surreal and ridiculous."

NASHVILLE, Nov 21, (AP): Chris Stapleton took home four Country Music Association Awards and hardly left the stage on Wednesday night, while an absent Morgan Wallen was shut out all evening until taking the night's biggest prize, en-

tertainer of the year. Stapleton's wins included song of the year and single of the year for "White Horse," and he took the stage at the Bridgestone Arena in Nashville, Tennessee, three times to perform during the ABC telecast, including a ening duet with Post Mal

"I'm really honored for this, thank you very much," the always subdued country traditionalist Stapleton said as he accepted the male vocalist of the year award for a record-extending eighth time.

For much of the night it seemed the leading nominee Wallen, up for seven, would be shut out, until presenter Jeff Bridges gave a botched rendering of his name as "Morgan Waylon" when he announced entertainer of the year.

Four of Wallen's nominations came for his hit collaboration with Malone, "I Had Some Help," though the song, and the first-time nominee

Malone, went winless. But the rapper-singer Malone was all smiles all night at the CMAs after releasing his first country album earlier in the year. With Stapleton, he sang his song "California Sober" in full cowboy regalia, including a bolo tie as big as a belt buckle. He later took the stage solo to sing the emotional "Yours," which he dedicated to his young daughter.

Stapleton later performed his own "What Am I Gonna Do" with his wife Morgane, and performed yet again as part of an all-star tribute to George Strait, who received the Willie Nelson Lifetime Achievement Award.

Last year's entertainer of the year, Lainey Wilson, hosted the show along with Luke Bryan and NFL great Peyton Manning, and won two CMAs - female vocalist of the year, and best music video for "Wildflowers and Wild Horses.'



Experts debate authenticity of newly found Chopin work

Has a waltz written by Chopin discovered in NYC museum?

NEW YORK, Nov 21, (AP): The brooding waltz was carefully composed on a sheet of music roughly the size of an index card. The brief, moody number also bore an intriguing name, written at the top in cursive: "Chopin."

A previously unknown work of music penned by the European master Frederic Chopin appears to have been found at the Morgan Library & Museum in Manhattan.

The untitled and unsigned piece is on display this month at the opulently appointed institution, which had once been the private library of financier J. P. Morgan.

Robinson McClellan, the museum curator who uncovered the manuscript, said it's the first new work associated with the Romantic era composer to be discovered in nearly a century


But McClellan concedes that it may never be known whether it is an original Chopin work or merely one written in his hand.

The paper was found to be consistent with what Chopin favored for manuscripts, and the ink matched a kind typical in the early 19th century when Chopin lived, according to the museum. But a handwriting analysis determined the name "Chopin" written at the top of the sheet was penned by someone else.

Born in Poland, Chopin was considered a musical genius from an early age. He lived in Warsaw and Vienna before settling in Paris, where he died in 1849 at the age of 39, likely of tuberculosis.

He's buried among a pantheon of artists at the city's famed Père La-chaise Cemetery, but his heart, pickled in a jar of alcohol, is housed in a church in Warsaw, in keeping with his deathbed wish for the organ to return to his homeland.

Artur Szklener, director of the Fryderyk Chopin Institute in Warsaw, the Polish capital city where the composer grew up, agreed that the document is consistent with the kinds of ink and paper Chopin used during his early years in Paris.

Musically, the piece evokes the "brilliant style" that made Chopin a luminary in his time, but it also has features unusual for his compositions, Szklener said.

"First of all, it is not a complete work, but rather a certain musical gesture, a theme laced with rather simple piano tricks alluding to a virtuoso style," Szklener explained in a lengthy statement released after the document was revealed last month.

He and other experts conjecture the piece could have been a work in progress. It may have also been a copy of another's work, or even cowritten with someone else, perhaps a student for a musical exercise.

Jeffrey Kallberg, a University of Pennsylvania music professor and Chopin expert who helped authenticate the document, called the piece a "little gem" that Chopin likely intended as a gift for a friend or wealthy acquaintance.

"Many of the pieces that he gave as gifts were short - kind of like 'appetizers' to a full-blown work," Kallberg said in an email. "And we don't know for sure whether he intended the piece to see the light of day because he often wrote out the same waltz more than once as a gift."

David Ludwig, dean of music at The Juilliard School, a performing arts conservatory in Manhattan, agreed the piece has many of the hall-

marks of the composer's style. "It has the Chopin character of something very lyrical and it has a little bit of darkness as well," said Ludwig, who was not involved in au-

thenticating the document. But Ludwig noted that, if it's authentic, the tightly composed score would be one of Chopin's shortest known pieces. The waltz clocks in at under a minute long when played on piano, as many of Chopin's works were intended.

"In terms of the authenticity of it, in a way it doesn't matter because it sparks our imaginations," Ludwig said. "A discovery like this highlights the fact that classical music is very much a living art form."

The Chopin reveal comes after the Leipzig Municipal Libraries in Germany announced in September that it had uncovered a previously unknown piece likely composed by a young Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart in its

'Rust' premiere honors slain cinematographer

TORUN, Poland, Nov 21, (AP): Alec Baldwin's Western "Rust" had its world premiere Wednesday at a film festival in Poland with a dedication to cinematographer Halyna Hutchins, who was fatally shot in an accident on the set three years ago.

Organizers called for a minute of silence before showing the film, which opened to a full house at the International Film Festival of the Art of Cinematography Camerimage in the city of Torun, and received applause at the end.

Baldwin, the lead actor and co-producer, was pointing a gun at Hutchins during a rehearsal outside Santa Fe, New Mexico, in October 2021 when

revolver went off, killing Hutchins and wounding director Joel Souza. Baldwin has said he pulled back the hammer - but not the trigger and the revolver fired.

Souza

duced the film at the festival, a popular industry event dedicated to cinematography. He told the audience that initially after the accident he could not have imagined continuing with the production, or even working on a movie set or writing again.

But Hutchins' husband, Matthew, wanted the film to be finished, and came on as an executive producer.

"It was important to him that the people who knew and loved Halyna get to see her final work," Souza said. The mission became "to preserve every single frame that I could of hers, and to honor her final work."

"Rust" - which includes scene after scene of shootouts - is the story of a 13-year-old boy who is sentenced to be hanged after he fatally shoots a rancher by accident. He goes on the run with his estranged grandfather, played by Baldwin.

Bianca Cline, the cinematographer who finished the project, said Hutchins established the look and feel of the film, and filmed more than half of it. She studied Hutchins' notes to honor her vision.

Hutchins, 42, was a Ukrainian cinematographer on the rise and a mother of a young son. She grew up on a remote Soviet military base and worked on documentary films in Eastern Europe before studying film in Los Angeles and embarking on a promising movie-making career.

Ahead of the premiere, Hutchins' mother, who is suing Baldwin and the production, said she was refusing to attend and that she viewed the film as an attempt by Baldwin to "unjustly profit" from her daughter's death. Baldwin was also not present.

"It was always my hope to meet my daughter in Poland to watch her work come alive on screen," said Hutchins' mother, Olga Solovey, in a statement issued by her lawyer, Gloria Allred. "Alec Baldwin continues to increase my pain with his refusal to apologize to me and his refusal to take responsi-

Melina Spadone, a representative for Rust Movie Productions, issued a statement saying: "Gloria Allred's misrepresentation of both the Camerimage festival and any profit motiva-tion is disappointing. The decision to complete 'Rust' was made with the full support of Halyna's family.

Bizarre art sale

Duct-taped banana sells for \$6.2 million at art auction

NEW YORK, Nov 21, (AP): A piece of conceptual art consisting of a simple banana, duct-taped to a wall, sold for \$6.2 million at an auction in New York on Wednesday, with the winning bid coming from a prominent cryptocur-

rency entrepreneur.
"Comedian," by Italian artist Maurizio Cattelan, was a phenomenon when it debuted in 2019 at Art Basel Miami Beach, as festivalgoers tried to make out whether the single yellow piece of fruit affixed to a white wall with silver duct tape was a joke or cheeky commentary on questionable standards among art collectors. At one point, another artist took the banana off the wall and ate it.

The piece attracted so much attention that it had to be withdrawn from view. But three editions sold for between \$120,000 and \$150,000, according to the gallery handling sales at the time.

Five years later, Justin Sun, founder of cryptocurrency platform TRON, has now paid more than 40 times that higher price point at the Sotheby's auction. Or, more accurately, Sun purchased a certificate of authenticity that gives him the authority to duct-tape a banana to a wall and call it "Comedian."

The piece attracted heavy attention at the busy auction at Sotheby's, with attendees in the crowded room holding up phones to take photos as two handlers wearing white gloves stood at both sides of the banana.

Bidding started at \$800,000 and

within minutes shot up to \$2 million, then \$3 million, then \$4 million, and higher, as the auctioneer, Oliver Barker, joked "Don't let it slip away."

"Don't miss this opportunity," Barker said. "These are words I've never thought I'd say: Five million dollars for a banana.'

The final hammer price announced in the room was \$5.2 million, which didn't include the about \$1 million in auction house fees, paid by the buyer.

In a statement, Sun said the piece 'represents a cultural phenomenon that bridges the worlds of art, memes, and the cryptocurrency community." But he said the latest version of "Comedian" won't last long.

Fewer trolls, more connection

One tech tip: Simple guide to get started with Bluesky

LONDON, Nov 21, (AP): Looking for a new social media platform because X, Threads and Mastodon just aren't cutting it? You could try Bluesky

People seeking to avoid chaos, noise and political bluster in the aftermath of the US elections are noticing a different mood on the Bluesky social platform, where the vibe is seemingly welcoming and there are noticeably fewer trolls.

The site announced it had rapidly added more than a million new users in the week after Election Day, and has emerged as one of the fastest growing rivals to Elon Musk's X and similar platforms.

Musk's X and similar platforms.

If you're tempted to check out the new space, here's a guide on how Bluesky works:

Maybe you're not ready to commit to adding yet another social media account. No problem - you can still look around on Bluesky without signing up because all posts and profiles are public.

You might get a sense of deja vu because the platform's look and feel are very similar to X. That should be no surprise because Twitter co-founder Jack Dorsey was an early Bluesky champion. (Dorsey's no longer involved with Bluesky, which is owned and run by its executive team as a public benefit corporation.)

Account

If you take the plunge and get an account, you'll need a username. You'll notice Bluesky handles are a little bit different because they end by default in the site's domain, .bsky.social.

You can personalize your handle to make it more memorable, by using your own website's domain or buying a custom one through Bluesky. But it might not be something most newbie users need or want to do right away. Bluesky boasts that it gives users "algorithmic choice" to tailor the content they're shown instead of leaving it up to the whims of a centralized system.

"Our online experience doesn't have to depend on billionaires unilaterally making decisions over what we see," it says.

What it means is that you can follow custom feeds set up by other users, or design your own. If you tap #Feeds in the menu on the left, you'll see some default offerings like Cat Pics and Gardening. My Bangers is a list of your most

popular posts by likes and Catch Up shows the site's most popular posts from the past 24 hours. You can find more by doing a search and tapping the Feeds button.

There's also the usual "Discover" feed of suggested posts and a chronological feed of accounts that you follow.

To help new users settle in, Bluesky has starter packs of recommended feeds and accounts to follow, which anyone can create and share. They don't show up in Bluesky's search results but can be found in directories online.

Appealing

Or someone might share one with you. After I signed up, a colleague pointed me to one for major news outlets. There are tens of thousands of starter packs, ranging from broadly appealing topics like Taylor Swift to niche interests like cargo bikes or U.K. comedians. You can follow the whole pack or scroll down the list to choose individual accounts.

What about people you followed on X? There's a browser extension tool called Sky Follower Bridge that will help you find X users who've migrated to Bluesky. But check before clicking the follow button to make sure it's not a different user using the same display name or handle.

Ready to join the conversation? You can write posts or reply to others but keep it short because there's a limit of 300 characters - 20 more than on X. You can also upload photos and videos, though videos can't be longer than 60 seconds. GIFs and emojis are, of course, available too. You can still @ people by typing in their username, like posts by tapping a heart icon or use hashtags to highlight a theme. Bluesky has added a menu to hashtags, so when you click on one you'll get different options for seeing, or muting, posts on that topic.

Bluesky's decentralization ethos extends to the content control options it offers.

For starters, users can choose in their settings menu whether to see replies, reposts or quote posts in their feed. Specific words or tags can be muted temporarily, or forever, while accounts can be muted or blocked individually, or in bulk by adding them a moderation list. You can even fine tune the level of adult content that shows up in your feed.

Online safety top concern

World-first law in Australia to restrict kids on social media

MELBOURNE, Australia, Nov 21, (AP): Australia's communications minister introduced a world-first law into Parliament on Thursday that would ban children under 16 from social media, saying online safety was one of parents' toughest challenges.

Michelle Rowland said TikTok, Facebook, Snapchat, Reddit, X and Instagram were among the platforms that would face fines of up to 50 million Australian dollars (\$33 million) for systemic failures to prevent young children from holding accounts. "This bill seeks to set a new normative value in society that accessing social media is not the defining feature of growing up in Australia," Rowland told Parliament.

"There is wide acknowledgement that something must be done in the immediate term to help prevent young teens and children from being exposed to streams of content unfiltered and infinite," she added.

X owner Elon Musk warned that Australia intended to go further, posting on his platform: "Seems like a backdoor way to control access to the Internet by all Australians."

The bill has wide political support. After it becomes law, the platforms would have one year to work out how to implement the age restriction.

"For too many young Australians, social media can be harmful," Rowland said.

Mortality rates of heart failure outpace some cancers

Over 80,000 suffer from heart failure in Kuwait

KUWAIT CITY, Nov 21: Dr. Khaldoun Al-Hamoud, a heart failure consultant, revealed that around 80,000 people in Kuwait suffer from heart failure, with approximately 4,000 having advanced cases requiring intensive medical intervention.

Heart failure is a significant health concern, affecting 2 percent of the general population and 10 percent of those aged over 65.


Dr. Al-Hamoud also announced the first national forum focused on organ failure (heart, kidneys, lungs, and liver) in collaboration with the University of Chicago Medicine, Kuwait Medical Association, and the Kuwait Foundation for the

Advancement of Sciences.

The event will take place at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel this Saturday, with over 300 local and international medical professionals attending.

The forum aims to address challenges in diagnosing and treating organ failure, improve patient care before and after organ transplants, and discuss the latest scientific advancements.

Dr. Al-Hamoud noted that the mortality rate for heart failure within five years of diagnosis is higher than that of some cancers, with 48

Japan reports 1st bird flu outbreak

TOKYO, Nov 21, (Xinhua): An outbreak of avian influenza has been confirmed at a poultry farm in Japan's Izumi City, Kagoshima Prefecture, marking the first case in Kyushu this season, Japan's Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry, and Fisheries announced Wednesday.


Multiple chickens were found dead at the farm on Tuesday and genetic testing revealed the presence of the H5 strain of the avian influenza virus.

In response, the Kagoshima Prefectural Government began culling approximately 120,000 chickens at the farm early on Wednesday. The affected area includes 89 poultry farms within a 10-kilometer radius, housing approximately 5 million chickens.

Animal diseases: Philippine Agriculture Secretary Francisco Tiu Laurel has authorized the Bureau of Animal Industry to set up livestock, poultry and meat industry inspection sites in Metro Manila and surrounding areas to control the spread of animal diseases, the country's Department of Agriculture said Wednesday.

"These livestock, poultry, and meat industry inspection sites should serve as a defensive wall against the spread of animal diseases that threaten not only the local livestock and poultry industries but also public health and food security," Laurel said.

African Swine Fever (ASF), which has had a devastating impact on the hog industry since its first outbreak in 2019, recently had a resurgence in a region near Manila, the ministry said in its press release, adding that new outbreaks in other previously ASF-affected areas "are continually reported."



Experts map out human body one cell at a time

Researchers have created an early map of some of the human body's estimated 37.2 trillion cells.

Each type of cell has a unique role, and knowing what all the cells do can help scientists better under-

stand health and diseases such as cancer.

Scientists focused on certain organs - plotting the jobs of cells in the mouth, stomach and intestines, as well as cells that guide how bones and joints develop. They also explored which cells group into tissues, where they're lo-

cated in the body and how they change over time.

They hope the high-resolution, open-access atlas considered a first draft - will help researchers fight diseases that damage or corrupt human cells.

"When things go wrong, they go wrong with our cells first and foremost," said Aviv Regev, co-chair of the Human Cell Atlas consortium who was involved with the research.

The findings were published Wednesday in Nature and related journals.

The group plans to release a more complete atlas in 2026, profiling cells across 18 organs and body systems. That includes the skin, heart, breasts and more.

The current cell map not only charts the many types of human cells, but it also shows the relationships of cells to each other, said Dr. Timothy Chan, a cancer expert at the Cleveland Clinic. (AP)

Hope for fungal skin infections cure

Fat molecule may treat heart disease

SYDNEY, Nov 21, (Xinhua): Australian researchers have discovered that a natural fat molecule could serve as a treatment for diabetes-induced heart disease.

In a new study published in Cardiovascular Diabetology on Wednesday, a team from Monash University in Melbourne found that the fat molecule lipoxin A4 (LXA4) can significantly reduce inflammation, and improve function of diabetic hearts.

Heart failure and heart attacks are among the leading killers of people with diabetes.

Chengxue Helena Qin, senior author of the new research from the Monash Institute of Pharmaceutical Sciences, said the team's findings show that LXA4 could be used to treat diabetic heart disease.

"We found that LXA4 could halve inflammation and scar formation, specifically in cases of heart disease induced by diabetes," she said in a media release on Thursday.

"With recent advancements in developing more 'druglike' LXA4, our findings point to the potential of LXA4based therapies as a promising new way to manage diabetic heart disease," she said.

Previous studies have shown that LXA4 can prevent chronic inflammation and reduce diabetes-induced atherosclerosis, a chronic disease caused by the build-up of plaque in arteries, but its impact on diabetic hearts had never been studied

For the study, two groups of mice with type-1 diabetes were administered either LXA4 or a control substance twice

per week over six weeks.

The research team four

The research team found that the hearts of the control group exhibited increased inflammation while those of the group treated with LXA4 had reduced inflammation and improved cardiac function.

Alajuelense wants soccer ruling body to enforce rule

Team threatens FIFA with legal action in bid for spot at Club World Cup

ZURICH, Nov 21, (AP): The winningest team in Costa Rica is asking FIFA for a spot in next summer's Club World Cup and says it is willing to take legal action if

Alajuelense, which has won 30 league titles, wants FIFA to enforce the rule that forbids clubs from the same ownership to participate in the tournament.

"The claim is based on the principles of eligibility set in the rules of the tournament," the club said in a press release.

Team spokesman Marco Vazquez noted that Mexican clubs Leon and Pachuca belong to the same owner, Jesus Martinez, of Grupo Pachuca.

"Those are the rules that FIFA established - there cannot be multi-ownership," Vazquez said Wednesday. "There are two Mexican clubs from the same owner and the rulebook is clear. What we are asking is to review what FIFA itself established."

The FIFA-run competition has been expanded from seven teams to 32 and will be staged in the United States from June to July next year. FIFPRO, however, said a players' strike can't be ruled out. The players' union has concerns about the physical and mental impact on players as a result of an increasingly congested schedule.

Teams that qualified expect to earn millions in FIFA prize money at the tournament.

Vazquez said Alajuelense has "hired a law firm in Spain, and they have all the details" of the team's potential legal action.

FIFA has not publicly reacted to the team's announcement and didn't immediately answer a request for com-

Alajuelense is the best-ranked team in Central America for the CONCACAF but 40th overall in the region.

CONCACAF has four spots in the Club World Cup. The teams that qualified are: the Seattle Sounders, Monterrey, Leon and Pachuca. Lionel Messi's Inter Miami will participate as a guest of the host.

All five clubs were announced for the Dec. 5 draw in

Miami.

In Mexico, besides Leon and Pachuca, there are another two companies that own two or more clubs in the first division. Grupo Caliente owns Tijuana and Queretaro, while Grupo Orlegi controls Atlas and Santos. TV Azteca owns Mazatlan and has partial ownership of Puebla.

On May 2023, the Liga MX announced that multiownership will be forbidden but gave owners four years to sell.

Jesus Martinez Murguia, who runs the Leon club, said they will sell part of the team to comply with the rules but will still have a partial ownership.

Lyon routs Roma in Women's CL

Chelsea, Madrid into quarterfinals

PARIS, Nov 21, (AP): Two goals in two minutes by substitute Kadidiatou Diani roused Lyon to a late-surging 4-1 win over Roma and a place in the Women's Champions League quarterfinals.

Roma stung the record eighttime European champion by taking a 74th-minute lead that provoked a fierce fightback, started by veteran France forward Diani scoring from close range on corners in the 77th and 79th.

Chelsea and Real Madrid also won in Group B to join Lyon in the knockout stage with two rounds to spare.

Lucy Bronze's spectacular volley after just 64 seconds set Chelsea on its way to a fourth straight win, 3-0 over last-place Celtic.

Teenager Linda Caicedo, the 2023 World Cup star for Colombia, was Madrid's standout in a 3-2 win at Twente after trailing in the first half.

Germany great Alexandra Popp scored a hat trick and had two assists in Wolfsburg's 5-0 win against overmatched Galatasaray.

That set up a key game on Dec. 11 when Wolfsburg hosts Roma, both on six points, with second place behind Lyon at stake.

Heavily favored Lyon had not conceded a goal in three straight wins in the Champions League before being stunned by Roma's 18-year-old Giulia Dragoni. The on-

loan forward from Barcelona scored with a left-footed shot that was Roma's only on-target effort all game.

Lyon awoke and from near identical spots from the right flank, Kadidiatou Diani pounced on loose balls to score from three yards (meters) each time. Another substitute, Eugenie Le Sommer, had an immediate impact by scoring in the 89th and captain Wendie Renard rose in stoppage time with a header from

another corner.

Chelsea's winning run is now all 11 games under new coach Sonia Bompastor, who led Lyon to its last

Champions League title in 2022.

The English league leader had too much quality for Celtic. After Bronze's opener, Chelsea added a header in the 25th by Wieke Kaptein and a stoppage-time penalty by Eve Périsset.

Teenage star Linda Caicedo's twisting dribbles tormented the Twente defense and helped seal Real Madrid's place in the quarterfinals.

The Colombian scored in first-half stoppage time and set up Signe Bruun for a simple finish in the 71st minute to rally Madrid for a 3-2 win, one week after beating Twente 7-0

at home.

Madrid was tested in the first half and Twente led in the 29th when Jaimy Ravensbergen connected on a

free kick curled into the goalmouth.

Caicedo turned the game just before halftime finishing off an attack she started with a direct run into the penalty area. Her first shot was saved, and when a followup effort was deflected to her feet, Caicedo

calmly scored from close range.

When Caicedo ran at the Twente defense in the 71st, she created space to cross the ball low for Denmark forward Bruun to score.

Madrid's win was assured in stoppage time when Alba Redondo ran clear to score, though Twente closed the gap with almost the last kick, a 20-yard (meter) shot by Sophie Te Brake.

Madrid has nine points, six clear of Twente, and advances as it also holds the head-to-head tiebreaker.

While the 19-year-old Caicedo

was starring in the Netherlands, the 33-year-old Popp was as good as ever in Germany.

ever in Germany.

Wolfsburg had won 5-0 in Istanbul last week, and Popp set the two-time European champion on course for a repeat result in the third minute. Her first goal was a low shot from near the penalty spot, and she added headers in the 15th and 88th.

Popp also created chances for Janina Minge to shoot in the 31st from the edge of the penalty area, and crossed for Lena Lattwein to score with a header in stoppage time.

Double Olympic champ Alistair Brownlee retires from triathlon

LONDON, Nov 21, (AP): Double Olympic champion Alistair Brownlee announced his retirement from triathlon at the age of 36.

Brownlee won gold medals in London in 2012 and Rio de Janeiro in 2016, with his younger brother, Jonny, making the podium on both occasions. The siblings' exploits helped to push triathlon into the mainstream in Britain, with current Olympic champion Alex Yee of Britain crediting them as inspirations.

Alistair Brownlee was also world champion in 2009 and 2011, and a four-time European champion.

He wrote on X it was "time to close this chapter."

"This marks my transition from professional triathlon, a moment approached with both dread and excitement in equal measure," he wrote.

Brownlee said he was excited to try new challenges and had some "projects I'm eager to tackle."

But he knew his time as an elite triathlete was over.

"It has got more difficult for me," he said in an interview published on the website of Britain's Olympic team. "I can't do anywhere near the training that I used to be able to do. So I also found it hard at times being on the start line, knowing that I'm not prepared to the level that I'd like to be.

"And I'm older, I'm 36. I've done it for a long time and there's a lot of other things I want to do with my life."

Coach Genesio guiding Lille to success after outwitting Ancelotti and Simeone

PARIS, Nov 21, (AP): Just a year ago, Bruno Genesio left Rennes amid general indifference

Back to work at Lille this season, the French coach is being hailed as a master tactician, drawing comparisons with

his most famous peers.
The reason behind the hype?

A triumph against Carlo Ancelotti's Real Madrid in the Champions League followed by a win over Diego Simeone's Atletico Madrid. Add to this an excellent start in Ligue 1 and Lille is unbeaten in its past 10 matches going into Sunday's game against Rennes, Genesio's former club.

The 1-0 victory against Madrid in October and the 3-1 defeat of Atletico in Spain allowed Genesio to enter a very exclusive circle. The unexpected Champions League results made him only the second coach to secure wins on the biggest stage against Ancelotti, Simeone, Pep Guardiola, and Jose Mourinho. The only other coach was Jurgen Klopp.

Genesio previously led Lyon to a win over Guardiola's Manchester City, and Mourinho's Fenerbahce lost at Lille in Champions League qualifying this summer.

What is even more impressive is that the 58-year-old Genesio has handled an avalanche of injuries in his squad since he replaced Paulo Fonseca at Lille in June.

The former Lyon coach needed great adaptation skills and versatility to help Lille climb to fourth place in Ligue 1. Lille has gone seven games without defeat, its longest unbeaten run since December 2023.

"These results perfectly symbolize the strength of my group and the state of mind it's in," Genesio said after a

1-1 Champions League draw against Juventus, another side with a great European pedigree. "We only had 20 players on the team sheet, including three young players who have never played in Ligue 1."

At the various clubs he coached, Genesio has been truthful to his ideal of a game based on possession, pressing and taking risks.

"He dares to do things that perhaps others wouldn't dare to do, like fielding attacking players and pressing high up the pitch against big teams," said Gilles Rousset, who was part of Genesio's staff at Lyon and when he coached in China.

"He likes to try and cause problems that his opponents don't expect. It's not for nothing that his teams often beat the big clubs," Rousset told French magazine So Foot.

Despite the injuries, Genesio has players with the technical quality required to develop the football he likes. Among the standouts are Jonathan David, the Canada striker with seven league goals, Kosovo winger Edon Zhegrova - who has reportedly caught the eye of Manchester United - and goalkeeper Lucas Chevalier, whose stellar performances have led to a first international callup with France this month.

Sunday's match against Rennes will give Genesio the chance to add another win against a famed tactician: Jorge Sampaoli, the former Argentina coach, who signed an 18-month deal with Rennes during the international break.

In other matches, leader Paris Saint-Germain hosts Toulouse on Friday, and second-placed Monaco takes on Brest. Third-placed Marseille travels to Lens on Saturday.

\$200m more in backlog

Soccer clubs worldwide get \$125 mln in money owed from player transfers

ZURICH, Nov 21, (AP): Soccer clubs worldwide have been paid \$125 million in money owed to them from transfers of their former players, FIFA said Wednesday, with money routed via its finance house in Paris, and there's a backlog of another almost \$200 million.

A further \$31.7 million has been agreed but not sent yet.

The payments are being allocated to more than 5,000 grassroots and professional clubs by the FIFA Clearing House.

FIFA published an update on two years of work by the clearing house, which started in November 2022 to bring more transparency to the often murky multi-billion dollar transfer industry. It also tries to ensure smaller clubs get cash they are owed from future sales of players they nurtured.

When Moisés Caicedo made a British transfer record move from Brighton to Chelsea last year, his former clubs in Ecuador were entitled to share millions of dollars from the 115 million pounds (\$145 million) for

The money routed by FIFA "was a dream," the president of CD Espoli, Lenín Bolaños, said in the FIFA report, with plans to pay for a practice ground, medical clinic and

Some parts of the FIFA transfer market rules in place since 2001 are

under review after a European court ruling last month in a case brought by former France midfielder Lassana Diarra.

The current FIFA system entitles players' former clubs who trained them between the ages of 12 and 21 to share up to 5% of a future transfer fee.

However, clubs often were unaware a transfer had gone through or did not have the expertise or resources to pursue a claim. Now the online process is managed by the FIFA finance house which notifies buying clubs of approved payments that must be made within 30 days

The wealthiest buying markets

England and Saudi Arabia have paid the most in so-called "training rewards" FIFA said - \$50.1 million and \$18.7 million, respectively, in the past two years.

The leading net recipients have been clubs in the Netherlands (\$8.7 million), France (\$7.8 million) and Argentina (\$7.1 million).

One reason for the backlog is that clubs are not compliant with the system, the FIFA report said. It said at least 1,600 clubs in more than 100 countries are accredited.

"There are still important challenges ahead and areas for improvement," FIFA chief legal officer Emilio García said in the 52-page

Italy wins Billie Jean King Cup

Two-time Grand Slam finalist Paolini stars

MALAGA, Spain, Nov 21, (AP): Two-time Grand Slam finalist Jasmine Paolini capped a breakthrough season by leading Italy to its first Billie Jean King Cup title since 2013, defeating Rebecca Sramkova 6-2, 6-1 to seal a 2-0 victory over Slovakia in the final of the women's team competition.

When Paolini's win ended, she was joined on court by her teammates, and they embraced each other, then danced and sang along as the Gypsy Kings' version of "Volare" blared on the loudspeakers.

The No. 4-ranked Paolini was the runner-up at the French Open in June and at Wimbledon in July, making her the first woman since Serena Williams in 2016 to get to the title matches at Roland Garros and the All England Club in the same season. Before this year, Paolini, who is 28, had lost in the first or second round in all 16 career appearances at majors.

"Unbelievable year. Unbelievable. A crazy year. To finish like this, with a title ... it's amazing. I don't have words to describe it. I'm trying just to enjoy every moment," Paolini said. "I feel lucky to be in the position. I feel lucky to be part of

She also teamed with Sara Errani to win a doubles gold medal at the Paris Olympics in August. They were lined up to play in the concluding match against Slovakia, but it wasn't needed because Italy clinched the best-of-three series by sweeping the two singles matches.

"Jasmine raised her level really high this year. ... She's an example for all of us," said her teammate, 78th-ranked Lucia Bronzetti, who took Wednesday's opener by a 6-2, 6-4 score against Viktoria Hruncakova before a crowd that included International Tennis Hall of Famer and equal rights pioneer Billie Jean King herself. Bronzetti called it an "honor" to compete in front of the woman for whom the

event is named, saying, "She is a great person, a great legend." Italy, which eliminated Iga Swiatek and Poland in the semifinals, earned its fifth championship a year after finishing as the runner-up to Canada.

"I'm so proud of them. They fight every day," Italian captain Tathiana Garbin said. "This journey was incredible."

The triumph adds to what's been quite a recent run for Italy in tennis, including two Grand Slam trophies in 2024 and the No. 1 men's ranking for Jannik Sinner, who helped his country claim last year's Davis Cup. Sinner and Italy meet Argen-

tina in the men's quarterfinals Thursday. This is the first time the two premier International Tennis Federation team events are being held at the same site, although the women's matches are being played in a much smaller venue. They are using a temporary court set up under a white tent, with a capacity of 4,000; the men are playing in a permanent arena with 9,200 seats that were full Tuesday for Rafael Nadal's last match before retirement in Spain's loss to the Netherlands.

Bronzetti never had played a BJK Cup singles match until this week. She said she didn't find out until Tuesday night that she would be in the lineup against Slovakia. "I didn't sleep very well," Bronzetti said.

"You're not playing just for yourself," she said. "You're playing for your team and your country.

Serenaded by chants of her first name - "Loo-Chee-Ah! Loo-Chee-Ah!" - that mingled with the sounds of a drum and red plastic horn played in the cheering section behind Slovakia's bench, Bronzetti claimed the last three games of the first set and the last four of the match.
